- 11. Go to liturgical services regularly.

Come and celebrate with the children as they retell the story of Christ's birth through the Holy Icon of the Nativity.




Building Committee

Some unforeseen breakdown events occurred just before and during the Greek Festival. First, as mentioned in the previous Messenger, there was back-up in a sewer line that serves the Lower Hall restrooms, which at least in the short-term got fixed and is currently under control. Second, aging refrigeration systems that serve the kitchen walk-in cooler and freezer are at the point of being unreliable and should at least be repaired if not replaced altogether. Third, a reach-in bar cooler in the Lower Hall quit working near the end of the Greek Festival and should be replaced.

It will probably be early next year when a long-term fix will be implemented to the Lower Hall sewer line, but cost proposals are currently being sought to fix the kitchen walk-in cooler and freezer, and replace the Lower Hall bar cooler. We are fortunate that only a small portion of the 2018 Building Projects budget has been spent to date. It is the intent to present cost proposals on cooler fixes at the next Building Committee meeting to pass onto the Parish Council for approval the following week without the need for further funding, as they are considered high-priority items to get taken care of in a timely manner.

Another high-priority item to get done before the year is out is some targeted roof repairs and maintenance. A lower priority item is to check on two ceiling fans over the Sanctuary balcony area which currently don't seem to be circulating as much air as they should.

Looking into 2019, which at the time of this printing is not much more than a month away, two early specific tasks are to explore the cost and feasibility of insulating the attic space over the Sanctuary, and to implement a long term fix to the Lower Hall sewer line previously mentioned after further investigation.

And I am reminded that this Gala, an untraveled path for some of us, is an opportunity to reach out a little further, to grow closer together, to strengthen our bond with one another and to use our energy and drive to make a difference NOW.

I am grateful to be surrounded and working alongside a small team of all-stars, for now. And I am extremely thankful to be guided and supported by a mentor who tells me how proud she is of me even when and, especially when, I give her no reason for such encouragement (i.e. when I screw up, over think or I am tempted to rush things). Looking back and evaluating our progress to project GALA, there are a few lessons I leaned from working with our superb team of committed volunteers:

- The restoration of our Narthex is PERSONAL. St. Nicholas is OUR church. It was built almost 100 years ago by Greek immigrants putting down roots in the Tacoma community. It was their house of worship, much the same way it is ours today. This church also served as a cultural center that preserved and upheld Greek traditions and values while helping those early immigrants to assimilate smoothly into the community of Tacoma and the American culture.
- Almost all I contacted and everyone I am working with to organize and stage our Gala, accepted an INVITATION to help and contribute. They answered the call not out of guilt, obligation or to show off their riches and talents. They are engaged because it matters to them for reasons that are known to them and our Creator. They are committed without expecting our admiration for their good deeds. They are engaged as an opportunity to express their gratitude for their blessings and to honor the memories of their loved ones who passed away, some founders of this church.
- All who are actively engaged in the *production* of the Gala **BELIEVE** and **TRUST** it is a noble and novel project they will do their best to advance.



Bible Study

There are two basic approaches to Christ's death on the Cross.

Punishment: Some Christian denominations believe that since Christ bore our sins on the Cross, God the Father couldn't bear to look upon Him since He was steeped or clothed in sin. This is a legalistic look: a debt or punishment for which God the Father requires payment. Christ is the substitutionary payment. Mark 15: 34 "And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying 'Eloi, Eloi, Iama sabachthani?' which is translated, 'My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?' "

Liturgical love offering: This shows Christ's immense love for mankind when He cries out on behalf of Adam (and mankind) "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" He became man to defeat death, not to pay an imagined debt.

Flaws in Option 1: The Holy Trinity is temporarily out of communion with each other. Christ's human nature gets excised from His Personhood until after the Resurrection when they come back together. It boils down to Jesus no longer being God.

