HOPE in the Kingdom! Suffering and Joy in the Heart

S oon we will be beginning the second month of our "shelter in place" way of life. For those of us stuck at home, we are beginning to feel the fatigue and frustration. For others, it is worse: some have lost their jobs; others are living under the constant fear that their job may not be there for very much longer. Even worse, many Americans lie in hospitals around the country: on ventilators, life-support, and whose families endure the agony of not even being able to be with them in their hospital rooms. Finally, there are many whose souls have left this life altogether, and are journeying into the next, having succumbed to the coronavirus attack.

It is a stressful and fearful time. The question will be: what is our response? That is indeed the burning question everyone must face. Unprecedented suffering, on a national level, is certain to do one thing, and that is that it will remove the veil from our hearts. What is under the surface when we pull away that veil?

Therefore beloved brothers and sisters of St Nicholas, our response is summed up by one word: hope. Hope, yes, that our hard working scientists and medical experts will find a vaccine or other treatments. But more importantly, it is a living hope in that



kingdom which is to come; hope in the all-merciful God who sees us suffering, and pours out immeasurable grace to each. He is not a God who delights in our suffering, but rather a God who personally took that suffering upon Himself, incarnate on the Cross. Cover Story continued on page 22





PROJECT 2020, STILL MOVING FORWARD

The ongoing Coronavirus has greatly complicated things, which has caused the shut down of operations at Saint Nicholas Church, and is the reason why a previously scheduled March 22 General Assembly was postponed. A new date will be set when church activities will be allowed to continue, or at least when public authorities project they may.

A major outfall of the General Assembly cancellation and the uncertainty of when Coronavirus quarantine restrictions may be lifted; it is now a given the Narthex Renovation will not be able to start immediately after Pascha, which pushes its competition at least into October rather than mid-September. The commencement of the 2020 Greek Festival itself is being put into question as well, or at least the extent of it.

Items still pending for approval at a hopefully NEAR future General Assembly, listed in order of urgency and importance are:

Approval to proceed with Narthex Renovation construction, based on a selected contractor's bid.

Approving a budget to provide security cameras and electronic door access locks.


A yes or no vote to provide security fencing and a new electronic key card access parking lot gate at the south side of the church site.

Approving a budget to fill in and provide new flooring in recessed pew seating areas.

In the meantime, negotiations are going on with the two low Narthex Renovation bidders, which besides formalizing a final cost, include dealing with revised project scheduling and the impacts of the Coronavirus. Things are very fluid and difficult to pin down in these chaotic times, but the end game is in focus, while praying in good faith and for those less fortunate. Submitted by: Bill Acker

Sunday School News

In Times of Growing Uncertainty

As the COVID-19 virus reaches most of our cities and towns, it's important to step back and recognize the impact this ordeal has on our mental and spiritual health. As an educator, presvytera and also someone who is immune compromised due to recently completing chemotherapy for Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, I'm acutely aware of the anxiety, stress and worry a pandemic of this proportion has wrought on many individuals and families.

It's important now more than ever to focus on the things we can control:

Pray – First of all, take time each day to stop, breathe and pray. This is the time for us to lean into our faith and allow the peace of God to settle in our hearts remembering St. Paul's words:

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." <u>Philippians 4:6</u>

Wash Hands – Yes, we don't need gallons of sanitizer, just simply wash your hands with soap and warm water. (Say the Lord's Prayer for the full 20 secs)

Healthy Choices – Now more than ever, it's important to drink plenty of water, take your vitamins, get adequate sleep and make healthy food choices. Get outside, exercise and take a walk.

Limit Consumption of News – Hours and hours on Facebook or watching the news all day will surely bring more stress and worry to our lives. Turn off the T.V. and limit screen time.

Time: Time is precious. [Now that schools are closed], this gives us extra time with children and grandchildren to engage and connect. Take advantage of this opportunity for meaningful conversations and activities.

Recognizing the Impact On Our Church Community: Our churches are not only a place of worship but a place of fellowship and community. Sadly, this pandemic is dramatically impacting our lives as we experience limits to public gatherings, even for churches. This is necessary to protect us all from the spread of this potential deadly virus – especially greatly impacting the elderly and those who are immune compromised. Check to see if you can watch a church service live streamed. We can receive great comfort in hearing the hymns and prayers of the Divine Liturgy as well as our beautiful weekday Lenten services.

