Returning to Church

- St. Nicholas is fully open and we look forward to seeing you all! Here is the current status:
- 1. No sign up is necessary. We are able to fill to full capacity.
- 2. Sit wherever you like. All pews are available.
- 3. Coffee hour has resumed!
- 4. We will continue live streaming.
- 5. The Metropolis is asking parishioners to please consider wearing a mask while attending services until the COVID disease rates decline to low levels of transmission as defined by the CDC.

Although this directive is voluntary, we are strongly encouraging our parishioners to wear masks while at Church. Also, please note, this is only an indoor directive and does not apply to outdoor places. We will not be re-establishing social distancing and the sign-up reservation system for attending ser-

Per His Eminence's guidance, we will not ask anyone about their vaccination status.

Watch Services From Home, Live

Although you might not be able to be at St. Nicholas in person, you can watch services at home from any device capable of connecting to YouTube. This is free and is available for most services. Here's how to do it:

- 1. First, find the schedule when a service is being broadcast. This is called Live Streaming. Look at the calendar on the previous page, or better, look at the calendar on the St. Nicholas Web page.

- 2. You can simply click <u>here</u>. If there is a service underway, press the button. You will see and hear the service.
- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the *YouTube* search bar, type; *St Nicholas Tacoma*



Outreach to others - Please take a few minutes to call and support the older members of our community. Human contact and interaction is so important during these trying COVID-19 times.



THE DOORS! THE DOORS!

At of the time of this writing the Narthex Renovation is essentially done with the exception of installing three sets of specialty doors, still in procurement and waiting for arrival to the church. Those doors are:


- 1) An interior set of double doors that leads from the Narthex area to the Sanctuary.
- 2) An exterior set of double doors with arched tops at the Narthex main entrance.
- 3) A heavy-duty scissor type gate at the base of Narthex exterior steps at sidewalk level.

Due to the custom nature of all three sets of doors, combined with some design detail complexities, plus having to switch an exterior door suppler in July, and then deal with distribution & shop fabrication disruptions, all three sets of doors most likely will not arrive until after Thanksgiving in early December. As a result, temporary security measures have been set and will remain in place, both at the exterior main entry overhang area where the scissor gate is to be installed, and at the main entry door opening.

The Narthex area interior work is complete, other than finishing up around the Sanctuary and main exterior entry wall openings after specialty doors arrive, and Father Seraphim is now able to move back into his permanent office. There are still a few odds & ends to complete at the building exteriors, but the landscaping is done, and beyond the specialty doors, we are in "punch list" or final completion mode.

This photo shows an interior door opening that leads from the Narthex area to the Sanctuary. The existing door opening height was extended by over 1' to better accommodate processions out of the Sanctuary. The new doors will have stained glass and other accent features.



A large arched opening in the center of the Narthex entry overhang gable wall is where a lockable scissor security gate, still in procurement, will be installed. Temporary chainlink fencing with a lockable gate will remain in its place in order to keep the outside entry overhang area secure until the scissor door arrives. The original design called for an ornamental type double swinging gate, but the City of Tacoma would not allow it because the gates would have swing out onto the abutting city sidewalk area.



Above is the new exterior main entry door entrance opening that leads into the Narthex, with a temporary framed & sheathed cover over it. Since the time of this photo an interior lock has been added to supplement an exterior lock already in place at a temporary door that was constructed within that field framed opening cover. Batt insulation, covered with Visqueen is planned to be installed within the temporary cover to help maintain building heat as the outside temperatures drop. The temporary cover and door will be removed once the permanent exterior doors arrive.




This is a close-up of an ornamental security bar panel that has been installed in smaller arched openings under the Narthex main entry overhang area.





This month we begin by recognizing the passing of another St. Nicholas veteran. Elias (Louis) S. Natsiopoulos, was a long-time member of the Greek Orthodox Church of the Assumption in Seattle, WA, but he would occasionally attend our St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church where he was friends with many of our long time parishioners, Elias passed away on 15 September and services were held for him at the Greek Orthodox Church of the Assumption in Seattle on 29 September.

