

Cover Story Continued...

Having just received the Good News of our Lord's Resurrection from Mary Magdalene, the Disciples were visited by our Risen Lord, who offered them peace amidst the turmoil, and would send them on their own Apostolic mission:

"'Peace be to you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit!'" —John 20:21-22

In our own preparation for Baptism and Chrismation, whether personally, or through the Godparent in the case of infants, we ask God in His mercy to expunge and expel all evil and unclean spirits hiding and lurking in our hearts. These words are stated in the very exorcism prayers of *Making a Catechumen*. Before having the Spirit of God breathed into us, and being recreated as Temples of God ourselves, we must first expel and expunge any spirits of opposition. What do these spirits look like in our actualized life? Spirit of hatred; spirit of spitefulness; spirit of envy; spirit of ingratitude; spirit of self-justification.

We are reminded throughout these Great 40 Days of the Lenten Fast of this great call, particularly in the Prayer of Saint Ephrem the Syrian:

O Lord and Master of my life, give me not a spirit of sloth, vain curiosity, lust for power, and idle talk.

But give to me, Your servant, a spirit of prudence, humility, patience, and love.

Yes, O Lord and King, grant me to see my own faults and not to condemn my brother: for You are blessed to the ages of ages. Amen.

For those preparing for Holy Illumination in this period, this expelling of spirits of opposition and filling with the quickening breath of the Holy Spirit happens in the process leading to Baptism and Chrismation. For those of us who have been Orthodox for some time, and even for the span of our entire fathomable existence, this call belongs to us, also! This call is actualized in heeding the first ministerial words of both the Forerunner John and our Lord Himself: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

The call for our return to the House of the Lord. The call for our reconciliation with both God and fellow man. These most-sacred and life-giving words that lead us back into our Heavenly Father's embrace. Through this process of repentance and confession, our vessel, our living Temple of the Holy Spirit, is cleaned from the inside where the light of God may shine more brightly in our lives, and not remain hidden under a basket, where even we forget to take notice of His presence. Once the light shines brightly again, the oil of God's grace begins to refill, like those faithful Maidens who chose to take the time to prepare their lamps ahead of the Bridegroom's arrival in the midst of the night. With our grace-filled lamps prepared, we can join the Wise Virgins to greet our Bridegroom at the Gate with joy, and not trepidation. It is in the meeting of our Lord at the Gate we can be filled with Life abundantly. It is meeting our Lord at the Beautiful Gate that we receive the most sacred gifts of Holy Communion.

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

APRIL BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Furnace replacement in the Dining Hall is now planned for the second half of April, shortly after Pascha, with field work expected to about 4 to 5 weekdays to complete. This should make for a warmer Dining and Lower Hall during the Spring, and a more much comfortable space in the upcoming Fall and Winter.

A roof leak was discovered in the Upper Hall roof last month. Fortunately, drips into the interior space below started just a few days before a six month roofing inspection of the new Narthex roof had already been scheduled to take place. Upon inspection and armed with an infrared scanner, the source of the leak was quick and easy to find, and patched that day, along with taking care of some staples found at another part of Upper Hall roof.

A small portion of drywall ceiling that was damaged from the Upper Hall roof leak is planned to be repaired sometime after Pascha, allowing for a few more weeks time and rainstorms to pass and help verify the roof patch above it has indeed taken care of the problem. Also, the new Narthex roofing area checked out OK.

A preliminary proposal to address long-term fixes to the deteriorated Upper Hall and Dining Hall area roofs, along with possibly presenting some other big-picture improvements beyond the roofs is still being discussed and vetted by the Parish Council and Building Committee. Its viability to make a formal presentation with some other alternatives is to be determined.