If You are Sick – **Stay home:** Do what is right and sit tight. To self-quarantine is the most responsible, unselfish and important thing you can do if you are not feeling well.

Reach Out – Social distancing does not mean social isolation. Make sure you are checking in on parents, aunts, uncles and others who might need companionship. It's especially necessary to reach out to those in your neighborhood or church family who may not have relatives nearby.

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"As God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience."

Colossians 3:12

Stay in the Present: Let's challenge one another to not be worried about what might happen in the next few weeks or months. Stay focused on the present and being the best possible version of yourself now. As we take these daily precautions keep in mind – It's not about you. It's not about me. It's about us. If we protect all, we protect those at the greatest risk.

Humility, Patience and Love – May we put into practice the words of the Lenten prayer of St. Ephrem, "Grant me the spirit of Humility, Patience and Love." Let us continue to humbly pray for one another, be patient in all things, and reach out with love.

Consider making a Lenten Crown of Thorns. This craft is both meaningful and quick and easy to make. Any salt dough recipe will work. After making the dough, roll it into three "snakes", braid it, and par bake it with tooth picks in it to represent thorns. Anytime someone in the family does something Lenten (showing kindness, generosity, patience...) they take the toothpick out and replace it with a flower (usually fake flowers until Holy Week).



APRIL IS THE MONTH OF THE MILITARY CHILD! April is designated as the Month of the Military Child, underscoring the

important role military children play in the armed forces community. Sponsored by the Department of Defense Military Community and Family Policy, the Month of the Military Child is a time to applaud military families and their children for the daily sacrifices they make, and the challenges they overcome.

It seems appropriate that we should recognize Jeff and Lexi's daughter and their three sons as part of this event. During the past year while Jeff was serving in Afghanistan, the rigors of 24/7 duty, the stress of being constantly on alert for incoming artillery or mortar fire, the never-ending requirement to scan the area for enemy ambush or sniper fire, and the added security threat from a potential suicide bomber all take a heavy toll not only on the serviceman or woman, but also on that person's family back home.

The Rogers are truly an incredible family. While Jeff was having to deal with the stress of serving in a combat zone, Lexi was managing the family household in Gig Harbor and providing love, guidance and stability for their daughter and three sons.

toric Armenian homelands. Estimates vary from 800,000 to over 2,000,000 Armenians and from 500,000 to over 1,000,000 Greeks were murdered.

BLOOD DONATION. How many of you know Stamatie Christodoulou? Stamatie is one of our newest parishioners having arrived about five months ago from Colorado. Stamati is a military veteran and is employed as a nurse at the JBLM Armed Services Blood Bank Center – Pacific Northwest (ASBBCPN), which happens to be one of twenty- two donor centers that support the Department of Defense. Armed Services Blood Banks conduct blood drives at military installations, ROTC programs, and at federal agencies across the United States. They are not authorized to conduct blood

drives in the civilian community because they are not allowed to compete with civilian blood donor agencies.





The ASBBC is a tri-service blood bank, so it supports the United States Army, Navy, and Air Force. Its primary mission is to support contingency operations by sending blood/plasma products directly to the battlefield, but its goal is to provide quality blood products for all service members, their dependents, military retirees, and the civilian community.

JBLM's blood bank allows people to donate in any of three different ways. People can donate whole blood, they can donate plasma, or they can donate platelets. Whole blood and some plasma that is donated at JBLM is immediately processed and sent directly to the battlefields of Iraq and Afghanistan. Plasma is freeze dried before shipping and upon arrival in the combat zone it is issued

to military medics. Freeze dried plasma is lighter and less bulky to carry and it is easily reconstituted with saline before it is administered to someone who has been wounded on the battlefield.

People with O negative blood are particularly sought after as blood donors because people of any blood type can receive it. For that reason, all O negative blood goes directly to the Madigan Army Medical Center's (MAMC) Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, where it is administered to newborns in need of blood transfusions. People who desire to donate blood platelets can do so with the knowledge that their blood goes directly to MAMC where it is used exclusively for trauma patients. There is a never-

Stamati and I recently talked to the members of AHEPA about getting a group of volunteers together and going to JBLM to donate blood. We had planned to do this during the month of May in symbolic recognition of Memorial Day, and more specifically to honor those men and women who died while in service to our nation. Because of the COVID-19 virus situation the date of this event is on hold.

