

Elder Porphyrios once spoke about teenagers and their struggles in the Church life: "Boys and girls come to me sometimes. Those poor children, and what haven't they done. They have committed every sin of the flesh, but I love them." The Elder did not justify the actions of the youth, which he characterized as carnal sins, but at the same time he loved them as precious souls "for whom Christ died". By his love he attracted them like a magnet and gradually they were healed of their worship of the flesh. This patristic attitude of the Elder was misunderstood by conservative puritans, who mourned, and some irresponsible progressives, who rejoiced, for the same reason: that supposedly the Elder "tolerated" carnal sins. They did not understand that sin cannot be combated with an intolerant condemnation of the sinner, nor through guilty legalism of the fall. The Elder effectively fought sin by loving the sinner and helping them become aware of their responsibility for their fall, and the possibility in Christ of them

### **Returning to Church**

Parishioners are once again attending services in person at St. Nicholas and able to receive Holy Communion. - 2. You can simply click <u>here</u>. If there is a service underway, press the button. You will see and hear the service.
- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the *YouTube* search bar, type; St Nicholas Tacoma

# THIS PICTURE SHOULD LOOK MUCH DIFFERENT NEXT MONTH

Narthex Renovation work during the past month of June has mainly focused on concrete work at the replaced exterior main entrance. While the area it entails is small, its new foundations, slabs and steps are cut up, requiring multiple concrete set-ups and pours, all of which takes time. But it is work that must be done before the much more noticeable construction above the new foundations can start.

Building framing and structural steel support work should be starting around the time this issue of the Messenger comes out, with roofing and other weather enclosure work following. While new brick work may not be in next month's Messenger's photo, it should be starting around that time, and regardless, the overall new building shape and form will be much more apparent by then. To date the project schedule is still on track for a mid-September completion, as Rush Commercial Construction, the general contractor, has been keeping on top of things.

The first picture to the left shows an existing underground water line that had to be removed and replaced to a different location as it was in the way of new entry footings—an unknown existing condition that had to be taken care of after it was exposed. So far, we've been fortunate that unknown existing conditions that have emerged have been limited and relatively easy to fix.


The second photo shows some of the cut-up nature of the new exterior main entrance. The concrete foundation walls shown and footings below required two separate concrete pours. New steps to the left of the foundation wall and slabs above will require at least two more separate sequences of forming, set-up and pours.

The bottom two photos show a previous dip or sink hole at the South 16th Street entrance to the church parking lot that has been cut out, filled, leveled, and paved over. New landscaping along 16th Street and the rest of the church site perimeter is scheduled to take place in August.

Above is a partial floor plan of the upper church level. The shaded area represents the Narthex construction zone that will be off-limits to the Parish for most of the project. Existing wall openings at both 1) between the stairwell area and Narthex construction zone, and 2) between the Narthex and Upper Hall corridor, each shown as thick blue lines with a door opening, have been temporarily framed over and boarded up. This is in the interest of safety and providing as much protection as feasible to the church, which for the time being will deny the Parish access through the construction zone.

What this means for now is that for one to get from the Lower Hall or Sanctuary to the Upper Hall and vice versa, they will have to do so from outside the building rather than inside through the Narthex construction zone. This will be a temporary inconvenience until around the second half of July, when the new exterior wall and roof structure over the front Narthex area should be far enough along to act as its own additional protection layer to outside elements.

When that point is reached, a temporary passage will be put in place at the end of each working shift, as depicted in dashed blue lines in the above plan, which will allow Parish members access from the interior stairwell areas to the Upper Hall and vice versa during non-working hours. Regardless, the Lower Hall will remain open at all times, and stairwell passage to the Sanctuary will be accessible as well, except when the contractor is doing finish work in that area.



**July 4, 1776 Independence Day. 245 years but still going strong!** On this day it seems always appropriate to recognize the service of Sergeant Richard Motz who served with the 4th Company, 7th Battalion, of the Pennsylvania Militia. He served with General George Washington and was even at the crossing of the Delaware River on Christmas Day, and participated in the victorious attack on the Hessian troops in Trenton, New Jersey. Our own, Richard Motz, Heidi Motz's husband, is a direct descendant of Richard Motz who served and fought in our war for independence!