MILITARY MINISTRY NEWS

Our latest addition to the St. Nicholas Band of Brothers and Sisters is Ralph Klene. Ralph joined St. Nicholas in Tacoma in 2021, but in his younger days he was in the United States Navy. He joined the Navy when he was 19 years old and went through Basic Training at the San Diego Recruitment Training Center. In 1966, he was called up for active duty. The Navy wanted him to report to his ship halfway around the world, so he made his way via Long Beach, CA to Travis Air



Force Base (AFB) in Sacramento. From there, he flew to Yakota AFB in Japan, and then to Clark AFB in Manilla, Philippines. At Manilla he went to Subic Bay and caught a supply ship heading to the Tonkin Gulf off the coast of Vietnam. In heavy winds and high seas, he crossed in a cage suspended by a cable from his supply ship onto the ship to which he was assigned, the USS Ticonderoga. The Navy had not provided him with technical training, so they assigned him to the engine room where he served as a boiler technician and machinist mate (BTMM).

In December 1967, Ralph and the USS Ticonderoga sailed on what was the ship's fourth combat deployment to the waters off the Indochinese coast and arrived at "Yankee Station" (the area from which the United States Navy conducted naval operations off the coast of Vietnam) in January 1968. They were there for the Tet Offensive and the siege at Khe Sanh, and they supported those battles with many air sorties.

When the North Koreans seized the USS Pueblo, an American spy ship, in January 1968, the USS Ticonderoga deployed to the coast of North Korea as part of Operation Formation Star. The USS Enterprise joined the USS Ticonderoga, and they planned air strikes against seven MIG airfields from which approximately 200 MIG aircraft operated. The President never gave the authorization for the carriers to execute the strikes, so the Ticonderoga returned to Yankee Station to resume her role in the Tet Offensive.

Between January and July 1968, Ralph and the Ticonderoga were off the coast of Vietnam for five separate periods, totaling 120 days of combat duty. During that time, the Ticonderoga's air wing flew just over 13,000 combat sorties against North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces. Most of those missions were continuing attempts to interdict the enemy lines of supply.

In August 1968, the Ticonderoga moved to the Long Beach Naval Shipyard for repairs and conversions to handle the A-7 Corsair attack jet. From there, Ralph returned to civilian life. NAVY SAILUR

Ralph joins the distinguished ranks of Michael Ampatzis, Ricky Angelus, Anthony Ciarochi, Christina Carter, Robin Griffin, John Kouklis, MSG (R) Walter Motz, George Panagiotu, John Pangis, and John Stafford, all past or present members of the United States Navy which has as its Patron Saint, our beloved St. Nicholas. These men and women sailed the seven seas in defense of the United States of America, and all are current parishioners at St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church.

May God bless them always, and may we always be grateful for their service to our country.

APRIL 23rd, The Feast Day of Saint George.

George, this truly great and glorious Martyr of Christ, was born of a father from Cappadocia and a mother from Palestine. Being a military tribune, or chiliarch (that is, a commander of a thousand troops), he was illustrious in battle and highly honored for his courage. When he learned that the emperor Diocletian was preparing a persecution of the Christians, Saint George presented himself publicly before the Emperor and de-




nounced him. When threats and promises could not move him from his steadfast confession, he was put to unheard-of tortures, which he endured with great bravery, overcoming them by his faith and love towards Christ. By the wondrous signs that took place in his contest, he guided many to the knowledge of the truth, including Queen Alexandra, wife of Diocletian, and was finally beheaded in 296 in Nicomedia.




His sacred remains were taken by his servant from Nicomedia to Palestine, to a town called Lydda, the homeland of his mother, and then were finally transferred to the church which was raised up in his name. 
If April 23 falls on or before Great and Holy Pascha, the Feast of St. George is translated to Bright Monday. (Source: GOARCH website).







The Book of Acts



Excerpt from a Sermon by St. John Chrysostom: Apostles Peter and John heal the lame man (Acts 3) Everywhere we find these two Apostles ¹in great harmony together. "To him Simon Peter beckoned." John 13:24. These two also came together to the Sepulchre. John 20:3 et seq. And concerning John, Peter said to Christ, "And what shall this man do?" John 21:21. Now as for the other miracles, the writer of this book omits them; but he mentions the miracle by which they were all put in commotion. Observe again that they do not come to them purposely; so clear were they of ambition, so closely did they imitate their Master. Why now did they go up to the temple? Did they still live as Jews? No, but for expediency (χρησίμως). A miraculous sign again takes place, which both confirms the converts, and draws over the rest; and such, as they were a sign for having wrought. The disease was in the nature of the man, and baffled the art of medicine. He had been forty years lame Acts 4:20, as the writer says afterwards, and ¹no one during all that time had cured him. And the most obstinate diseases are those which are born with men. It was a great calamity, insomuch that even to provide for himself his necessary sustenance was impossible for him. The man was conspicuous both from the place, and from his malady. Hear how the matter is related. "And a certain man, lame from his mother's womb, was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them who entered into the tem-