Points in Option 2: Adam's Lament is man's incorrect way of thinking that God deserted him. God never leaves us, we turn our backs on Him when we sin. There is no formula that neatly explains this. St. Gregory the Theologian puts it perfectly, "...it was on account of the Incarnation, and because humanity must be sanctified by the humanity of God, that He might deliver us Himself, and overcome the tyrant, and draw us to Himself by the mediation of His Son, Who also arranged this to the honor of the Father, Whom it is manifest that He obeys in all things. This is as much we will say of Christ; the greater part we shall reverence with silence." There are some things that cannot be explained or formulated. Over processing or breaking something apart to find its secret takes away the higher meaning. The Holy Mysteries in the Eucharist are the best example. God never meant for us to be privy to everything in this life. Christ's Resurrection is the atonement. The closer we get to the mystery of our salvation, the more joyful we should be.

Amartia – Greek word for sin - αμαρτια

A – shows negative martia – witness, true sight, missing the mark

Sin is like osteoporosis which is basically holes in one's bones. It is lacking substance. Sin is the absence of obedience, which means disobedience. For sin to be a substance it would mean that God the Father is the author of sin, which is impossible. Adam and Eve chose to embrace, in their hearts, non-life. It's this embrace that is the issue.

Created beings are subject to change and have an innate nature that seeks to perpetuate one's existence. Even before the Fall, Adam and Eve were subject to change. The Uncreated (Trinity) is unchangeable and immoveable and is not subject to death. Christ, as man, chose to accept the changeability that is inherent in human nature and the passion which led to His death on the Cross.

The Theopaschite Formula: GOD SUFFERED IN THE FLESH

The Theopaschite Formula is the uniting factor. To say the Divinity suffered would be blasphemous. It is more precise to say that Christ is One Personhood Who, simultaneously, expresses Divine Nature and human nature, Who suffers in the flesh. Jesus Christ, the Son, is the only Being Who expresses two natures. The following is dogmatic: Man will never lose human nature even in the Kingdom. By grace, we will be divinized, but we will never lose our human nature, nor gain divine nature. We will be clothed with Christ's divine glory.

ABORTION, OIKONOMIA AND "THE HARD CASES" (A Study) by Valerie H. Protopapas THE REASON FOR THIS STUDY: This examination of the issue of abortion, the Orthodox concept of oikonomia and certain individual situations used to support and promote the "right" to an abortion has been undertaken primarily because there is a legally and culturally perceived "right to an abortion" in America. Young people growing up today cannot remember a time before the Supreme Court decision Roe vs. Wade in 1973 legalized abortion on demand throughout all nine months of pregnancy. Should Roe be reversed by the High Court, legislative initiatives guaranteeing access to abortion presently exist in many states and at the federal level, strongly suggesting that the procedure has become institutionalized in our present culture and will not be either easily or quickly abolished whatever the efforts made toward that end? For that reason, it is becoming ever more difficult for the Orthodox Church to assert among the Faithful as well as witness outside the Faith to Her doctrines on the sanctity of innocent human life - doctrines which clearly state that no such "right" to an abortion exists in the Church and further, that no one can claim to be an Orthodox Christian while utilizing, promoting, providing, supporting or condoning abortion. Yet, even with a complete understanding of the Orthodox doctrine on abortion, some consideration must be given to the so-called "hard cases" which, though few in number, present a far more complex situation than that of an abortion performed for social or economic convenience. In point of fact, these "hard cases" are presented as reasons for having or performing an abortion in less than 3% of the 1.5million abortions performed annually in our nation since 1974. This fact makes them relatively unique instances of pastoral consideration and as such, possible candidates for the application of oikonomia. This small study will, hopefully, provide some information for those with the weighty responsibility of interpreting the Faith and at the same time, comforting and guiding those who have turned to them in their hour of need. It is with the hope that