### July 6, 1943 USS Helena (CL-50) sunk in

**Kula Bay.** The USS Helena was a Brooklyn –Class light cruiser built for the United States Navy in the late 1930s. It was launched in 1939 and after two years of peacetime training she found herself moored in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii along with many other ships on December 7th, 1941. That morning the Japanese Navy conducted a sneak attack on American forces located on



Oahu and in Pearl Harbor, and the USS Helena was one of many ships torpedoed, bombed, and strafed by Japanese aircraft.

During the attack the crew of the Helena fought valiantly that day! They fired 375 shells from her 5-inch guns, around 3000 rounds from her 1.1 inch guns, and about 5000 rounds from her .50-caliber guns. Additionally, the ship was credited with shooting down six Japanese aircraft, out of a total of twenty-nine downed in the raid. Although damage to the Helena was significant it was able to be repaired and modernized in early 1942, and set sail to take the fight back to the Japanese.

The Helena participated in the Guadalcanal campaign and took part in two major night battles with Japanese vessels in October and November of 1942. On October 11-12, with the help of the Helena's rapid-fire 6-inch battery the Navy was able to sink a Japanese heavy cruiser and a destroyer. On 13 November, a similar defeat was imposed on the Japanese Navy when once again, Helena's fast shooting helped to overwhelm a Japanese task force that included two fast battleships, one of which was disabled and sunk the next day. Helena sank a destroyer and damaged several others in the action while emerging relatively unscathed.

Following the American victory on Guadalcanal in early 1943, Helena took part in a series of preparatory attacks on New Georgia that culminated with an amphibious assault in the Kula Gulf on 5 July. The next night while attempting to intercept a Japanese reinforcement squadron, Helena was torpedoed and sunk in the Battle of Kula Gulf. Two Japanese destroyers simultaneously fired a salvo of eight torpedoes and three torpedoes struck the Helena on the port side. The first torpedo caused a major explosion that may have been the result of a magazine detonation. Despite the damage, the aft guns continued to fire and the ship had not been fatally damaged. Two minutes after the first torpedo, the second and third torpe-

does struck in quick succession and flooding began to occur. The Commander gave the order to abandon ship. Out of the ship's crew of almost 1200 men, 168 were killed either during the battle, or while the men were adrift. Among those killed were Machinists Mate Johnny Bennak, Deoborah Talbot's uncle, and his friend George Humphrey, shown in the picture to the right.

**July 27, 1953 Korean War ends.** The Korean War began in June 1950 when North Korea invaded South Korea. The war lasted three years and initially the North Korean forces pushed the South Korean and allied forces to the southern most point of the peninsula known as the Pusan Perimeter. When the war was becoming desperate for the allies, GEN MacArther conducted a seaborne invasion at Inchon which at the time was significantly behind North Korean lines. This forced the North Korean Army to retreat back into North Korea, where the allies then pushed them back to the Yellow River, the border between North Korea and China. China at that point attacked into North Korea catching the allies by surprise, and pushed the allies back to approximately the original borders. When the armistice was signed in July 1953, the countries involved agreed to a border that ran roughly along the 38th parallel. That armistice and border remain in effect today.

Many St. Nicholas family members and parishioners served in the armed forces during the Korean War. Their pictures are shown below but one that deserves special recognition was George Velias, a young man who at the time was a member of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church. George enlisted in the Army and served with the 1st Cavalry Division during much of the war. That Division was stationed in Korea when the North invaded and fought the withdrawal action back to the Pusan Perimeter. It then participated in the counter-attack that pushed the North Korean forces up to the Yellow River, and again in the withdrawal action that forced the allies back to the 38th parallel. Because the Division had fought in every action of the war since the very beginning, the 1st Cavalry Division was going to be pulled out of the front lines, and sent back to Japan as the Pacific Theatre Reserve. Up to that point, the Company to which George had been assigned had lost sixty-three men killed in action. Less than ten days before the Division was withdrawn K Company lost one more man, George Velias. Of the sixty-four men that were killed in K Company during the entire war, George Velias was the last man to die. **MAY HIS MEMORY BE ETERNALI**



being freed from it and guilt through repentance and forgiveness and the life in Christ. He wanted to guide them to a new life, and not trouble their soul with the past. The saint often advised his spiritual children that love, unity and cooperation of parents and good understanding between them and their children gives a sense of security and confidence to their children. Otherwise, the children become unsafe and insecure. Often the insecure children can lead to the "safety" of a gang and/or violent behavior as a reaction to a dysfunctional family. The behavior of the children is related to the situations they experienced in their family. The negative attitude of parents creates wounds in the hearts of the children and leaves scars of injury in their souls that they keep during their whole life. These psychological scars are affecting their behavior and their relationship with others, during the rest of their lives. In other words, the experiences the children carry from their childhood affect their lives and their behavior in relation to others (family, sexual relationship, friends). Children, Saint Porphyrios said, become older, educated, but do not really change. This is obvious even from the most minor events of their life.