ple." Acts 3:2. He sought to receive alms, and he did not know who the men were. "Who seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple, asked an alms. And Peter, fastening his eyes upon him, with John, said 'Look on us'." (V. 3,4) Yet, not even so were the man's thoughts elevated, but he persisted in his importunity. For such is poverty; upon a refusal, it compels people still to persist. Let this put us to shame who fall back in our prayers. 3But observe, I pray you, Peter's gentleness: for he said, "Look on us". So, truly did their very bearing, of itself, betoken their character. "And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them. Then Peter said, 'Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have I give you.' " **(V. 5-6).** He did not say, I give you something much better than silver or gold: but what? 4"In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk. And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up." Acts 3:7. Such was also the way of Christ. Often He healed by word, often by an act, often also He stretched forth the hand, where men were somewhat weak in faith, that the cure might not appear to be spontaneous. "And he took him by the right hand and lifted him up." This act made manifest the Resurrection, for it was an image of the Resurrection. "And immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. And he leaping up stood, and walked." Acts 3:8. Perhaps it was by way of trying himself that he put it thus to further proof, whether perchance the thing done might not be to no purpose. His feet were weak; it was not that he had lost them. Some say that he did not even know how to walk. "And entered with them into the temple." Of a truth it was marvelous. The Apostles do not urge him; but of his own accord he follows, by the act of following pointing out his benefactors. "And leaping and praising God"; not admiring them, but God Who wrought by them. The man was grateful.

Father Seraphim: What's the organizing principle of how the Holy Spirit operates through the Apostles? Is it, basically, Pentecost happens – now the Apostles have all this spiritual power? Is it a free-for-all? This guy does this over here, that one does that over there, etc.? Or is it more like a body that's collecting members to itself – with one life-blood? Notice in the text how the lame man clings to Peter and John. To what is he clinging though? He's clinging to what St. John Chrysostom is saying, he's clinging to the love and trust that St. Peter has with St. John. There's something already there with these two Apostles. That is the means by which the Holy Spirit heals the man and to whom he attaches himself. He attaches himself to the love that Sts. Peter and John have for each other, that preceded the healing which comes from the love that they have for their Lord. The power of the Holy Spirit is evident, but the result of the action of the Holy Spirit is the uniting into one. The body just keeps growing. There's often an unexamined assumption that, as things are progressing, whether in the Book of Acts or in the Christian world, there are individuals opening their eyes to the Gospel and that's the work completed. Hence, the Sinner's Prayer, "I believe in Jesus as my personal Savior" and it's a done deal.

Genevieve E: I wanted to point out in St. John's sermon, **Acts 3:2** "And a certain man, lame from his mother's womb, was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful..." I think this is important because this man had people who cared enough about him to see that he was taken care of on a daily basis. This shows love and that they had faith.

Father Seraphim: Yes, like the man who was let down from the roof by his friends. Luke 5:19-20 "And when they could not find how they might bring him in, because of the crowd, they went up on the house-top and let him down with his bed through the tiling into the midst before Jesus. ²⁰When He saw their faith, He said to him, "Man your sins are forgiven you." The point is, the Lord was there and didn't give him a healing because he wasn't ready for the healing, which I think is probably the case because St. John Chrysostom indicates the man's hopelessness, and also the words of St. Peter to preface the miracle, "silver and gold have I none; but such as I have I give you." In other words, I can see that you want silver and gold because you've given up on everything else, I'm here to tell you there's something else. That to me, indicates that the man was on a journey and this moment coincided with the desperation in