the material herein presented will be of use and in humble recognition of the limitations of the author that this study has been undertaken. [About the term "oikonomia" (economy): This Scripturally-based concept is explained in more detail later in this article. However, for those encountering the term for the first time - and in order, hopefully, to maintain their interest in the subject under discussion - oikonomia is a pastoral function permitting what may or may appear to be the violation of the letter of canon law and/or pious practice without violating the spirit of either. In the West, the concept degenerated into the practice of "dispensation;" that is, a pope, bishop or priest "dispenses" with a particular point of Church law under appropriate (grants "dispensation") circumstances at the behest of the supplicant. Of course, owing to the fallen nature of all human beings, the same type of thing can happen in the Orthodox Church with the practice of oikonomia (who can forget Jackie Kennedy Onassis's "Greek Orthodox" wedding?) but, in its proper understanding, oikonomia is always practiced with the intention of furthering God's Plan of Salvation. Thus, a soldier going to war may be permitted to marry during Great Lent when all such festivities are usually forbidden. Likewise, a guest may eat meat on a Friday (a violation of the rules of fasting) in order to avoid the greater fault of offending his host. However, it must be absolutely understood that oikonomia can never permit, excuse or justify the commission of a sin. If a bishop or priest does so, he has exceeded his authority and fallen into sin. December 22: America's OXI Day! "NUTS!"

In December 1944, the German army launched the surprise attack that became the Battle of the Bulge. Major General Maxwell D. Taylor, commander of the 101st Airborne Division, was attending a staff conference in the United States at the time. During Taylor's absence, McAuliffe commanded the 101st and its attached troops. At Bastogne, the 101st was besieged by a far larger force of Germans under the command of General Heinrich Freiherr von Lüttwitz.

On December 22, 1944, von Lüttwitz dispatched a party, consisting of a major, a lieutenant, and two enlisted men under a flag of truce to deliver an ultimatum. Entering the American lines southeast of Bastogne (occupied by Company F, 2nd Battalion, 327th Glider Infantry), the German party delivered the following to Gen. McAuliffe:

To the U.S.A. Commander of the encircled town of Bastogne.

The fortune of war is changing. This time the U.S.A. forces in and near Bastogne have been encircled by strong German armored units. More German armored units have crossed the river Our near Ortheuville, have taken Marche and reached St. Hubert by passing through Hompre-Sibret-Tillet. Libramont is in German hands.

There is only one possibility to save the encircled U.S.A. troops from total annihilation: that is the honorable surrender of the encircled town. In order to think it over a term of two hours will be granted beginning with the presentation of this note.

If this proposal should be rejected one German Artillery Corps and six heavy A. A. Battalions are ready to annihilate the U.S.A. troops in and near Bastogne. The order for firing will be given immediately after this two hours term.

All the serious civilian losses caused by this artillery fire would not correspond with the well-known American humanity.

The German Commander.

Brigadier General Anthony McAuliffe and his staff gathered inside Bastogne's Heintz Barracks for Christmas dinner December 25th, 1944. This military barracks served as the Division Main Command Post during the siege of Bastogne, Belgium during World War II.

According to those present when McAuliffe received the German message, he read it, crumpled it into a ball, threw it in a wastepaper basket, and muttered, "Aw, nuts". The officers in McAuliffe's command post were trying to find suitable language for an official reply when Lt. Col. Harry Kinnard suggested that McAuliffe's first response summed up the situation pretty well, and the others agreed. The official reply was typed and delivered by Colonel Joseph Harper, commanding the 327th Glider Infantry, to the German delegation. It was as follows:



To the German Commander.

NUTS!

The American Commander.

The German major appeared confused and asked Harper what the message meant. Harper said, "In plain English? Go to hell." The choice of "Nuts!" rather than something earthier was typical for McAuliffe. Vincent Vicari, his personal aide at the time, recalled that "General Mac was the only general I ever knew who did not use profane language. 'Nuts' was part of his normal vocabulary."

WOULD YOU LIKE TO LEARN ABOUT YOUR RELATIVE'S MILITARY SERVICE?

Family members who want to learn more about their relative's service may request their military records. Visit the National Archives website to learn the basics. Many requests can be filed electronically; be sure to have a Social Security number, service number, dates of service and other basic information at the ready.