### Spirit Filled Wisdom: Raising Christian Children

Blessed Elder Philotheos of Paros +1980

Parents must teach their children from their earliest days. They must teach them the fear of God, must cut their bad impulses and faults, and they must not fawn upon them or satisfy their bad desires or appetites. The small child is like the soft candle that you shape as you like, and which accepts whatever seal you put upon it.

The good Father Confessor's manner, the cheerfulness of his face, the fatherly affection with which he receives the sinner, the sweet language of his teaching, the courage which he gives to the shy, the consolation which he offers to those who have committed many sins and are in despair, citing the example of any who repented and were saved—all these are conducive to sincere repentance and confession of the sinner. It is to such spiritual fathers and physicians of the soul that the sinner ought to entrust the therapy of his soul.

Whatever letters you write on a clean sheet of paper will remain imprinted. In the same way, whatever the small child learns when he is small will remain imprinted until old age.

# ST. NICHOLAS BIBLE STUDY THE REVELATION

### Revelation 6: 4 th Seal and the Elements





Human relationship with God had come to a breaking point resulting in the use of one of the four "elements" to alleviate the situation, the Great Flood. God made a Covenant with man, promising never to destroy the earth by water and sealing this promise with the sign of the rainbow. The next element that will be used as a tool of destruction will be fire as written in St. Peter's 2<sup>nd</sup> Epistle.

**2 Peter 3:10** "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night, in which the heavens will pass away with a great noise, and the elements will melt with fervent heat; both the earth and the works that are in it will be burned up."

Greek text: "Ήξει δὲ ἦ ἡμέρα κυρίου ὡς κλέπτης ἐν νυκτὶ ἐν ἡ οἱ οὐρανοὶ ῥοιζηδὸν παρελεύσονται οτοιχεῖα δὲ καυσούμενα λυθήσονται, καὶ γῆ καὶ τὰ ἐν αὐτῆ ἔργα κατακαήσεται".

- 1) στοιχεῖα (pl.) στοιχεῖον (sing) (stoikeia & stoikeon): elements; any "first thing", letters of alphabet (the sounds); material causes of the universe; smallest particle or molecule of material or spiritual or energy. Άτομο (atomo): atom, basic unit of a chemical element.
- 2) καυσούμενα (kafsoumena): with fervent heat
- 3)  $\lambda u\theta \eta \sigma o v \tau \alpha I$  (verb future tense)  $\underline{\lambda \dot{\nu} \omega}$  (verb present tense) (lithisontai/leo): melt, loosen, unbind, untie, to solve, dissolve. The Greek word  $\underline{\lambda \dot{\nu} \omega}$  is used in the following verses from Revelation: **Revelation 5:2** "...loose its seals?" **Revelation 9:14** "...'Release the four angels...' ". Here's three scripture verses where the original Greek word is  $\lambda \dot{\nu} \omega$ , but the English translation has used three different words. The core concept is that things are held together by a higher power. The Lamb (Christ) has the power to "turn off" the attraction that held these things in place.

Explanation by our Greek Teacher, George Pirotis:

 $\lambda$ υθήσονται and  $\lambda$ ύω: In architecture & construction: designing & building something to withstand the elements. In chemistry: something that cannot be divided down to a smaller unit, brought down to the smallest molecule. George thinks that, in other words, everything would disappear and the earth would be like a desert with nothing.

