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On the Spirit of Fasting

My beloved,

Below is a study from the Catechism offered at Saint Nicholas on the subject of fasting. As we look ahead into our own entrance into the Great 40 Days, I felt it would be a good resource to share with all. May we all share in a good struggle toward the Resurrection!

In the New Testament, prayer is closely associated with fasting. When the Apostles were unable to cast a demon out of a child, the Lord told them, "This kind can come forth by nothing, but by prayer and fasting" (Mark 9:29). Even though He is God by nature, our Lord Himself fasted in the flesh so that we might learn the importance of fasting (see Matthew 4:2).

In giving instructions to His Apostles, Christ did not say to them, "If ye fast," but "When ye fast" (Matthew 6:16). The Apostles fasted (see Acts 13:2). In the Didache we read that the early Christians observed Wednesdays and Fridays as regular fast days, even as we do today.

Fasting is, therefore, not an option for Orthodox Christians. It is an essential element of the life in Christ. Great Lent begins with this command from the prophecy of Joel: Blow the trumpet in Zion, sanctify a fast, call a solemn assembly (Joel 2:15). In short, fasting is a matter of obedience to God.

There are two kinds of fasting: (1) a complete abstinence from food and (2) an abstinence from certain kinds of food. Complete abstinence from food is prescribed before reception of Communion. This begins the evening before Communion. The minimum requirement is no food or drink after midnight. Many also observe a complete fast at the beginning of Lent and on Great and Holy Friday, at least until after vespers.

During Great Lent and the other seasons of fasting, we abstain from all meat, dairy products, and fish with backbones. We also regulate the amount of food eaten. The Fathers tell us that we should get up from the table still slightly hungry, in order to be attentive at prayer.

Abstinence from certain types of food has nothing to do with "uncleanness." There is nothing morally wrong with eating meat, although most Fathers did teach that Adam and Eve did not eat meat before the Fall.



Father Anthony's Message continued

There is, however, a correlation between the types of food we eat and our spiritual state. Animal products, especially fats and oils, tend to inflame the passions and create inner turmoil. This ancient wisdom of the Fathers will come as no surprise to modern nutritionists.

Although fasting has many health benefits to recommend it that is not the reason we fast. Bishop Kallistos writes, "The primary aim of fasting is to make us conscious of our dependence upon God" (The Lenten Triodion, p. 16). We voluntarily experience physical hunger in order to make us aware of our true spiritual hunger, our poverty of spirit.

Another reason we fast is to subdue our passions and self-will. The Fathers tell us that there is no way we can control our urges for sexual gratification, money, power, etc., if we are unable to control our stomachs. Fasting is the first step toward self-control.


When we fast, it is extremely important that we do so according to the rules of the Church and the directions of our spiritual father. Self-will is cut off by obedience. Making up our own fasting rules is an act of self-will, not obedience, and can only lead to spiritual pride.

Fasting, therefore, is a means of subduing the passions; it is not a virtue in and of itself. We do not fast in order to earn "merits." We are servants of our heavenly Master and do only as we are commanded:

So likewise ye, when ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say, "We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do" (Luke 17:10).

As with any practice, fasting can become an excuse for legalism. It is possible to keep the letter of the fast and yet violate its inner spirit. We must always keep in mind that the purpose of fasting is to control our passions and to bring us closer to God. Strict fasting according to the rules that is not accompanied by an inner attitude of submission to God yields only a hypocritical and judgmental attitude toward others. This is why we are enjoined by the hymns of the Church to observe a spiritual as well as physical fast:

Let us set out with joy upon the season of the Fast, and prepare ourselves for spiritual combat. Let us purify our soul and cleanse our flesh; and as we fast from food, let us abstain also from every passion. Rejoicing in the virtues of the Spirit may we persevere with love (The Lenten Triodion).

Proclamation

WHEREAS, the ancient Greeks developed the concept of democracy, in which the supreme power to govern was vested in the people; and

WHEREAS, the Founders of the United States drew heavily on the political experience and philosophy of ancient Greece in forming our representative democracy; and

WHEREAS, Greek soldiers were with the United States Marines on the shores of Tripoli in the military operations memorialized in the United States Marine Corps' Hymn; and

WHEREAS, many Americans fought alongside the Greeks in their fight for Greek independence, while stirring speeches by President James Monroe and Representative Daniel Webster led Congress to send funds and supplies to aid the Greeks in the struggle for freedom; and

WHEREAS, Greece is one of only three nations in the world, beyond the former British Empire, that has been allied with the United States in every major international conflict in the twentieth century, including World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, and the Balkans; and

WHEREAS, Greece and the United States of America are at the forefront of the effort for freedom, democracy, peace, stability, and human rights; and

WHEREAS, March 25, 2024, marks the 203rd anniversary of the beginning of the revolution that freed the Greek people from the Ottoman Empire;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jay Inslee, Governor of the state of Washington, do hereby proclaim March 25, 2024, as

Greek Independence Day

in Washington, and I urge all people in our state to join me in this special observance.

Building Committee

MARCH BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Lakewood Roofing, the roofer under contract to replace roofing at the Upper Hall and Lower Hall roofs, should be starting to mobilize the last week in February. They will be stocking materials on the Lower Hall roof, out of the way from Parishioners and the public. A few parking stalls near the Kona House and Dining Hall will blocked off and used for staging and the storing of a dumpster. The Upper Hall roof is planned to be done first, followed by the Lower Hall roof. Each area is expected to take about 2 to 3 weeks to complete without factoring in for bad weather. Full project completion is anticipated to be around the start of Great Lent and well before Holy Week.

The finishing touches on the Chapel renovation and preparation for new iconography in the Narthex area were completed in time for his Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos to lead a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy at Saint Nicholas earlier in February. It will likely be at least a few months, sometime after Pascha, when the iconographer designated to install new iconography in the Narthex area will be available to do the onsite work.

AHBL, the engineering firm hired to advise on and design upgrades to the floor structure in the Sanctuary, made their first investigative onsite trip in February. Specific upgrade options are:

- 1) Provide seismic upgrades to voluntarily bring the floor structure up to current code.
- 2) Increase the load rating of the floor structure from 60 PSF to 100 PSF, which by code will allow more flexible seating arrangements in the future, and more enhanced flooring options.
- 3) Beef up the structure enough so that one doesn't feel a "bounce" when another walks across it.

The goods news from AHBL's initial site visit and resulting assessment is that structural floor upgrades should NOT require removal of existing flooring and sheathing at the top side of the floor inside the Sanctuary space. If significant topside work were required, the Sanctuary would likely have to be closed off during upgrades, resulting in liturgies and other services being held elsewhere for a few weeks, maybe more. The bad news is that much or most of the existing Lower Hall plaster ceilings below would have to be removed and later replaced in order to provide adequate access to do any meaningful type of upgrade work.

AHBL's original proposal was to do a thorough investigative review and provide construction drawings ready to be submitted for permitting. However, to be that thorough would require some large openings to be cut into the existing Lower Hall plaster ceilings to accurately verify existing conditions of the structure above. Because large ceiling cuts were deemed to be overly intrusive at this point, a Plan "B was developed that would provide a preliminary design based on what AHBL can find using the current limited access available allowing for enough information to still realistically estimate the cost of the three options listed above. A preliminary design should be available within the next month or so from AHBL for that task.







ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the *YouTube* search bar, type; St Nicholas Tacoma