his heart that gave birth to the beginning of faith. The second issue, of course, is the part about what the Lord says, "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do he will do also; and greater works than these he will do, because I go to My Father." John 14:12 The Lord didn't just come to earth and fix everything and then tell the Apostles that their job was to go tell everyone what He did. He's giving them the power of the Holy Spirit to fulfill in their own ministries, as a rather shocking statement that St. Paul makes, what was lacking in Christ. He didn't mean that Christ was lacking in anything, it means the Lord was saying, I've given you all things, I've conquered death, I've sent the Holy Spirit, now you are going to be "Little christs" and every one of you in his own spheres is going to fulfill what I did for the whole world. That's the issue of scale. Notice that St. John Chrysostom (point 1 & 3) that their healing is grounded in humility. Elder Ephraim of Arizona (of blessed memory) was one of the most sweet and gentle human beings and very humble. St. Peter was like that - sweet and kind, humble and innocent and those are the words that characterize him. One last point – did you notice the nomenclature here – Jesus Christ of Nazareth? What's up with that language?

Anonymous: "... Can anything good come out of Nazareth?..." John 1:46

Fran H: I think everybody would have heard of Him by then. Like "Oh you mean "that" Elvis!?"


Father Seraphim: That's right. He had to use the lowest common denominator term. The three thousand people who "believed" at Pentecost just prior to this, is one thing. But he's at the Temple. Who's going to the Temple?

Various: The Jews.

Father Seraphim: Right – the people who don't believe in the Gospel. St. John Chrysostom addresses this, "why now did they go to the temple? Did they still live as Jews?" St. John answers, "No, but for expediency." St. John is confirming that the Apostles, Peter and John, believe in the Messiah, but don't give up going to the Temple. They are not beholding to anything. They go there to preach the Gospel and to raise up the little shrunken souls they find everywhere and to, perhaps, give them the grace of the Holy Spirit and to raise them into "Giants".

Dr. Ingrid C: When he said, "In the Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk.", St. John Chrysostom, a few lines later, says, "This act made manifest the Resurrection, for it was an image of the Resurrection.", because the Jews did not believe.

Father Seraphim: Exactly. That's why a little detail like that is important. I think of it as skill development when it comes to the reading of the Gospels. We may not know what is up with a given phrase or text, but it should cause our "antennae" to wiggle a little bit. This is one of them, "Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth", because it is a rather archaic term for our Lord and Savior. Fast forward to the post-Resurrection, post-Ascension and post-Pentecost period and the Church doesn't call Him "Jesus of Nazareth".



Analysis of our Parish Community: Is the "body" strong enough and loving enough to be bringing people to something? If we are going to go out there and preach the Gospel and people believe, to what are they going to be joined or is it just about getting them to believe? Sometimes that analysis leads you to go

back down into the "body" and just start working on healing and growing and getting the life-blood flowing within the core of the believers. Something my spiritual father told me when I first came to St. Nicholas was, "Son, you're trying to light everything up by pouring gas on everything – that's not how you light a fire! How do you light a fire?" I said, "You get kindling?" He said, "Exactly, you get a core and then you start adding more and more to it. Build a core, son, don't just go around lighting everything up." Liturgical prayer is what keeps the core hot. Sunday Liturgy is the core of the matter and the weekday services are what makes that core even hotter. Canonically, if you miss the Sunday Liturgy (other than illness, etc.), more than three times, you are out of communion until you are reconciled with the Church.

Father Seraphim: How do we know in **Acts 3**, that liturgical prayer is a thing at all? By liturgical prayer, I mean a fixed order in a temple, etc. What's the text that gives that away?

Anonymous: The hour of prayer.