When this ministry first began, Elias Natsiopoulos was one of the first veterans that provided me with a photo from his time in the military. One day he was kind enough to meet me for lunch and shared with me experiences from his time in the service during the Korean War. I still recall some of that conversation where he explained that because of his nationality and ability to speak Greek, he was tasked to serve as a liaison between his American unit and



the Greek "Spartan" Battalion, that was at the time attached to the American 1st Cavalry Division. We spoke for about an hour and when we were preparing to leave he took me to his car and showed me his Army uniform, and proudly, the insignia that reflected his service with the Greek Expeditionary Forces.

Quite some time later while researching George Velias, a St. Nicholas parishioner who was killed while serving with the 7th Cavalry Regiment of the 1st Cavalry Division during the Korean War, I learned that George's unit was on occasion in the same sector as the Greek Spartan Battalion. I wondered if Elias' and George's paths may have crossed during the war, and I hoped to ask Elias that question the next time George Pirotis and I planned to visit him at the long term care facility in which he was staying. Alas, because of COVID and now his death, we shall never know.

I know from the picture at Elias' funeral that he was the recipient of the Army Presidential Unit Citation. That award is presented to units that demonstrate exceptional heroism in action against an armed enemy. Requirements include that the unit must "...display such gallantry, determination, and espirit de corps in accomplishing its mission under extremely difficult and hazardous conditions as to set it apart from, and above, other units in the same campaign."

The Greek Expeditionary Forces received two U.S. Army Presidential Unit Citations—One was awarded to the Sparta Battalion for the capture of Scotch Hill in October 1951, and one for the defense of Outpost Harry on June 17-18, 1953. I cannot confirm without seeing Elias' military records, but it is quite possible that he earned that award while serving with the Greek Expeditionary Forces.

Elias (Louis) Natsiopoulos Obituary. It is with sadness, together with hope in our Lord's resurrection, that I share the news of the falling asleep of our brother in Christ, Louis Natsiopoulos. Louie fell asleep in the Lord on Wednesday, the 15th of September.

Louie was born on the 23rd of February in 1930 in a small village outside of Grevena called Agios Kosmas, located in northern Greece. He immigrated to America at the age of twenty-one. In February 1963 he married his wife Nancy. They were married for fifty-three years until Nancy fell asleep, preceding Louie in the Lord, on October of 2016.



Louie was a special person, and a mentor to many. He was a kind, gentle hearted person with a peaceful heart. As the Assumption was his home throughout his life in Seattle, you would often see Louie at Liturgy receiving the Eucharist and lending a helping hand. He enjoyed cooking for the poor and spent many Thursdays working and in fellowship with those in the Saint John the Almsgiver ministry. I also remember him as a Sunday Narthex Usher who would greet everyone with his genuine smile and gentle spirit. Most of all, I remember how Louie so lovingly interacted with his wife Nancy who was ill with Multiple Sclerosis for many years. Often you would see pictures of Louie sitting next to Nancy holding her hand. And when she fell asleep in the Lord, louie was there, right by her side, holding her hand as she lay peacefully asleep by his side. Louie, together with his wife Nancy, carried the cross of Multiple Sclerosis with such dignity and strength. Louie's example of a loving husband in the face of challenges continues to hold a special place in my memory. The love he showed for his wife and family, and for all with whom he interacted with his gentle loving heart, was an expression of his love for our Lord, and the depth of his faith.