Father Seraphim: The things that hold the elements together get "loosed" and return to their constituent parts. There is a core concept here when the Lamb takes the scroll and "looses" the seals. Things are held together by a type of power. When speaking of the elements (Revelation 5), the seals were held together and that someone, namely The Lamb, will have the power to turn off whatever that power of attraction is that keeps atoms together to form molecules. Λύω is the word. We can see this "breaking apart" in the world today. The division and separation of our country because of political, racial, religious and social differences. The separation of marriages, families and friends because of the same issues. What provides that peace of mind and sense of wellness hinges on everything being held together. Religion is based on a Latin word (religo) meaning: bind, tie, fasten, tether. Man has a distinct aversion to disintegration (integration: state of combination or process of combining into completeness and harmony; dis: apart, asunder, reversing force). Gravity didn't exist until God created it. There's this inexplicable force in the universe pulling things together. That's why the word "religion" was applied to the different faith expressions. There are four basic forces of nature: gravitational, electrical, magnetic and nuclear. They are all forces created by God and kept in place by God. As Orthodox theologians, we know that whatever togetherness we have is because of God's providence. Water cannot flow downhill without God's providence because He created gravity. Nothing comes together on its own, it comes together because God made it come together. Therefore, if things are breaking apart, it's because of our desire to be separated from one another and God. In His mercy, He is allowing us to experience what that means in a small way so that we will repent from our selfish and wicked ways and come back to Him and reintegrate. Approaching the strain that is going on in America, theologically, results in a far different thing than if you don't approach it theologically. Looking at it from a non-theological view, we think that everything is being held together on its own and when things start tearing and falling apart, we get anxious and panic. It's comforting to know that God is always in charge. We need to beseech Him to bring us back to our senses and to each other and back to Him. This is what we are doing during Great Lent. We're addressing our own spiritual breakdown first and then we can approach God, after Pascha, to restore our community and our society. In 2 Peter 3, he is not just talking about the physical elements, but by the basic principle that by God's providence He is keeping everything together and then will let everything collapse and then He will renew it. Without Christ's Incarnation, we would be just little particles of DNA code falling into the abyss. When God turns off the "electromagnet" which is what we are calling the end of history, which is what the point of the Book of Revelation is, there is something that recapitulates everything. We don't just drop into the never-ending abyss. There is so much hope and there is no reason to be anxious. No matter how much things break down, the Book of Revelation is pushing us to go to the final conclusion of everything breaking down to the ultimate end result which is entropy. We are being given a picture of a rescue and a complete re-fashioning and recapitulation for glory.

Dr. Ingrid Chamales: Don't think of the delusion of these elements as destruction because matter that is created by God is not destroyed – it is still there. It's not in its original form, it's loosened but still there.


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St. Peter is describing, in his second Epistle, the effect of the Lord's Coming on the elements, themselves. We can look at different aspects, in light of the opening of the Seals, and as we progress into Chapter 8 and the sequence of Antichrist and the other prophecies, that's leading up to Second Coming of Christ and everything changing; there is one part of that has to do with the elements of creation. The other part has to do with individual human beings. We want to know how to prepare for this and be a good and faithful servant. We need to know what to do and what not to do with our bodies, i.e., cremation, desecration, fornication, in light of the question of salvation. These anthropologic concerns deal with the outcome of human beings. The other side of this has to do with the elements of creation. As we remember from Genesis, the elements of creation came first: the light, the waters above the firmament, the earth, the heavens, the sea and all the living creatures. If St. Peter's passage is understood incorrectly, and we look at the Revelation text through that lens, we can conclude that everything in this world will burn up and be gone, including our bodies. This results in the question of cremation. At the end of the day, people's vision of the created elements will result in what they decide to do with their body when they die or what to do with your body when you die or how they will treat the material creation while they are still alive or how they will treat their body while they are still alive. All of these questions have real import because, for example, if we believe that all the elements of creation are ultimately meaningless because they will eventually get burned up, then we would feel perfectly free to pollute our rivers and streams and our bodies through immoral living and feel free to destroy our bodies when we die. Our reasoning would be that nothing that is currently in existence will exist after Christ comes again. That's the Christian version of the elements disappearing. That theology of the Creation, where basically the Kingdom of Heaven has no materiality. That kind of mindset leads to a couple of things. One leads to a degraded sense of the importance of the event of Christ's Second Coming, the event to which all human history is drawing. It's common to hear after a loved one's death, "but it's okay because they're in the Kingdom of Heaven". If this is true, what is the role of the body which was just buried? It's relatively inconsequential. From the viewpoint of the departed one, what is the conclusion about the rest of creation and the rest of history that is unfolding after death? Inconsequential! It gives a message to those left behind that ultimately their bodies are a prison, human history doesn't matter and creation doesn't matter. That theological distortion leads to its mirror image of human fulfillment on this side where no one has continuity of existence and all that matters is "right now". You see the subtraction of the transcendent view of creation and life as it's unfolding in the body. It results in the scary misery of Marxism, and the like, that are characterized above all by their utter denial of transcendence in human life. Marxism is the daughter of a Christian heresy that denies the role of continuity of creation and the body after the resurrection. Our vision of the body and the created elements are crucial because it is what provides the continuity of our vision of transcendence. Everything we see and experience in our daily lives matters because there is something transcendent shining through them of eternal significance. If we believe that a loved one who passes goes to live with Christ in Heaven, why is Christ's Second Coming of any importance? His Second Coming is to judge the living and the dead. We have already made ourselves the judge of those who have departed. Charles Manson has to be in hell because we are aware of the atrocities he committed in this life. Mother Teresa has to be in Heaven because of the wonderful things she did in this life. We do not know what is in anyone's heart or what their last thoughts were before they left this life. Christ is the only one who has the right to be the Judge of the living and the dead. When you hear someone say "they are in a better place", "they have no worries nor cares anymore", it's what is not said that's disturbing, which is the loss of the urgency of Christ's Second Coming, when hu-