Father Seraphim: Right. Which hour? The "Ninth hour" – which is what time? It is 3 p.m. To this day, in the Orthodox Church, 1st hour prayers is 6 a.m., 3rd hour prayers is 9 a.m., 6th hour prayers is noon, 9th hour prayers is 3 p.m. The liturgical schedule is organized according to those hours. Those come from the saving events in the New Testament that occurred at those hours. For example: 3rd hour is Pentecost - **Acts 2:15** "For these are not drunk, as you suppose, since it is only the third hour of the day." There's even a special hymn specific to the third hour which says, "O Lord, Who sent down the Holy Spirit at the third hour..." What happened at the 3rd hour, the 6th hour and the 9th hour? Christ was nailed to the Cross at 9 a.m., hung on the Cross at


12 p.m. and gave up His Spirit at 3 p.m. The point is, worship of the community came together along those hours. Everything that is happening here: the preaching, the healing, the sermons and the gathering together is in the context of liturgical prayer. It's not random.

Fran H: Does it seem like the time on the Cross is connected to the "New Creation"?

Father Seraphim: Yes.

Fran H: So you get to the 7th hour and it's done.

Father Seraphim: Yes, and what does He say at the very end? It is completed, it is finished, it is consummated. Christ was doing the hours on the Cross. It's a good time of year to reflect on that because on the first of this month (September) we started the liturgical "New Year". St. Maximus said that we are the microcosm of the universe or the universe is the macrocosm of the individual. The concept of the Church has always been that liturgical prayer does sustain the universe. That's why I insist on offering so many morning and evening worship services throughout the week. Our entire life should be a liturgical offering and our final offering to Christ is our own body in our death.

We are looking for prospective sponsors/Godparents for our Catechumens. Please contact Genevieve 253-359-0455 (text would be the best) or goobahoo@gmail.com. Father Anthony will need to approve all sponsors/Godparents who meet the following requirements:

- An Orthodox Christian in good standing
- Must belong to an Orthodox parish
- A person may not serve as a Godparent
- The Godparent must be someone who is active in the life of the Church, supporting the Church with their tithe, keeping the fasts, and otherwise living in all piety and holiness.
- Godparents must actively live the Orthodox Faith, be regular church goers, and be contributing stewards.

The following persons **CANNOT** be Sponsors:

- An Orthodox Christian under twelve years of age.
- An Orthodox Christian who belongs to a parish not in Communion with the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese.
- A married Orthodox Christian who has not been married in the Orthodox Church.
- Anyone who has been excommunicated or anathematized from the Orthodox Church.
- An Orthodox Deacon, Priest, or Metropolitan.

• If the Church has not blessed a Godparent's marriage or, if civilly divorced, he or she has not been granted an ecclesiastical divorce, or for any other reason he or she is not in communion with the Orthodox Church.

Some things to keep in mind: If two people have the same Godparent, they cannot marry. It is an impediment to marriage, because they're spiritually related as siblings. Normally there is only one sponsor, but two may be allowed.

The institution of sponsors or Godparents: Novlpha – Nona – Godmother & Novlpha – Nonos – Godfather is one that dates back to the first century of the Christian Church. Anyone approaching baptism, be they infant or adult, was required to have a Godparent. In the case of an infant, it is the Godparent who speaks for the child, answering the questions posed by the priest during the baptismal service. But it doesn't stop there! The Godparent is charged by the Church with the duty to make sure the newly baptized is instructed in the teachings of the Church, remains a frequent communicant within the Church and remains active in the Church. In the case of a child, it is to the Godparents that the parents entrust their child, knowing that the Godparent will remain actively supporting the child within the life of the Church. Should something happen to the parents, it is traditionally the Godparent who will make sure the child continues to be taken to Church, and remains Orthodox.

Because of the awesome responsibility of Godparents, it is all the more important that great care be taken when choosing someone who will take on this role. The Church does not allow anyone to become a Godparent who is not Orthodox, for how can one who is not himself a pious, active Orthodox Christian give witness to living a life immersed in the Orthodox faith? The Godparent must therefore be a person of high moral character, and able to inspire the newly baptized to fulfill their baptismal vows.