Louie's son Philip, wrote this about his dad, "I am so grateful to have a father who was the greatest example of being a good husband, a good parent, a hard worker, a loyal friend to all who were his friends, and a kind and compassionate man to anyone he ever crossed paths with. A super intelligent man and yet someone who would never speak or boast about himself, not to mention ever promote himself. While at the same time his actions and the testimonies of all who knew him were deafening. It would take hundreds of pages to describe and measure the impact my dad had on basically every person he ever encountered. It isn't a stretch to say THE FIRST THING every person that I have ever met that knows my dad has said to me is "Oh, I just love your dad!" and then, instead of letting a potential over used polite statement linger, there would be a specific follow up story about what he personally has done to impact them. From doctors, nurses, and care staff over the years who were involved with my mom's care, and in the last four years, his own care. As well as any person that he has worked with at Boeing or the FAA. The parishioners at the Greek Orthodox Church and the overall Greek community that he loved and was involved in."

Louie is survved by his two children, Veronica and Philip, and five Grandchildren, Philip Jr., Anthony, Kendel, Alyssa, and Meagan.



19 November 1951. On this date St. Nicholas parishioner George Velias was killed in action while serving with the 1st Cavalry Division during the Korean War. George was an infantryman assigned to K Company, 3-7 Cavalry, a subordinate unit within the 1st Cavalry Division.

The 1st Cavalry Division was in Korea as part of the post WWII occupation force when the North Korean

George Velias was the last man to die.

Army (NKA) attacked south across the border. The 1st Cavalry Division, along with the other U.S. Army units stationed in the Pacific Theatre, were poorly equipped and ill prepared for a NKA attack. The NKA quickly seized Seoul, the capital of South Korea, and was successful in pushing the United Nations (UN) forces all the way back to the southeastern tip of Korea, to the city of Pusan. The UN forces put up a stubborn defense along the Pusan perimeter while General MacArthur prepared for and conducted, on 15 September 1950,

an amphibious assault at Inchon. MacArthur's seaborn invasion was successful in turning the tide of the war and UN forces were able to retake Seoul, the capital of South Korea. With that successful seaborn landing the NKA was threatened with encirclement, and it began to retreat north up the Korean peninsula. The 1st Cavalry Division and other UN forces went on the offensive and pursued the retreating NKA across the original 38th parallel border, and began approaching toward the North Korean/Chinese border.

As UN forces advanced closer to China, the Chinese leader, Mao Tse Tung, prepared to attack south in support of his North Korean communist allies. Mao began sending troops across the Yalu River border to support the NKA and by mid October the UN forces were fighting approximately 300,000 fresh Chinese troops. The tide of the war swung to the advantage of China and the NKA as they began pushing the UN forces back to the 38th parallel. Near the 38th parallel the opposing forces fought back and forth for almost a year as peace talks were ongoing, with neither side making substantial gains.

George's unit was on the front lines at this time (fall of 1951) and in the vicinity of the 38th parallel. The 1st Cavalry Division, having been decisively engaged in the war since the very beginning, was ordered to withdraw from the front lines so it could be sent back to Japan to rearm and refit, and serve as the Pacific Theatre Reserve. George Velias was killed ten days before his unit was pulled out of the front. There were 64 men killed in K Company, 3-7 Cavalry during the Korean War. George Velias was the 64th and last man from K Company to die.

George's loss was deeply felt by the Greek community of the Pacific Northwest. A plaque in his memory was presented to St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and hangs in upper hall.

George's family was from Roy, WA and still resides in this area.

ST. NICHOLAS BIBLE STUDY THE REVELATION




THE CHURCH - (ICON OF PENTECOST)

As each year goes by and new Christians come into existence through Baptism, this summarizes the core concept that we discussed earlier, of this basic conflict: the devil is envious of mankind and as a person is baptized and becomes a "christ" on earth who is a part of the body that is the Church; with every year that goes by that basic conflict is constantly unfolding because of that fact. We and we alone represent the possibility to iconically depict all of creation. The angels are just spirit – they don't have flesh. Angels can take on human form and appear to be human but that doesn't make them incarnate. On the other hand, animals can't be icons of all creation because they don't possess "spirits" – they don't have souls that are formed in the image of Christ. Man is both spiritually in the image of Christ with a true rational soul, and simultaneously, has true flesh – thus, uniting heaven and earth (one of the 5 dualities). Only man can be the true image or little christ of the whole cosmos. He represents the image of Christ to the cosmos and he represents the icon of the cosmos to Christ. Only mankind has that dual role.