man history is fulfilled. The core vision of the Church is eschatological—"maranatha" - Come Lord Jesus. The early Church was very focused on this and lived in a constant tension.

The Book of Revelation is presenting God's interaction with human history in a sequential way. We shouldn't look at history unfolding around us with fear (like Coronavirus, One World Government, Marxism), or be indifferent and view it as inconsequential. Neither of these is the vision of the Church. We're called to live in that tension as the early Church did because it gives us that sense of urgency. Part of that, in our exploration of the elements, has to do with what happens to the material creation when Christ comes again. What happens to our bodies when He comes again? What happens to the Puget Sound when He comes again? What happens to our houses when He comes again? What happens to Old Tacoma Cemetery when He comes again? All of these things have relevance when He comes again, and therefore, how we treat all of these things has significance when history is fulfilled.

# Why don't pro-life and disability rights groups work together more often?

When I read about disability rights advocates who accept or silently condone abortion, or when I look at pro-life materials and find almost nothing on the disabled, I cringe. Both disability rights and pro-life groups adhere to the same basic principle—that humans have inherent dignity based on who they are, not what they can do—yet they too often disagree.

The two groups should be wayfarers on a common path. I say this not only because of their common principles but also based on my own experience. A few years ago, I was diagnosed with autism while in my 30s, finally understanding why I had struggled in certain areas. Reading up on the topic, I realized that one challenge for adults with autism is overcoming discrimination. Autistics are thus part of the disability rights community, working to protect their rights under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

But abortion (and even euthanasia) is becoming more targeted toward the disabled. And this is the greatest way the disabled can be discriminated against. Killing someone due to a disability is akin to participating in an attempt to erase the disabled community. Not only is this far worse than, say, refusing to build a wheelchair ramp or to provide signage for the sight-impaired, it works toward removing the disabled community from society's consciousness and thus makes it more difficult to build support for disabled rights.

For example, those diagnosed with Down syndrome prenatally are aborted at alarming rates. In the United States, two-thirds of such babies are killed in the womb. That may seem high, but it is low among developed countries: England aborts 77 percent of these babies, Denmark 90 percent and Iceland 98 percent.

Down syndrome is easy to diagnose, as it is an extra chromosome. However, soon we will be able to detect the probabilities of many other conditions in utero. A company called Genomic Prediction already offers tests for "mental disability" among in vitro fertilization embryos, and it claims that it can detect other intelligence "outliers." It is easy to imagine that this technology could lead to parents wanting to "discard"—what a euphemism for kill—those who are predicted to have low I.Q. scores. Also, a current study is investigating the genes of 50,000 families to discover autism genetics, and I can imagine this leading to the search for a prenatal autism test.

Referring to selective abortions in these conditions, Pope Francis stated last year, "We do the same as the Nazis to maintain the purity of the race, but with white gloves."

When Jeff Sessions was nominated as U.S. attorney general in 2017, eight disability rights organizations signed a letter from more than 200 groups opposing his nomination, which is understandable given his record on disabilities. However, the same letter criticized Mr. Sessions for opposing "women's access to reproductive health services" (understood to be a reference to access to abortion, especially given that the letter's signatories included NARAL Pro-Choice America) and for voting to defund the abortion provider Planned Parenthood. It also criticized him for voting against a bill to "fix the Hobby Lobby decision" by requiring all employers to provide abortifacient birth control to employees.