When the newly baptized approaches the holy chalice for the first three consecutive Sundays following baptism, it is the Godparent who accompanies them to receive the Holy Mysteries. The Godparent must, therefore, be someone who himself/herself is a frequent communicant. Additionally, the person chosen to act as a Godparent must be someone willing to honor their commitment to the newly baptized for a lifetime, and willing to help nourish the spiritual life and development of the Godchild throughout their life. Thus, it is a very bad idea to pick someone as a godparent simply because they are a good friend. Godparents are duty bound to continue giving support to their Godchild, even into adulthood. They must be someone who will remember to honor their Godson or Goddaughter on special occasions, such as a birthday or names-day. They should be a part of the Godchild's life during the great feasts of the Church, such as Pascha or Nativity.

Everything should be done to strengthen the bond between the Godparent and the Godchild throughout the ensuing years. Because baptism has been called Illumination, and brings us out of the darkness of sin and into the light of Christ, the role of the Godparent is critical. The godparent must ensure that the Light of Christ continues to shine in the soul of the Godchild. Thus, this role as godparent is an awesome responsibility, and is not to be considered a one-day event. If you've been asked to be a Godparent, but are unwilling to see this as a lifelong vocation, please decline the honor.

The responsibilities of the Godparent only begin at baptism, the role really expands and hopefully blossoms as the Godparent and Godchild develop a close and loving relationship. As with any relationship, this spiritual one needs to be fostered and cared for in order for it to develop. The best way for this relationship to grow is through prayer. Pray for your Godchild and his or her parents, and the parents should encourage their child to pray for the Godparents. By doing this you are encouraging a relationship and giving it the spiritual basis on which to mature.

Model your faith through your actions. Understand the sacraments as well as the teachings of the Church so that you will be able to answer questions that your Godchild may have.

From the moment of Baptism, your Godchild deserves a very special place in your prayers, for on the day of judgment you will be asked about your Godchild's soul.

The relationship between the Godparent and the baptized is so important and so close that the Church forbids marriage between the Godparent and Godchild.

We have a wonderful group of people in our Catechumenate and some of them are in need of Godparents. If you meet the pre-requisites for an Orthodox Godparent and are considering taking on this responsibility, please go to God in prayer before making a commitment. If you choose this path, please contact Genevieve. April 9 is Palm Sunday and the day those Catechumens, who are ready, will be welcomed into the Church, so please let me know as soon as possible if you are interested.

A few years later in 2012, Embrace Grace, a national non profit to equip Churches all around the nation to have a pro-love focus and help women be brave and choose life. Since then, thousands of women have gone through the Embrace Grace program and were put back on a path towards Jesus Christ.

Serving in Embrace Grace, Amy has seen first-hand how women have felt empowered to choose life for their babies because of the impact of the pregnancy centers in their community and knowing she has the community of a local church. Pregnancy centers are the first response team and the Church is the hospital.

Currently, Embrace Grace is in over 700 Churches across the nation, in 47 states and 10 countries. The heart of Embrace Grace is to make the Church one of the first places a young woman runs to instead of the last because of shame and guilt.





Left: a basket of Prosphora. Right: a basket of artoklasia. The artoklasia does not need to be decorated. It is a sweet bread offered at Vespers in five loaves (from the Gospel accounts of feeding 5000+) in honor of the Lord, or the Theotokos, or a saint. Artoklasia means breaking bread.



The blessing of the artoklasia from the GOARCH website:

Priest: Lord, Jesus Christ, our God, You blessed the five loaves in the wilderness and from them five thousand men were filled. Bless now these loaves, the wheat, the wine and oil and multiply them in this holy church, this city, in the homes of those who celebrate today, and in Your whole world. And sanctify Your faithful servants who partake of them.

Priest: For You are He who blesses and sanctifies all things, Christ our God, and to You we offer up glory together with Your eternal Father and Your holy, good, and life-creating Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

People: Amen.

The Priest kisses the loaf and then enters the holy sanctuary, singing:

The rich have grown poor and gone hungry but those who seek the Lord shall not lack any good thing. (3)

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

- Select the gold colored donate DONATE button at the bottom of the page.
- 4) You will now be taken to the page to make your donation. Simply complete the form.
- 5) From the contributions email you receive, select the link to setup your own Aplos account. An account history page will be available. The first tab will show only on-line donations, the second tab allows accounting for recurring donations, and the third is for contribution statements listing on-line, check, and cash donations.