The devil was aware of what God was creating in man; and the fact that He was not creating that in angels. God was only making His purpose in the image of the child being born of the woman in Chapter 12. It's in the singular, but by that image as St. Methodios just explained, that's every single human being that God has made into what He intended, which is to be a "little christ". God has a vision for our existence and, on a more personal level, every single one of us has to apply all these beautiful teachings from Scripture to our own self-concept. Our own self-concept has to be grounded in "God made me". "I came into existence, not as a biological accident, but because He made me through the synergy of my parents. Therefore, I have His intentionality from the moment of the beginning of my existence. Each moment from the beginning of my existence also has His intentionality. So, my entire life-

time makes deep sense to Him." There is a deep logic for everything from Genesis to Revelation. Father Seraphim feels that the acceptance of evolution, as a self-concept, was the real gateway to all the problems that we are experiencing in society today. Evolution is saying that there is no deep structural intentionality to human existence – it's chemical and biological. The people who are anti-Christ are usually evolutionists. The excuse is, "I'm going to act like a beast, because all I am is a beast".



Pages 44-47 The Structure of the Church

It is the eschatological freedom that the Church enjoys while existing in history. It is the coming together of heaven and earth.

If the Lord had wanted a merely administrative unity, with no further implications in terms of life and mystery, He could have provided as an image of the Church's unity the Roman Empire, saying, "Father, I desire that the faithful may be united as the Roman Empire is united." However, He did nothing of the sort, but asked instead that the trinitarian "even as" should be the measure of everything in the Church's life. He likened His Kingdom to an entity with a power of its own, growing and living in its entirety. He said that the Kingdom of Heaven is like leaven, like a seed, like a pearl hidden in the earth which is of such value that any merchant who found it would sell all in order to obtain it.

The whole body of the Church bears witness to the unifying grace of the Trinity: its administrative structure, its liturgical life and its theological creativity. The Church is not an organization of "pious" people that provides liturgical outlets for the psychological needs of the faithful or theology to solve their metaphysical problems and puzzles. It is "dwelling of God among men" (Revelation 21:3). It is at once the little flock and she who is wider than the heavens, which is not contained but contains history and the whole of creation.

When the Church exists as Christ requires it to, then it bears witness. This witness is not a message unrelated to its life; it is the very fact that its whole existence is structured in a different way, a way dictated and hallowed by the trinitarian "even as". The Church will not be united merely in any manner and to any end, but it will be united – that is to say, it is united and will remain so – because there is no other mode of existence for it. The loss of trinitarian consciousness means falling away from the Church.

The existence of the Church is not a cause for fear to anyone, but rather a reassurance, a testimony to the love of God and a proof of His power and providence, "so that the world may know that Thou has sent Me and hast loved them even as Thou hast loved Me" (John 17:23). This is the only way to lead the world to faith and love; otherwise, we lead it into unbelief and provoke it to hatred. The world needs to feel that God loves it. It is this that tames the passions, revitalizes hope, and renews the thirst for life. This Gospel of love is made known by the Church through the way it exists "kenotically", the way it is united "even as" the Holy Trinity is united, and thus becomes a living theophany within history.

The Church has one mission: to be in the world; and by its presence and the manner of its existence to confess: "It is no longer I who live, but the Holy Trinity Who lives in Me. It does not improvise. It does not do Its Own will. As It hears, It judges." (cf. John 5:30). The unity which the Church has after the manner of the Trinity makes it capable of partaking organically in the divine and blessed life, of receiving the grace of the Comforter and of being witness that God loves the world.

He who has really seen the Church has seen the Holy Trinity. This vision is Paradise, a pledge of the life to come and of the Kingdom. It is a vision revealed to those who are baptized in the name of the Holy Trinity, to those "who have attained not only union with the Holy Trinity, but also the unity which can be perceived with the Holy Trinity."