Some service members were entitled to honors and awards that came after the recipients took off their uniform. Some examples include:

- The Silver Star didn't exist as a medal until 1932. Prior to 1932, distinguished service members received "Citation Stars" from their commanding general to denote their accomplishments. Those awards are upgradable to Silver Stars.
- Soldiers who earned the Combat Infantryman Badge or Combat Medic Badge during World War II are eligible for a Bronze Star Medal thanks to a directive from Gen. George C. Marshall...in 1947. Troops or next of kin can request issuance of the award and request their military records be updated.
- The Prisoner of War Medal established in 1985, targeted Vietnam War-era POWs but any service member who spent time
 in captivity as far back to WWI was retroactively eligible. Family members of deceased POWs may request the honor for
 their relative.

Generally, the next of kin may request military records of deceased family members. Congressional offices also may offer assistance when it comes to third party requests, those involving distant relatives, or others that aren't as easily processed through the NPRC's online portal.

The Church of the Nativity was being visited by thousands of people from all over the world while we were there. We cued up in airport security line fashion, but with no separation rails between rows. We cued in line for over two hours before arriving at the entrance to the cave where Jesus was born, a small price to pay to visit this Holiest of Holy sites!

Joseph and Mary travelled from Nazerath to Bethlehem (approximately 90miles) in order to register in Joseph's homeland for a census as required/directed by Harrod. The journey must have taken a week or longer with Mary approximately 9 months pregnant. She rode upon a donkey over rough terrain in the winter where temperatures regularly drop to the 30's, and rain was very common. The area around Bethlehem was mostly desert with very few trees so homes were often constructed of stone in front of caves, and the caves were used to secure livestock.

When Joseph and Mary arrived in Bethlehem there was no room at the Inn so they were allowed to stay in the cave used to secure livestock.

In 326 Constantine and his mother St. Helena commissioned a church to be built over the cave believed to be the site of Jesus' birth. Through the years the church was damaged/destroyed and reconstructed several times. The inside was adorned by Mosaics

dating back to the 600s, several of which are still in existence to this day.

Palestinian Authority but mainly controlled by the Greek Orthodox Church, the Armenian Orthodox Church, and the Catholic Church. The Greek Orthodox

Church occupies the front where there is an iconoclast, and it also controls the cave believed to be the birthplace of Jesus. It is visited by thousands of pilgrims and people from around the world each day.



Prosphora


Make ready, Bethlehem, Eden has been opened to all. Prepare Ephratha, for the Tree of Life has blossomed in the cave from the Virgin. Her womb was a spiritual paradise whence came the Divine Plant. If we eat it we shall live and not die like Adam. Christ is born to raise up the image that of old had fallen.

The physical gifts used in anamnesis at each Divine Liturgy are prepared by the priest behind the iconostasis before the Liturgy begins. There is a special table, called the table of oblation, where this preparation takes place. It is to the left of, or on the north side of, the altar.

Standing before this table, the priest elevates the prosphoron and says: You have redeemed us from the curse of the law by your precious Blood. By being nailed to the Cross and pierced with a lance, You have become a fountain of immortality for all people. Glory to You, our Savior. Blessed is our God, always, now and forever, and unto the ages of ages. Amen. The celebrant makes the sign of the cross over the seal of the prosphoron: In remembrance of our Lord and God and Savior, Jesus Christ. The prosphoron is cut around the Lamb (Christ Victor), right, left, top, and bottom: As a sheep He was led to the

slaughter. And as a spotless lamb dumb before its shearer, He opens not his mouth. In His humiliation, justice was denied Him. Who shall declare his generation? The Lamb is lifted from the loaf: For His life is raised up from the earth. The Lamb is placed upon the paten, and a deep crosswise cut is made on the back of the seal: Sacrificed is the Lamb of God, Who takes away the sin of the world, for the life of the world and for its salvation. The Lamb is turned seal up, and the lance pierces the side marked NI/Victor: One of the soldiers pierced His side with a lance and immediately there came out blood and water. And he who saw it bore witness, and his witness is true. Wine and water are poured into the chalice: Blessed is the union of your holy gifts, always, now and ever, and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

On the prosphoron on the Lamb's right is a portion for the Mother of God, which is cut and placed on the paten: *The Queen stood at your right hand, clothed in a garment wrought with gold and arrayed in diverse colors.* On the propshoron on the Lamb's left






At left is a prepared paten in which you can see the Lamb, Christ Victor, in the center. On His right is the large triangular portion for the Mother of God. On His left are the nine triangles. In this picture they were cut in one block, in other pictures they were cut individually and placed individually on the paten. In front of the lamb you see two piles of small portions of bread, one for the living and one for the dead. At St. Nicholas these represent all the members of the parish and all the orthodox people for whom we have requested prayer. We see assembled on the paten the Church of God with Christ at its center.