If you would be willing to join us in this planned endeavor at some point in the future when we have been given the "All clear" command, Stamatie and I will host a meeting to discuss the concept of this blood donating operation, conduct the screening for people to ensure they will qualify as a donor, and identify a date that works best to travel to JBLM as a group via caravan. JBLM is a restricted military installation and therefore someone with a valid military ID card must be in the vehicle to gain entrance, hence the need to travel via caravan to the facility. If you have questions feel free to contact either **Stamatie (856-397-2920)** or me (605-691-3423), or plan to attend the meeting once it is scheduled. We need your help! Please support this valuable program once the virus is subdued and it is save to gather.

TIME, TALENT, AND TREASURE



TIME. Everyone knows the festival is planned for the first weekend in October and that it is our single greatest fundraising event for the year. Only time will tell if we are going to be able to host our festival in October but at this stage the prudent thing is to continue full speed ahead with planning. If you haven't done so already, please block out October 2,3, and 4 on your calendar so that you can participate in our festival and contribute to its success. As you have heard mentioned in the past, the festival is an **"ALL**

HAND'S ON DECK" event. That means if you are physically able to do so, your participation in the planning, the preparation, and the execution of the event is desperately needed.

In past years there has been a core group of approximately twenty women and a half dozen men (all of whom range between 65-93) that would do 90% of the pastry and bread baking. These seniors normally started baking in July those products that year after year are the single greatest moneymaker of the festival. Because of their efforts over many years the required missions were always accomplished but time has caught up too many of the key personnel among the group. Sadly, some of the matriarchs like Mrs. Turlis and Mrs. Cherbus have recently passed away, and Miss Elly Pangis who for many years mixed the pastry ingredients and prepared the bread dough regrettably is simply no longer able to do so. Compounding our dilemma, last year several of our core group sustained injuries from which they are still recovering and their participation this year will be significantly reduced. We need others to step up and take their place. We also need to adjust our work schedule so people who work during the week can as-

As mentioned previously it takes everyone's participation to make the festival a successful event and this year, we are scheduling four Saturday baking days on which we plan to prepare small pans of baklava. By baking on Saturdays, we can relieve some of the pressure on those who do the pastry and bread baking during the week, and we can produce more of the product that contributes significantly to our net profit.

Those who work during the week and are normally unable to assist with the baking phase of the festival are the people we are specifically asking to support this endeavor. Three of the four Saturday workdays are scheduled for 27 June, 18 July, and 25 July. The fourth Saturday is yet to be determined. Please block out two of these three dates on your calendar and plan to assist the Saturday baklava baking effort! Don't think for a moment that because you have never made a pan of baklava you would be of no help! Nothing could be further from the truth! There are many different tasks that must be completed in the process, and I am living proof that if I can learn how to prepare a tray of baklava, anybody can!!!

Evy Kontos has graciously volunteered to be in charge of this effort. We will have people present to work



with you and teach you how to do it, or you can work at the different ingredient prep stations necessary to keep the assembly line going. Plan to work from 0900-1600. Lunch will be provided but theoretically the goal is to complete between 100-120 small pans of baklava on each day. If we have 50 people present each day with 35 people assembling the pans, and the others working at the necessary ingredient prep stations or assisting in other ways, we should be

able to finish early on the third Saturday and eliminate a fourth Saturday workday all together.

In the future we will have sign up boards that will be displayed in the dining room. **PLEASE commit to work on three of the four weekends that will be displayed.** Once again, the emphasis for participation is on those people who work during the week and are unable to support the weekday group of bakers. Please do your share! **Sign up and support the program in order to be part of the solution!** If you are reading this, it's because you are part of St. Nicholas and you care about what happens to our church. Thank you for recognizing that we all own a piece of the action, and for your support of the baking effort.