The twelve, united after the manner of the Trinity ("even as"), are sent into the world "even as" the Father sent the Son into the world (cf. John 20:21). "Fear not, little flock" (Luke 12:32). The work is practically finished. The Virgin said to the Archangel Gabriel, "Let it be to Me according to Your word" (Luke 1:38). The Lord said to His heavenly Father, "Thy will be done" (Luke 22:42). The Church says every day, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10). Thus, the sacred action seen at work in the Trinity begins to operate in the world.

The Church is God's Christ Himself, the Kingdom of God which "is within us" (Luke 17:21). It is heaven on earth. The Church's aim is to remain on earth, and not to leave the world until such time as it can take the world with it, until it can make the world heaven. According to His promise, we wait for a "new heaven and a new earth" (II Peter 3:13), and heaven and earth are one in this new creation.

Thus, we understand that true union is an eschatological event; but it does not, therefore, follow that we are far removed from unity in terms of time. If it seems so to us, this proves that we are far away in terms of trinitarian awareness, that we are far from the new understanding, the new creation that Christ has inaugurated. The time of eschatology has already begun, and there are people who do not come into judgment but pass from death into life.

In the Church, in the Divine Liturgy, the faithful who are offered to Him "in all and for all" do not simply ask for but actually enjoy the union of all. The unity of the Church is not an administrative system or a method of procedure which can be seen with the naked eye and arranged in a human fashion. It is a theanthropic mystery made known in the Spirit, Who "unites the whole institution of the Church." It is a reality outside the world which gives life to the Church.

The Church is a living entity, not an abstraction. Here are some Bible Study members reflections on this: Father Seraphim: The conflict isn't just between Christ and the devil, but how the devil is attacking Christ's Body to usurp Christ. It's not just an abstract battle between the two; it's how the devil is trying to destroy His Body.

Deborah T.: Everyone is worshipping the same God and all is okay. It's a very personal and real thing. If you are part of The Church, you are part of the Body of Christ and you are, personally, being attacked. It's not this thing that is out there and we will live the best that we can. It makes it very important to be part of The Church and not just to be baptized into it, but to actually live in it.

Father Seraphim: Luke 9:49-50 "...Master, we saw someone casting out demons in Your Name, and we forbade him because he does not follow with us. ⁵⁰But Jesus said to him, 'Do not forbid him, for he who is not against us is on our side.' "Being in His Body is to walk with His Apostles, but His Name also has power. That is why the Holy Spirit included that moment in Scripture. It's the basis on which we can understand all kinds of diversity within Christianity without losing that sense of the inexorable Oneness of His Body. You can hold both those concepts at the same time. Those who were casting out demons in "His Name", but did not walk with the Apostles, had a concept of the Church that would have been an abstraction – for them it was all about the power of Jesus. The drawback with separating themselves

from His Body, is not sharing in that "Oneness".

Alan M.: "The Church is a community of faith committed to worship, witness, service and fellowship."

Denise S: The concept of the Church as an abstraction leaves a vulnerability that allows those who don't follow Church doctrine to plant seeds of evil which can divide and conquer.

Father Seraphim: There's a conception that everyone who believes in Christ is the Church, which is a "catch-all" term for those who, more or less, believe the same thing. If you go back to the text from the "Hymn of Entry", for example, the Church (the Woman), in **Revelation 12**, is a living entity of which we are, ontologically united - on a being level. We are not just a group of people who believe the same thing. What action of the Church signifies what we are talking about?

Deborah M: The Eucharist (Holy Communion). It's not just grape juice and crackers – It's the Body and Blood of Christ. It becomes a part of us when we consume It.