Pictured at right is a chalice, a paten or discos on which sits an asterisk, and a lance or spear, and a spoon. The chalice symbolizes the cup at the Last Supper that Jesus took and gave to his disciples, saying, "Drink from it all of you. For this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." The lance or spear represents the one that pierced Jesus' side when he was on the cross. The spoon represents the tongs with which one of the seraphim (which seraphim were surrounding the throne of God and singing, "Holy, holy, Lord Sabaoth, heaven and earth are filled with your glory") took a live coal from the altar and touched the coal to the lips of Isaiah, saying, "Behold, this has touched your lips. Your lawlessness is taken away, and your sin is cleansed." The paten symbolizes many things: the manger in Bethlehem, the Lord's deathbed, the heavens and the earth. The asterisk is in remembrance of the star of Bethlehem which led the Magi to the Christ child. It also represents the vault of the sky. The Asterisk has a distinctive role in



the Divine Liturgy. During the Anaphora prayer after "...even though thousands of archangels and tens of thousands of angels stand around You, the Cherubim and Seraphim, six-winged, many-eyed, soaring aloft upon their wings, singing the victory hymn, exclaiming, proclaiming, and saying..." there is a moment of silence in which the Asterisk is hammered onto the Paten and then the choir sings, "Holy, holy, holy, Lord Sabaoth. Heaven and earth are filled with your glory."



Pictured left is an aer and a set of veils. Once the paten is prepared, the priest sets the asterisk on the paten and covers it with a veil. The chalice is covered with another veil, and the aer, representing the burial shroud of our Lord, is placed over both. Each of these things is blessed with incense before being set in place.

To summarize, we started at the Table of Oblation, which signifies both the cave or stable in Bethlehem where Jesus was born and the place of Calvary where he was offered up to God. The Lamb is lifted up from the earth and placed on the paten, which is the Manger in Bethlehem, the Lord's deathbed, and the heavens and the earth. After His side is pierced, wine and water are poured into the Chalice, representing the blood and water that poured from His side. Then He is joined on the paten by the Theotokos, the saints and angels, the living and the dead

from creation to the present day. He is covered by the Star, which is covered by a veil, just as his face was covered by a veil after His death. The chalice also is covered by a veil, and both the chalice and the paten are covered by the Aer - the burial shroud - and all have been scented as with myrrh.

Christ in the flesh, rejoice with trembling and with joy; with trembling because of your sins, and with joy because of your hope....Who does not worship Him who is from the beginning? Who does not glorify Him who is also the End?...Let us not set ourselves against Him. —St. Gregory the Theologian

The Divine Liturgy, the sacrament of sacraments, both reveals God to us and makes us receptive to God. But first we must make ready and prepare, that the God who commanded light to shine out of darkness may shine in our hearts and that we may not be destroyed in unpreparedness. For the place of reconciliation where we meet our Lord is both the Cross and the Mercy Seat, a place of trembling and of joy.

A blessed Nativity season of preparation and καλά Χριστούγεννα (Merry Christmas) to all.



- 25. Be faithful in little things.

- 30. Be cheerful.
- 31. Be simple, hidden, quiet and small.
- 32. Never bring attention to yourself.
- 33. Listen when people talk to you.
- 34. Be awake and attentive, fully present where you are.
- 35. Think and talk about things no more than necessary.

- 36. Speak simply, clearly, firmly, directly.
- 37. Flee imagination, fantasy, analysis, figuring things out.
- 38. Flee carnal, sexual things at their first appearance.

On line Donations now possible

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!