The fact that God became man in Christ Jesus and took all of our suffering upon Himself, cleansing us of our sins, and destroying the power of death, means that each of us possesses an unfathomably powerful hope. This hope is not from men, but is from the living God who has destroyed death and risen from the dead. This is truly our hope.


Furthermore, we know that those of us who love Him and seek His coming again will suffer. This suffering is not a punishment from an angry God, but rather the means by which we follow Him to our own cross. For truly there is no resurrection unless there is first a death on a cross. But as the New Testament tells us it was for the **joy** set before him that Christ endured the cross. That same joy is set before each of us, especially during these difficult times. This why our response to this ongoing suffering is one of **hope**. In a way known only to God, our sufferings plunge us into the depths of our heart, not to drown, but to discover the kingdom of God and the **never ending joy** that comes when we follow Him in all things.

Is this not truly the meaning of Holy Week, which is coming soon, and many are worried will not take place in the church publicly? But we at St Nicholas are not those who follow the rituals of Holy Week outwardly. We are those who follow the meaning of Holy Week inwardly. For what is Holy Week anyway? It is the lived experience of the fact that God became man, that He willingly endured suffering and death for our sake, and that He rose again on the third day. This is the true Holy Week, and we are, by God's inscrutable wisdom, already in it.

Brothers and sisters, let us follow Him no matter the cost, no matter the suffering, no matter the fear: for truly, the **joy of the resurrection** lies quietly just on the other side of that veil!

Stay strong and don't worry! God is in charge of EVERYTHING.



Death

Hebrews 7:24-25 "But He, because He continues forever, has an unchangeable priesthood. Therefore, He is also able to save to the uttermost those who come to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them."

When we think of intercessors between mankind and God the Father, many times our thoughts go directly to Panagia and the Saints. But we have to remember that Jesus Christ is the Ultimate Intercessor to God the Father. Christ making intercession on our behalf is based on one really important principle, His humanity. How can Christ be an intercessor and High Priest if He isn't human? In order for us to be redeemed, someone Who is immortal and stronger than death (but also to experience it) needs to be our High Priest and make that sacrifice. Christ has not always been an intercessor for us. When He became incarnate, He took on human flesh, going from one nature (divine) to two natures, divine and human. One of our own can stand before the Divinity as one of our own. The only difference is, up to the time of Christ's Incarnation, there was a lack of continuity among the high priests of the Jewish faith, that was interrupted by death. Jesus Christ's divinity continues forever. "Jesus Christ is speaking our salvation into being". When you lose the Feast of the Ascension, you lose everything else. It's a return to a point in time (a static thing). St. Paul's main focus in Hebrews is the fact that Jesus Christ is our High Priest and Intercessor. He touches only lightly on the Resurrection. St. Paul is trying to show a correlation between the visible and invisible and that there is a Priest Who intercedes between them. That's the whole point of this book. The purpose of creation in the beginning is fulfilled in Jesus Christ through His Ascension, resulting in a resolution of the dualities and a perfect union with God. The Cross and the Resurrection are needed to get to the Ascension. Because of the Fall, sin and death had to be dealt with. Metropolitan Hierotheos, summarizing the holy Fathers, said this about the Feast of Ascension, "Ascension is deification in perfect union with God". He said every human being who has been born will experience the divine grace of the Incarnation, Crucifixion, death and Resurrection on the basis that Christ rose from the dead. The holy Fathers teach one distinction, however; not everyone will experience the grace of the Ascension. Only those who are numbered among the saints, who will constitute that "finite" number of the Body of Christ, will experience the grace of the Ascension, which is deification. When Christ comes

again, He will fully release the power of His lightning divinity through His burning flesh. This is what we all are looking for. During His first coming, Christ (in His mercy) restrained this power to protect the womb of Panagia, His followers, St. Thomas when he stuck his hand in Christ's side and anyone else with whom He came in contact. Christ is withholding the glory of His divinized flesh until we become acclimated. The period between Christ's Ascension and His Second Coming, is the time when His High Priestly duties as Intercessor come into play.