At least one disability rights group, the Autistic Self Advocacy Network, went further and mentioned Sessions' opposition to "reproductive rights" in one of their statements against him. I can understand looking at how he treated marginalized groups, but aren't the unborn one of the most marginalized populations? Aren't abortions often specifically targeted at disabled infants?

Likewise, the Center for Public Representation, another disability rights group, includes the Center for Reproductive Rights on its list of disability rights organizations. And many disability rights organizations ask people to sign on to the United Nations Convention on Rights of Persons with Disabilities, but that convention asks for "reproductive health" programs to be provided to persons with disabilities (and subsequent statements from U.N. officials make it clear this phrase refers to access to abortion).



In recent years, the pro-life movement has put a lot of effort into keeping alive Down syndrome babies, but we need to highlight other disabilities. For the last four years I have gone through the whole March for Life looking for the best signs to make this point but have found few. Maybe next year, I will carry a "Pro-Life Autistic" sign. I have also looked through the archives of the top pro-life news sites and organizations for references to the Americans with Disabilities Act and the rights of the disabled, but except for cases of the disabled being euthanized, they are almost non-existent. Given that the devaluing of the disabled will likely lead to selective abortions, focusing on how to improve our lives needs to be a priority if we want to help people choose life. Devoting more attention to the rights of the disabled would also help counter the argument that pro-life groups are merely "pro-birth."

I am focusing here on official organizations in both the pro-life and disability rights movements that do not always recognize their common ground, but I have often found individual activists to be even less understanding. Unfortunately, the alignment of each of these movements with opposing political parties (pro-life with the Republicans, disability rights with the Democrats) does not help us work together.

We are seeing some hope with groups like the human rights group Rehumanize International, which last year published a blog post about a pro-life activist's love for her blind brother. Rehumanize has consistently promoted a whole-life vision, but they are only a small group in the grand scheme of pro-life and disability rights activism.

The pro-life and disability-rights movements have the same basic principle of inherent human dignity. Right now, there are many cases where their fights overlap: where the disabled are threatened with abortion or assisted suicide or euthanasia. However, we have only worked together in a limited way. I hope that both movements improve their outreach to each other—for example, by making an effort to include disability rights groups in the March for Life—so that we can work together more coherently going forward.



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
Elin, Christopher and Pastor Paul Tyler – Christopher's 33rd birthday

I met a family in Fairbanks, Alaska, who became very dear to my heart: Pastor Paul Tyler, his wife, Elin, and son, Christopher. I was in the choir at Fairbanks Lutheran Church in Fairbanks, where Paul Tyler was pastor, and I had an unrestricted view of Elin and Christopher during each service. I'm ashamed to admit that the first time I saw them, I felt sorry for Elin and Paul for having been burdened with a severely mentally disabled child. Over the next couple of years, God helped me to see the truth as I sat and sang in the choir loft. I never saw Christopher unhappy, angry, bitter, anxious, unkind or unloved. His mother would wrap her arms around him and he would lay his head on her shoulder quite often during a Church service. I've never felt more welcomed than when Christopher would smile (wide-mouthed as in the photo above) and frantically wave his hand in greeting me when I came into the Church. I don't remember exactly when God enlightened me with the knowledge that Christopher and his family weren't the ones to be pitied, but it is us who live in ignorance and prejudice who are to be pitied. Coming to the Orthodox Church and being involved with the Pro-Life Ministry and the Bible Study Ministry, here at St. Nicholas; I have learned that just because someone has a learning and/or communicative disability doesn't mean they are not in communion with God. Someone who has a disability isn't imperfect or "something" to be eliminated.





