


The Gift of Christmas

When her son showed her the essay he had written, she did not see any mention whatsoever about Jesus or His Birth. So she asked her son why he



In Stillness and Silence: Reflecting on the Nativity of Christ

The following is an excerpt of an article written by Fr. Timothy Pavlatos, assistant priest at St. John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church in Beaverton, OR, in 2016.

The second week of December brought a rare snowstorm to the Northwest. Seeing my backyard blanketed in white was a bit nostalgic for me. It takes me back to my childhood in the Midwest...later that evening after the sun had set, I looked out into the backyard and saw that it was luminous. There was just enough moonlight reflecting off the snow to create a beautiful winter scene.

As I stepped outside, I noticed that it had started to snow again. Taking in the moment, I realized how quiet it was. Unlike the rain, which creates the sound of pitter-patter when it strikes the earth, snow falls in complete silence.

This moment presented an experience that stood in stark contrast to earlier in the day when I was rushing around running errands, shopping, returning e-mails, meeting with people, and getting things ready for a long week. After a minute or two, though, my thoughts returned to the silent snow fall—gentle and peaceful.

In that instant, I turned to reflect on the Nativity of Christ and the Mother of God resting in a cave, waiting to give birth. In the cave all alone, she delivered the Savior of the world without travail, without pain, without any suffering whatsoever. I imagined that during that miraculous birth all of creation stood still and silent. There was no commotion, unlike delivery rooms today. All of creation remained motionless and silent when the Christ child passed through his Mother and entered the world that He created.

And I wonder: When we think of Christmas, do we think of the birth of Christ in this way? Do we allow our minds to go back in time and think about that awesome moment? Do we sit in stillness and awe and envision the birth of God in the flesh and a young mother giving birth without travail, and all of creation motionless, completely silent?

Amid the mayhem of the season—shopping, long lines, and traffic to name a few—let's give ourselves the opportunity to be still and wonder at the awesomeness of the birth of Christ. Though there is noise around us, we can offer ourselves the chance to sit, be still, and reflect on that beautiful moment in the cave.

As I stood and watched the snow falling silently, I imagined the utter stillness of all creation on that day when the Virgin Mary gave birth. The visitors (shepherds, wise men, and midwives) came later, each bringing what they had to give; the shepherds their wonder, the wise men their gifts, the midwives their service.

What will we bring this year to the birth of Christ? What does our Lord possibly need? Gold, myrrh and frankincense have already been offered. What can we offer Him? In truth, there is only one thing that He asks from us—our hearts. Let us take a moment to pause, to set aside our daily cares and to meet Christ our Savior in the cave—in stillness and silence.

BUILDING COMMITTEE



CONSTRUCTION FUNDING APPROVED FOR NARTHEX

Full construction funding for the Narthex Renovation was approved at the last General Assembly on November 3rd, along with site security landscaping and other enhancements beyond the proposed Project 2020 scope, . A permit pre-application meeting is now set with the City of Tacoma on November 26th, the purpose of which is to sort out permitting questions, requirements and details. A formal permit design package will be submitted shortly thereafter. In the meantime, the present design has already been reviewed and approved by the Metropolitan's office, pending upon receiving a copy of the final permit package. Looking ahead, below are some important project scheduling benchmarks:

Building Permit Submittal: By or around December 1st. Estimated time for approval is about 3 months, and it is important to have this processed around the time of the bid solicitation.

Contractor Bid Solicitation and Bid Opening: This is about a four week process, scheduled to start around mid-February. Three to four vetted general contractors will be selected to bid the project, with a bid due date by or before March 15th, 2020. This will allow about 1-1/2 months after the bid opening to confirm and award a contract, and then allow the successful contractor to procure materials and mobilize before actual project ground breaking.

Onsite Project Construction: Starting April 27, 2020, 8 days after Pascha.

Substantial Completion: September 4, 2020, a little over 4 months after the start of field construction and 4 weeks before the 2020 Greek Festival. At this point an occupancy building permit should be obtained and the Narthex space available for general use. All that would be left are some touch-up items and administrative requirements to complete.

Final Completion: September 18, 2020, two weeks before the 2020 Greek Festival. By this time all outstanding items should be taken care of and the project officially completed.