"Feasts of the Lord" by Metropolitan Hierotheos:

So by the Feast of the Ascension we are celebrating the enthronement of our nature in heaven. By the Resurrection and Ascension of human nature we are, at the same time, also celebrating the beginning of the resurrection and ascension of every believer. Therefore, when a person takes part in Christ's Ascension, he is no longer a man of the earth like the first man, but a man of Heaven like the Second Man. Christ (St. Gregory Palamas). The phrase that Christ, because He ascended into Heaven, "sat down at the right Hand of God" (Mk.16,19) comes from symbolic theology and means to show the divinity of the Word of God, that Christ, as God was always consubstantial with His Father, but also as Godman raised human nature to Heaven and made it identically God. According to St. John of Damascus, the phrase, "at the Right Hand of the Father", means the glory and honor of the Godhead. <u>In other words, the Son</u> has the glory of divinity which the Father also has, but after the incarnation of the Son and the ascension of human nature, this human nature, too, partakes of the glory and divinity and Christ is worshipped as Godman by all creation. Thus, the Right Hand of the Father is essentially unity of Father and Son because the Son has the same essence, or nature, as the Father. The verb that is used, "sat down", has great significance. This verb which denotes stability and settledness, means, as Basil the Great says, the firmness of the nature and its fixity. In other words, Christ has the same nature as the Father without undergoing any change or alteration. He remains God forever. Thus "sat down at the right hand of the Father" means "equivalence in value". The essence and meaning of the feast is immensely great and high. If the power of death and the devil was overcome by the Resurrection, our nature ascended to the throne of God by the Ascension and we ourselves were given the possibility of attaining the experience of the Ascension, which is deification.

Christ's Ascension deifies human nature. Thus He is a perpetual High Priest in His deified human nature. The Old Testament priests were unable to provide that ministry (perpetual intercessor) because of one stubborn reality, death. When Christ dies and rises from the dead and ascends into Heaven, He provides that ministry of priestly intercession permanently. Will Christ retract from His role as Perpetual Intercessor (High Priest) after the Second Coming? No, because He will always be that "membrane" between divinity and humanity. That's why baptism matters. The molecules of our flesh are transformed on a physical level by death and resurrection in Christ. Cremation is not compatible with the theology of the Ascension, because the body has been transformed into the temple of the Holy Spirit. Christ assuming human nature through His incarnation paves the way for us to be partakers in His Ascension without being burned up. Father Seraphim encourages parents, holding small children, to receive communion first, allowing the child to imitate the parent. In a similar way, we are meant to imitate Christ in His Ascension.

Mark 16:19 "So, then after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into Heaven, and <u>sat down</u> <u>at the right hand of God.</u>" (Cross references: Psalm 110:1; Acts 2:33; 7:55; Eph 1:20; Col 3:1; Hebrews 1:3; 8:1; 10:12; 12:2). Sitting at the right hand of nobility (or in this case, Divinity) indicates equality. Those who question the divinity of Jesus Christ are essentially questioning the Holy Trinity. If Jesus Christ was subordinate to God the Father, there would be no Trinity.

Creation has been waiting for the perfect union between Christ's resurrected and ascended human nature (which is sitting at the right hand of the Father – while not creating a disturbance in His divinity) and God the Father. Christ already has human nature that is glorified forever, that is constantly interceding for us and pulling us to a place where He already abides. That is the difference between a behaviorist way of living the Christian life and an existentialist way which says that Christ has already established human nature at the right hand of God. Another feast of our Church that shows that somebody has already taken hold is Panagia, the Feast of Dormition, which is a preview of the general resurrection. God also manifests this through His "walking" saints and those saints whose relics emit fragrant myrrh.

Hebrews 9: 1-6 identifies the visible, physical world manifestation of an invisible reality made according to the specs that God gave His people, Israel. The one thing that is so characteristic of the Old Testament is that it is never presented in any other way than God's own revelation to His people. It's intentional on God's part, in the on-going journey to raise up God's son, Israel, to the understanding of the invisible that He, Himself, is giving the best way to represent what He is really after in an earthly way. It's all because God is self-revealing. He knows that if everything is done in the way He instructed, everything will be set up in the earthly realm to prepare them and shape how they understand reality to lead them to the invisible, that couldn't be revealed in a snap. He's building the ability of the created people to experience His Uncreated glory. It's interesting that St. Paul is referring to the time of the building of the Tabernacle (which no longer existed at the time of his writing) and not the Temple which did exist. We need to remember (from the beginning of our Hebrews study) that all Jews were Hebrews, but not all Hebrews were Jews. He is using the term Hebrews rather than the more common term, Jews, because he is leading us on a very deliberate course and wants to target everyone who is a son of Abraham. He is referring to a point in salvation history that was the most intentional and the broadest on purpose. St. Paul is getting to the core fundamentals because it seemed that they had forgotten. The Hebrews were so focused on the Law that they had lost the basic fundamentals that God had originally given them.