Father Seraphim: You see this during the Turkish occupation of Greece or Communist Russia or Romania, where the faithful risked their lives to come together for the Eucharist. Some can rationalize by thinking, "I believe in Jesus, you believe in Jesus, but why risk life and limb just to get together and pray? We can pray on our own. Ultimately, it boils down to "Do you love Christ, or not?" The Orthodox Church didn't stop celebrating the Eucharist during the COVID lockdown. If we dispense with the Church coming together (σ ivox σ τ) - synaxis), if that is negotiable, then we are left with devastating and lingering theological effects. We are talking about, potentially, catastrophic spiritual consequences. The Church will change from a living being, as symbolized by the Woman with the child in **Revelation 12** to a shared belief system with no necessary or ontological sharing. How does the coming together for the Eucharist relate to the theology of what the Kingdom will be?

Deborah M: We will partake of His Body and Blood which will unite us to Him. He will recognize us and know us and we will all be one in the Kingdom.


Father Seraphim: On a physical, or molecular level, the theology of the Church, expressed by Father Staniloae, using St. Gregory of Nyssa and many other Saints, state that our bodies will be reconstituted according to the glorious bodies that St. Paul describes. Our spiritual bodies will become interpenetrated in this incredible oneness, but we will remain identifiably unique. Everyone's "resurrection" bodies and souls will be intertwined or interlocked. It always leads back to the Eucharist. It is above all a celebration of love in the fulfillment of oneness.

Sheila A: Our thoughts effect each other even if we are not in each other's presence because we have that oneness.

Father Seraphim: "Our thoughts determine our lives." **Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica.** Our input determines our thoughts, also.

Hollywood, Florida

A dramatic scene unfolded before 40 Days for Life vigil participants in Hollywood, Florida. A half hour after an Uber brought a couple to their abortion appointment, the woman's mother showed up.

"I'm here to stop my daughter from doing this," she said.

As the woman went inside to try to save her grandchild, vigil participants stepped up their prayers. While prayer warriors implored God to save the child, the abortion-bound woman, her boyfriend, and her mother repeatedly entered the abortion facility. They exited the abortion facility. They paced. They went back into the abortion facility.

"We are witnessing a battle between Heaven and hell," said Nancy, the Hollywood leader.



Finally, the family told vigil participants that they had chosen life – and that it was the vigil participants' presence who made the difference!

"How many babies have been saved?" asked the baby's grandmother.

"As of yesterday, there were 229," Nancy answered.

"Well, now there are 230," the woman said. "I think I may join you out here.







LECHEM-ARTOS-BREAD

Following the Word Through Scripture

We have arrived at Deuteronomy, the fifth book of the Bible, and the last book attributed to Moses. Deuteronomy is a second telling of the journey from Mt. Sinai to the Jordan River where the Israelites are preparing to cross into the Promised Land. Our Orthodox Study Bible says that Moses delivers this narrative "in a warm, personal, homiletic form," which indicates Deuteronomy is for edification, not doctrine. The major theme being edified is "loving God with all our heart and strength." This retelling of the journey in the Book of Deuteronomy is, I believe, intended to strengthen the peoples' faith in God and connection to God through remembering their experience of traveling with God through the wilderness those forty years.

In Deuteronomy chapter six Moses begins telling the children of Israel that if they will hear and be careful to do the commandments, ordinances, and judgments of God, things will go well with them, they will greatly multiply and be given a land flowing with milk and honey. The commandment is "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord. You shall love the Lord your God from your whole heart, from your whole soul, and from your whole power. So these words I command you today shall be in your heart and in your soul. You shall teach them to your sons, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up...". Notice, the words of God are to be a part of us, in our hearts and souls. We are to experience them/Him in our everyday movements, and then things will go well with us. Remember how things did not go so well in the Book of Numbers when the people rebelled against the words of God.