PILGRIMAGE TO ST ANTHONY'S MONASTERY



From November 16 to 20, 26 members of St. Nicholas, St. Herman of Alaska (Port Townsend), and Holy Cross (Yakima) churches went on a pilgrimage with Father Seraphim to Saint Anthony's Greek Orthodox Monastery in the Sonoran Desert near Florence, Arizona.

This beautiful monastery is truly an oasis both spiritually and in nature. Among the monastery's pathways one can discover stately saguaro and other cacti and desert life, citrus and olive groves, date palms, a vineyard, and many flowers and plants which attract butterflies, bees, and a wide variety of birds. One can meditate on God's goodness and generous provision among the trees, sitting near one of several beautiful Spanish fountains, or read and pray quietly in one of the many beautiful chapels on the grounds. The chapels reflect the world-wide universality of our faith, each reflecting a different architectural style from classic Byzantine to styles from countries such as Greece, Russia, and Romania.

Our group had an immersive experience of following the monastic daily cycle of worship, prayer, contemplation, serving through work, and rest, capped off with daily reflections with Father Seraphim. A typical day started at 1:30 AM with Church services of the Midnight Hour, Orthos & Divine Liturgy. Afterwards (around 4 AM) there was a light breakfast, quiet hours and rest until 8 AM. At 8, most of the men were on a work detail under the obedience of Fr Minas. Most of the women also did various task as assigned by the monks. Lunch was at 11:30 AM. Not only was our body fed, but so was our nous with spiritual reading during the meal. At 12:30 PM we met with Fr Seraphim for reflections on our pilgrimage. At 3:30 PM, it was back to Church for the 9th hour & Vespers. Dinner was at 4:30 PM. Again both the body & nous were fed. Small Compline was after dinner. For the rest of the evening until quiet hours at 6:30 PM, we were free to either read, walk around the grounds or talk with other pilgrims. *Continued on page 26*

Massachusetts General Court directed the establishment of the first militia regiments in North America. A total of fifteen separate towns contributed as many companies with a combined strength of approximately 1,500 men to form three new regiments. A colonel commanded each regiment with assistance from a full-

BOOK OF HEBREWS—Hebrews 8



How in the Theology of St. Paul, are Jew and Gentile understood in relationship to one another; and furthermore, in the concept of grace, and the Law? A good source to connect and understand the relationship is Romans 11.

Reviewing Romans 11, one can perceive that God has given up on the Jews and now chosen the Gentiles to be His people. Romans 11:11 "I say then, have they stumbled that they should fall? Certainly not! But through their fall, to provoke them to jealousy, salvation has come to the Gentiles."

St. Paul is leading to show the inexplicable divine wisdom of God, to play the Gentiles off the Jews for the salvation of both. Romans 11:22-24 "Therefore consider the goodness and severity of God: on those who fell, severity; but toward you, goodness, if you continue in His goodness. Otherwise you also will be cut off. And they also, if they do not continue in unbelief, will be grafted in, for God is able to graft them in again. For if you were cut out of the olive tree which is wild by nature, and were grafted contrary to nature into a cultivated olive tree, how much more will these, who are natural branches, be grated into their own olive tree?

But, as we continue in Romans, that we see He has not turned in back on the Jews. God is not concerned with ethnicity or titles, He is concentrating on a relationship with those who, through faith and belief, come to Him with open hearts.



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Looking at the definition of "Gentiles" we see the term "the swarm". This indicates congestion, confusion, no order, no purpose, no identity, no personhood and massiveness from the point of view from Scripture. Seeing ourselves through the eyes of the Jewish believers coming from the understanding that you are a member of the race that God has covenanted with, given a Law to, given a Temple to worship Him, given a very clear identification as a member of a specific group of people that He has called out from among "the swarms" and these facts have been reinforced throughout time; it is unsettling to learn that those who are "stumbling" in Romans 11:11 are not the Gentiles, but the Jewish people. To learn that the swarms are now welcomed into God's Covenant can be seen as heresy to the Jews.