#### **LECHEM-ARTOS-BREAD**

#### Following the Word through Scripture

We are beginning the book of Numbers, the fourth book of the Pentateuch, Pentateuch referring to the five books of Moses which are the first five books of the Bible. To review:

In Genesis we learned about the beginning of the history of man and the beginning of the history of Israel. In Genesis—or in the beginning—the word bread first appears after Adam and Eve sin and is associated with effort on our part (Genesis 3:19). And then the very next time we find the word bread, it is being brought out with wine as a Eucharist by Melchizedek, the King of Salem (King of Peace) and Priest of the Most High God (Genesis 14:18). As we continued through Genesis we saw bread as an offering of hospitality, as a provision sustaining life (one of the most important provisions for life), as a peace offering, as a blessing, and once (Genesis 37:25) being eaten by Joseph's brothers after they had conspired to kill him, and during which meal they instead sold him to the Ishmaelite's headed down to Egypt.

In Exodus we followed the Israelites in their journey out of Egypt and learned about God's covenant with Israel and the building of the tabernacle. In Exodus we go from unleavened bread, to having no bread, to having manna raining down like dew from heaven, to unleavened bread that seems to become leavened bread during consecration of priests, and arrive at bread being placed on the table of offering just outside the veil on the north side of the tabernacle of testimony, a special bread that is to always be there in the presence of God.

In Leviticus, the first ever book of worship, for the first time we come across bread that is specifically identified as leavened bread. We learn about bread as an offering to God and about bread as the gift of God to His creation.

This brings us to Numbers. The Children are still in the Sinai Desert with Moses, and the tabernacle has been set up. The first thing recorded in Numbers is a census (hence the name of the book). First there is a census of the men twenty years old and above who can form an army. The total number from all the tribes except Levi was 603,550. This number does not include younger men, or females of any age. Then there is a census of the tribe of Levi, who are to serve in and protect the tabernacle, to break it down and move it when the people move, and to set it up again. The total number of Levite males one month and older was 22,000, but the number of men twenty-five to fifty years of age who could do the work was 8,500. Every tribe was assigned its place in the camp, on the east side, the south side, the west side and the north side. Then the levites were broken down into three smaller tribes, each one being assigned specific liturgical duties and a specific side of the tabernacle to camp on, the west side, the south side, the north side. On the east side of the tabernacle were Moses, Aaron, and Aaron's sons performing guard duty of the holy place.

This census began in the second month of the second year since coming out of Egypt—just over one year since coming out of Egypt. However, when we get to chapter 9 of Numbers, we see that in the first month of the second year, or almost one full year after coming out of Egypt, God tells them to keep the passover at the appointed time, on the fourteenth day of that month. The first passover was the slaying of the firstborn of Egypt (the tenth plague), immediately following which the children came out of Egypt, beginning their exodus journey in the middle of the night. The second passover is observed one year later in the Sinai Desert, and immediately after that, the census takes place.

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


Then on the twentieth day of the second month in the second year, which would be after passover and firstfruits but still in those fifty days leading up to Pentecost, the cloud ascended from the tabernacle (God rose up), and the people, having been counted and ordered, broke camp and journeyed for three days; "and the ark of the covenant of the Lord went before them...to search out a resting place for them." When they broke camp with the ark, Moses said, "Rise up, O Lord! Let Your enemies be scattered, and let all who hate You flee." And when the ark rested he said, "Return, O Lord, to the many thousands in Israel!" Numbers 10:34-35. In the study notes in the Orthodox Bible "rise up" is related to the resurrection of Christ and "Return, O Lord," to His second coming.

The first mention of bread in the Book of Numbers is found in Numbers 4:7: On the table of presentation they shall spread a cloth all of purple and put on it the dishes, the censers, the cups, and the bowls for pouring the drink offerings, and the perpetual **bread** (lechem/artos) shall be on it.

The bread here referred to is the bread of presence found in Exodus 40:21 and which was featured also in the May Messenger article on Leviticus. It is the bread that was placed in anamnesis every Sabbath day before the Lord in the temple, meant only for Aaron and his descendants to consume at the end of the week when the new bread was placed. It is the bread that one of Aaron's descendants gave to David and his men on a Sabbath day, which incident Jesus referred to in Mark 2:23-28. Here in Numbers it is found among specific instructions to the Levites on how to break down the tabernacle for moving it when the camp moves. The table is moved with the loaves on it, placed on a purple cloth and covered with a scarlet cloth and then a blue leather covering. The holy things are not touched by anyone except Aaron and his sons. Carrying poles are inserted into the table, and the sons of Kohath, who are charged with moving it, touch only the poles.

Below are two illustrations of the camp arrangement, one chosen for its references, the other chosen to emphasize the cross shape of the camp, which some believe was how it looked from above.

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. 