Hymn of Entry: Archimandrite Vasileios

We are an image of the cherubim, that is to say we are identified with them; we are cherubim "in a mystery," that is to say inwardly and liturgically, and hence truly. The image of God that is the basis of man's nature raises him to deification by grace. <u>The Son of God, Who is the perfect Image of the Father, is One</u> <u>in essence with Him.</u> For Orthodoxy the image, the icon, is an identification without confusion. <u>"Representing in an image" has to do with the deepest relation between persons and things, and the</u> <u>greatest respect for distinctive personal qualities.</u>

"And to the life-giving Trinity sing the thrice-holy hymn": we sing the thrice-holy hymn as we celebrate the mystery; and this celebration of itself sends forth the hymn. The thrice-holy hymn is a word coming out of the silence of action, and for that reason is a triumphal hymn, unheard but never silent.

"Let us lay aside all the cares of this life": every care is laid aside. It is thrust from us, abandoned "that we may receive the King of all." And because this King is, as we realize after much experience, He Who is always coming, our cares stay permanently thrust aside. <u>The Divine Liturgy spreads everywhere.</u> Our whole life becomes part of the Liturgy, bidden to the wedding of the Lamb – the "care without care," our soul and body, our life and our death, the present age and the age to come. When you have driven out care you can attend easily to your business, to all your affairs: God Himself manages them. We thrust away care and receive the King of all. We can do either one thing or the other. The elements of the world pass away with a loud noise (II Pet. 3:10): and everything is clothed with light and existence as with a garment. Everything exists and acquires substance. Representing the cherubim in the liturgical singing of the thrice-holy hymn, we are caught up into heaven – whether in the body or out of the body we do not know, God knows (cf. II Cor. 12:2) – and we sing the triumphal hymn with the blessed powers. When we are there, beyond space and time, we enter the realm of eschatology. We begin to receive the Lord "invisibly escorted by the hosts of angels." Thus anyone who participates in the Liturgy, who is

<u>taken up – "he was caught up into heaven" – acquires new senses. He sees history not from its deceptive side, which is created and passes away, but from the true, eternal and luminous side which is the age to come.</u> Then the believer delights in this world too, because he experiences the relation between it and the other world, the eternal and indestructible: the whole of creation has a Trinitarian structure and harmony. The thrice-holy hymn is sung by the "communion of saints," the Church, in the depths of its being.

Solemnly sung as part of the Divine Liturgy, the trice-holy hymn overcomes tumult, and makes everything join in the celebration and sing together in complete silence and stillness, the silence and stillness of the age to come. This is an indication that we have already received the pledge of the life to come and of the Kingdom.

This, of course, is quoting the Cherubic Hymn in the Divine Liturgy. The Son, the Father and the Holy Spirit are One in essence, but 3 distinct Persons. They are 3 unique Persons with the same nature. The Son is the perfect image of the Father and One in essence. If you see the Son, you see the Father. They are two different entities, each expressing One Divine Nature. If you see the earthly tabernacle, you're seeing the image of the Heavenly world. God is allowing His people to see the earthly reality in relationship to the heavenly reality. "An icon is identification without confusion": when you look at an icon you are looking at and identifying with the prototype without confusing the icon with the actual person. As Christ is the image of the Father, we are the image of Christ. "Representation in an image has to do with the deepest relation between persons and things, and the greatest respect for distinctive personal qualities." An image has to correspond to the prototype. Pagan images have no prototype to which they correspond. This is the concept that St. Paul is getting at. He is trying to establish that there is a certain relationship between image and prototype. A man who tries to alter his sexual assignment by changing his appearance is striving to correspond to our concept of a biological female. If there is a change in the "icon" there will be a change in the prototype. The sad and ghastly thing is the image of female bears a relation to a prototype and that is not interchangeable. This is an example of identification with confu-If you confuse and twist the image or icon around, it will be difficult to recognize the prototype sion. when it makes its appearance.