Deuteronomy 8:2-9: Now you shall remember the whole way the Lord your God led you in the desert, to deal harshly with you and test you, to know what was in your heart, whether you would keep His commandments or not. So He dealt harshly with you and weakened you with hunger, and fed you with manna, which your fathers did not know, that He might make you know that man shall not live by bread/lechem/artos alone, but by every word proceeding from the mouth of God man shall live. Your garments did not wear out on you, nor did your feet become callused these forty years. You should know in your heart that as a man chastens his son, so the Lord your God chastens you. Therefore, you shall keep the commandments of the Lord your God to walk in His ways and to fear Him. For the Lord your God is bringing you into a good and great land, where torrents of waters and springs of bottomless depths flow through the plains and through the mountains; a land of wheat and barley, of vines, fig trees, and pomegranates, a land of olive oil and honey; a land where you will not eat your bread/lechem/artos in poverty, and in which you will lack nothing; a land whose stones are iron and from whose hills you can dig copper.

This is an amazing passage. They experienced nourishment from bread that fell like dew from heaven and water that came from a rock, clothes that did not wear out after forty years of desert exposure, feet that did not become callused in forty years of walking through sand and rocks. This is how they experienced traveling with God through a desert wilderness, on their way the promised fertile, productive land, yet it is God who supports the fertility of that land, just as it is God who allows the barrenness of the desert. Life is found in God, not in the land or the circumstances.

Consider James 1:2-4: My brethren, count it all joy when you fall into various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience. But let patience have its perfect work, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking nothing. On page 1674 of our Orthodox Bible, the study notes to this verse tell us the important thing is our response to the trials that come upon us, not the trials themselves. Our response reveals to us where our hearts are focused. To get angry at circumstances is to get angry at God who permits them, and He permits them in order to grow our faith. This is definitely in line with the lessons of the wilderness.

PROSPHORA

The baptism of Jesus is one of our twelve great feast days, the one we call Theophany, meaning in this case a tangible manifestation of the triune God - the thundering Father, the Son Jesus, the descending Spirit dove. Immediately after this theophany, Jesus went into the wilderness (with the Holy Spirit) and fasted for forty days and forty nights. According to the gospels of Matthew and Luke, the tempter then came to him and said, "If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread." But Jesus countered, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by **bread** alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." Jesus responded to the tempter by quoting from the same passage of Deuteronomy cited earlier in this article, and which every Israelite would have been familiar with in the context of their own history of having been sustained by God in the desert for forty years and then poised to enter into the promised land.

As I am working on this article, at this point it occurs to me that it was Moses who committed the story of our beginnings to writing. It was Moses who recorded that "bread" is introduced to us from the mouth of God in the context of the reality of death. Genesis 3:19: "In the sweat of your face you shall eat **bread** till you return to the ground from which you were taken. Earth you are and to earth you shall return." Then I noted the very next verse says, So Adam called his wife's name Life, because she was the mother of all living. The irony of this juxtaposition floored me, until I thought, no, this is a metanoia moment, meta with a meaning of after and beyond. It was the woman's thought and act that allowed the entrance of death. Adam, who had understood each of the animals and named them correctly, had not yet named his wife. They sinned, God has explained the consequences, and then Adam understands that his wife is meant to be Eve (Life). After obtaining knowledge, Adam comes to know beyond the knowledge. This is relevant to being strengthened by the retelling taking place in Deuteronomy. It is relevant to realizing what you have experienced and making connections that go beyond.

In the Deuteronomy verses containing the word bread there is a phrase from the first verse and a phrase from the last verse that reached out and grabbed me: *That He might make you know...that you may know.* This is a knowing that goes beyond knowledge, a penetration of truth. I am thinking this knowing could be expressed by the word metanoia—which could be translated "beyond thought," but usually is translated as "repentance." *Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand.* Without metanoia, without the connecting experience that goes beyond mere knowledge, we cannot enter into the Kingdom, also known as the Promised Land. The Lord has brought the children of Israel through the desert for forty years, allowing them to experience certain things that He might make them know Him as their King and God, the sustainer of their lives, the provider of their bread. And it is Moses, again, who records for us in Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy that this bread which does not prevent us from dying, when offered to the Lord in thanksgiving becomes the bread that brings us life everlasting.

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!