Most of us have a moment when we feel that we are the only person in existence, and everyone else we come in contact with are similar to actors in a play. "I" am me and everyone else is simply "you". We all have to deal with the similar and dissimilar when comprehending another individual. Christ unites us through His love for all of us, totally aware that each one of us has true existence simultaneously, unique from each other. Christ breaks through the barrier, without losing His own identity, that separates us and gives life to each one of us who are dying because of Adam and Eve's fall. Those who are redeemed in Christ can now love as Christ allowing them to cross that barrier. God is love which is the defining characteristic of love. The Patristic definition of what it is to be a created being is that we want to perpetuate our existence and to avoid the interruption of that existence. On the basis of Adam, whose life was utterly dependant on his unceasing communion with God, turned away from the source of his life and turned to himself as the source of his life and as a result he does not have independent existence. God fuels man's existence and Adam interrupted that source of his existence. The reason to love one another is because "your" existence depends on "my" existence and on down the line. The very essence of nature is to come together.

St. Paul comes right out with the main point of what he is saying in **Hebrews 8:1-2** "Now this is the main point of the things we are saying: we have such a High Priest, Who is seated at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in the heavens, a Minister of the sanctuary and of the true tabernacle which the Lord erected, and not man."

God already had a priest serving Him in Jerusalem to whom Abraham gives tithes and offerings, before Moses is given the Law by God and appoints Aaron as High Priest (as per God's instructions) hundreds of years later. The Hebrews are a people of a priestly covenant before the Law is given by God. The Jewish people have forgotten this over thousands of years and consider themselves people of The Law. The original covenant that God made with Abraham was a "one-party" agreement. The strength of the covenant is built on God's faithfulness alone, otherwise the covenant would be breakable. A covenant is only as strong as the commitment of both parties.

St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church Pro-Life Ministry

I just wanted to share some comments and actions that were made during the 40 Days for Life Vigils that St. Nicholas Pro-Life Ministry participated in from September 25 – October 30, 2019 at the Cedar River Abortuary.

- a woman confronted us with "what do YOU do for women who are pregnant?" We were in the process of answering, but she heard "prays" and took off, saying her 2 abortions were the best decisions she ever made.
- a woman complained that it is legal we can love it or leave it
- a young woman stopped to give us a donation. We thanked her, but said that we do not take donations
- a self proclaimed pagan man stopped his car to talk with us. He was pro-choice, but took a pro-life brochure. We talked about rape, over population, etc. He said that he respects what we do, in that we are peaceful and prayerful in witnessing for our beliefs. He said that he was raised Christian. At the end of the conversation, I told him not to give up on God, God had not given up on him
- we had a young woman stop to chat. She thought that we needed more sex education. We had a positive interaction and talk
- a young woman wanted to share that her life has been difficult 17 foster homes, etc. She said "some lives want to be aborted." We shared about the value of every life and how God can bring good out of all things. She was very respectful, and thanked me for my sharing
- a man came to pray with us and shared that, many years before legalized abortion, his mother has been advised to have a "therapeutic" abortion with him due to suspected health problems. His mother refused, praying and trusting in God, and he was born healthy.
- Usually, I can't understand a word anyone yells, good or bad, but the construction has lightened traffic so this time I heard. So, I said to my prayer partners, "Hey, rejoice, we got persecuted for Jesus!" I said we're supposed to get up one step higher in heaven, lol! Later, a nice man in a nice pickup truck slowed down to say "Thank you for what you do." Then later, a woman slowed down next to us and asked if we were against abortion to which I replied, "We're Pro-Life." I wasn't sure if she was going to be for or against us, but then she started in on how we need to get a life. I said, "Thank you, I have a life. Excuse me, we're praying," and we went back to the Stations of the Cross. She said something about rape, and we continued praying. I didn't want to get into shouting back and forth since she was in her car and would be holding up traffic and obviously wasn't interested in dialogue. When she saw she wasn't going to get the reaction she wanted, she drove off annoyed. I always think later what I wish I would have said, "Thanks be to God, I have a life. Unfortunately, the babies here are not given that opportunity."
- As we were finishing a song, a young woman stopped and waited to speak to us. She asked why we were there. We explained this building behind her was a late term abortion clinic, and we were here to pray that the mothers would have a change of heart and keep their babies. She had a respectful dialog with us for 30 minutes. She began by asking what brought each of us there. One of us shared that she was there because she had had an abortion, and she wanted to spare other women that regret and pain. The woman thanked her for sharing that. Another shared that she was there because she has a condition that makes it so that she cannot have children. She talked about how she would never feel the kick of a child in her womb and how it particularly pained her that these women did not understand this great gift that they have been given and how upsetting it is to see that life and great gift thrown away when she would so treasure that experience and gift. I shared that when I was a child my parents took care of foster babies until they were adopted, but after Washington legalized abortion there were no more babies and all of these families waiting to adopt. I added that my sister was adopted. She asked us how we defined love. I said love is sacrifice and that love is willing the good of the other. I don't think she'd heard that response before. She apparently asks this question of people frequently. She talked about love being a combination of joy and fascination with what is different about the other person. took that opportunity to say that we are each unique and unrepeatable and that is what is so sad about a child being aborted. The world will never know that unique, unrepeatable person and their contributions, and that disabled people are often targeted for abortion (she has a hearing disability herself). At the very end she said she was fundamentally against what we stood for. We shared names at the end, and she said, "See you around Tacoma." I thought when we were talking to her that she might be somewhat on the fence, but that wasn't the case.