Abortion: The Finishing Blow by Elder Ephraim - The Art of Salvation

My beloved children, today, our earth is constantly being saturated with torrents of blood from wars and various other events. It is also saturated, however, with blood in it that is more innocent than that of Abel's: The blood of executed infants. It is the blood of innocent babies— these defenseless children—, which is spilt by their very own mothers.

Clinics and obstetricians offices have become the "new" slaughterhouses of Herod. Millions upon millions of babies throughout the entire borough have been thrown into garbage cans and septic tanks. People don't even dispose of cats in this way! Before, however, members of the parliament approve the aforementioned legislation; we wish to make the following recommendation:

Members of the Parliament should see the film entitled "The Silent Scream." This video features ultrasound images of the inside of the uterus recorded during an abortion. It is a tragic sight! BREAD

Following the Word through Scripture

In the Masoretic text of the Old Testament, that is the Old Testament written in the original Hebrew language, the word "lechem" is translated into English as "bread." In the Septuagint, that is the original Masoretic text that was translated into Greek about 200 years before Christ, the word "lechem" is translated into Greek as "artos." And of course, in the Greek Old and New Testaments, the word "artos" is translated into English as "bread."

We have here three words, or one word in three languages: lechem, artos, bread.

In Strong's Concordance of the Bible, lechem is Hebrew word 3899, meaning food for man or beast, especially bread or grain, and is from the primary root 3898, with a meaning of to feed on, to consume, by implication to battle (as destruction), devour, eat, overcome, prevail, make war. Again in Strong's, artos is Greek word 740, meaning bread (as raised), or a loaf, (shew) bread. It is from a primary verb, airo (word 142), to lift, to take up or away, to raise, to sail away (i.e., raise anchor), to explate sin, away with, bear up, carry, lift up, loose, make to doubt, put away, remove, take away, or take up.

Right away, a few things come to mind. Bethlehem, for anyone who doesn't know already, is two Hebrew words, bayit (house) and lechem (bread). It means "house of bread." Jesus, the bread of life who came down from heaven, was born in the house of bread, Bethlehem. Manna, with a meaning of "what is it?, is the food or bread that rained down from heaven and sustained the Hebrews in the wilderness for 40 years. Jesus, the bread of life that came down from heaven, is something new and never seen before, a "what is it?, a God-man. And this Jesus has expiated our sin, loosed our bonds, was taken up to heaven and raised us up with Him to sit at the right hand of the Father. This Jesus has battled the enemy and prevailed. These things are part of the meaning of the root of the word "artos" or "bread."

I am going to follow the word "bread" in the Bible through Strong's Concordance. It is an exercise I have been meaning to do for a long time. My intent is to write one page per month for the St. Nicholas Messenger on this topic, keeping in mind that ultimately this has everything to do with our own eucharistic offering.

Strong's tells me that the word first appears at Genesis 3:19: In the sweat of your face you shall eat bread till you return to the ground from which you were taken. Earth you are, and to earth you shall return. This is God talking to Adam (man) after he and Eve ate the forbidden fruit, informing them that because they ate, the ground is cursed, and man will have to work for his food until he returns to the ground himself. There is plenty of talk about eating before this point, but the word "bread" is not used until now.

The next appearance of the word "bread" is in Genesis 14:18: Now Melchizedek, King of Salem, brought out bread and wine. He was the priest of God Most High. He blessed Abram and said, "Blessed be Abram of God Most High, Creator of heaven and earth, and blessed be God Most High, who delivered your enemies into your hands." Then Abram gave him a tithe of all. There is an obvious connection to Christ and to our own offering in these verses. Melchizedek, which means King of Righteousness in Hebrew, is the King of Salem, that is King of Jerusalem, and he is a priest of God Most High centuries before God establishes the Levitical priesthood at Mt. Saini. He brings out from Salem a eucharistic offering of bread and wine to Abram, who has just rescued Lot and the people of Sodom from their captors. Melchizedek then blessed Abram, and Abram paid a tithe to Melchizedek.

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!