It's about presents. Christmas really is about presents.

It's about a contest held to find the most caring child. The winner was a four-year-old boy whose next door neighbor was an elderly gentleman who had recently lost his wife. Upon seeing the man cry, the little boy went into the gentleman's yard, climbed onto his lap, and just sat there. When his mother asked the little boy what he had said to the neighbor, the little boy said, "Nothing... I just helped him cry." — The gift of consolation.

It's about presents. Christmas really is about presents.

It's about a four-year-old who went to the pediatrician for a check up. As the doctor looked down her ears with an otoscope, he asked, "Do you think I'll find Big Bird in here?" The little girl stayed silent. Next, the doctor took a tongue depressor and looked down her throat. He asked, "Do you think I'll find the Cookie Monster down there?" Again, the little girl was silent. Then the doctor put a stethoscope to her chest. As he listened to her heartbeat, he asked, "Do you think I'll hear Barney in here?" Oh no!", the little girl replied. "Jesus is in my heart." — The gift of faith.

It's about presents. Christmas really is about presents.

It's about God, who loved each one of us so much that he gave us his only begotten Son, Jesus Christ so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. — The ultimate gift.

It's about presents. Christmas really is about presents; but it's not about the presents we give that we bought at the local Toys – R – Us, or the local department store. It's not about the giving of money; Christmas is not about a holiday season.

Rather, Christmas is about the gift of giving of ourselves. Giving of our time and talents so that we might touch the life of another. And the reason why we give of ourselves is because we commemorate the gift God gave us — His Son.

So what gift we will give this Christmas? But not only this Christmas, but also every day of the year. Will it be the gift of love by telling our family and friends how special they are to us? The gift of consolation by remembering those who have no one else to remember them; by visiting those who have no one to visit them? Bringing the gift of laughter to those who are in sorrow; imparting the gift of faith, by keeping Jesus Christ as the focus of our Christmas.

Therefore, how we can give of ourselves is perhaps summarized best in the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi who said:

O Lord, make us instruments of your peace.

Where there is hatred, let us sow love.

Where there is injury, pardon,

Where there is doubt, faith,

Where there is despair, hope,

Where there is darkness, light,

And where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled, as to console;

To be understood, as to understand;

To be loved, as to love;

For it is in giving that we receive—

It is in pardoning that we are pardoned;

And it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Amen

On line Donations now possible

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

- 1) On a computer or mobile device, go to the Church's website www.stnicholastacoma.org
- Select the (BOLLOW) button. This takes you to the Church's donate page!
- Select the gold colored donate DONATE button at the bottom of the page.
- You will now be taken to the page to make your donation. Simply complete the form.
- 5) From the contributions email you receive, select the link to setup your own Aplos account. An account history page will be available. The first tab will show only on-line donations, the second tab allows accounting for recurring donations, and the third is for contribution statements listing on-line, check, and cash donations.




