Every serious Orthodox Christian will enter into the arena of spiritual struggle during this holy season of the Nativity which began on November 15. And our common enemy, the devil, will do everything in his power to prevent you from taking up this fight.

The weapons in this arena are prayer, fasting and serving and loving others. In this way, we emulate our Lord Jesus Christ himself who in his incarnation "emptied Himself, taking the form of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a Page 4-8 man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to Page 9 death—even death on a cross." (Phillipians 2:7)

Page 10-12 Let us also empty ourselves from gluttony, envy, pride, Page 13 lust, anger and greed. Let us also take the form of a servant and offer ourselves to others. Let us also become human again and express our love to one another in words, in deeds and in thoughts. Let us also cruci-Page 18 fy our bad habits of judging, criticizing, gossip, slander Page 19 and resentment. So that we can be made worthy to welcome the Christ-child along with the humble shepherds and the God-fearing Magi; so that our Lord will recognize himself in us.

Below are some practical guidelines for this holy Page 26 season of the Nativity Fast, whether you are experienced in fasting or have never fasted. Aside from the "how to fast", it's more important to understand "why we fast".



# **COUNCIL CORNER**

- We are rapidly coming to the end of another year! As we wind up 2023, there are a number of important dates upcoming:
  - o Sunday, November 26th: General Assembly for Nominations
  - o Thursday, December 7th: Ministry Budget Requests Due
  - o Sunday, December 10th: Parish Council & Audit Committee Elections
  - o Sunday, January 14th: Last day to label items before Storage Room Cleanout
  - O Parish Council Nominations: Parish Council members hold two-year terms. Half of the Parish Council seats (six) are up for election each year. Current Parish Council members in the second year of their term are Zachary Karanasos, Maria Koumantaros, Christina Leinneweber, Fenia Mavromichali, Tony Panagiotu, and Mark Robinson. If you would like to nominate a new or returning individual for these seats, you may do so by attending the General Assembly on November 26th, emailing the Church Office, or contacting a current Council member as soon as possible. Nominations will be assessed by the Elections Committee and Fr. Anthony to ensure eligibility according to Parish Bylaws.
  - o Parish Elections will be held on December 10th in conjunction with the St. Nicholas Day Luncheon.
  - o **2024 Parish Budget**: The Church budget for next year is being drafted now. If you are involved in a **ministry that would like to request funds**, please send your request to the **Church Office or Mark Robinson** by Thursday, **December 7th**.
  - o Storage Room Cleanup: The storage room in the Lower Hall has become too full. The Parish Council would like to declutter unneeded items as well as clean and organize needed items. If you are involved in a ministry that stores items in the Lower Hall Storage Room, we need you to label items your ministry would like to keep by January 14th. After that date, the Parish Council will begin cleaning the room and may dispose of unlabeled items.
  - O Building Committee: The contract for repair work on the roof is almost finished and the work should be done in late December or early January. The Committee will be replacing the damaged portions of the chain link parking lot fence soon for enhanced security. In addition for safety, the Committee is commissioning an engineering study of potential seismic improvements for the floor of the Nave.

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**St. Nikephoros Chapel**: Construction on the Chapel will begin soon. Small adjustments will also be made in the Narthex and stairwell in coordination.

### Why do we fast?

The goal of fasting is to strengthen our free will and self-control. It's about being more disciplined and liberating ourselves from addiction to the pleasure of eating and drinking "sumptuously" like the Rich Man in the parable of the Rich man and Lazarus. It is our humble gift and sacrifice to God. Prayer is absolutely essential. Without it, our fasting will not be accepted by God. Prayer and fasting are meant to soften our hearts so that we can have compunction for our sins. It allows us to feel the suffering of others who are in hunger and poverty and we can then act on this feeling of compassion through the giving of alms to the needy. Fasting can calm the carnal passions of the flesh and give clarity to our minds. Fasting and prayer burns the demons.

If you begin the fast and are unable to keep it, don't be discouraged or ashamed. It's not about how good you are at fasting. It's ultimately about how good God is for accepting your fasting as a sacrifice of love and in return blessing you with his love and grace. If necessary, adjust your fasting when it becomes counterproductive. For example, when you feel too weak to pray or you become irritable. Most importantly, don't give up completely! God will accept your imperfect fasting when you offer it in humility and failure. In fact, being humbled is part of the process and goal of our spiritual labors. We want to avoid spiritual pride or thinking highly of ourselves with regard to fasting, prayer or almsgiving. Humility is the greatest virtue we must struggle to attain.

"Fasting is an exceptional virtue; it represses bodily impulses and gives strength to the soul to fight against the poisoning of the heart through the senses, and provides it with a remedy against any past poisoning. Fasting causes the mind to be cleansed constantly. It whithers up every evil thought and brings healthy, godly thoughts—holy thoughts that enlighten the mind and kindle it with more zeal and spiritual fervor."

-Elder Ephraim of Arizona and Philotheou Monastery on Mount Athos (+2019)

### How to Fast

Any attempt at fasting MUST include prayer. Otherwise, fasting can actually be harmful to yourself and to others. Take a break from TV, social media, the news, and listening to secular music. Instead, take time every day, (at least 5 minutes) to say the Jesus Prayer in a quiet place. Make prostrations in the morning and in the evening. Read a little bit of the New Testament every day. Read a spiritual book on a topic that interests you. Attend the morning or evening services offered during the week. Listen to Byzantine chant or other sacred music. Keep your mind on Christ. Every day, ask him to help you and strengthen you to complete the fast.

### Schedule a confession

All of these efforts help to inspire and cultivate our repentance and open us up to desire and receive God's forgiveness which we receive in the sacrament of Holy Confession.

Some things to watch out for:

Fasting is making you weak, tired and irritable.

Fasting is making you judge others.

Fasting is making you think highly of yourself.

Some things to look forward to:

Fasting can deepen your prayer and spiritual vision.

Fasting can increase your self-control and will power.

Fasting can give you mental clarity and energy.

The Nativity Fast

There are two levels of fasting for the Nativity: Fish Allowed and Strict Fast.

Fish Allowed

Follow a pescatarian diet. Seafood, olive oil and wine are allowed.

Strict Fast

Vegan diet only. No meat. No seafood. No dairy. No eggs. No oil. No wine.

During the period of time when it is Fish Allowed, Wednesdays and Fridays are still Strict Fast (as is the case all year long). However, on some Wednesdays and Fridays there is Wine and Oil Allowed. Follow the Calendar on our Archdiocese website of goarch.org for more guidance.

### Nativity Fasting Periods

From November 15 - December 13

Strict Fast on Wednesdays and Fridays.

Fish Allowed on other days. (Vegan diet with seafood, oil and wine allowed)

After December 13, the fasting intensifies as we prepare to welcome our Lord.

From December 13 - December 24

Strict Fast Wednesdays and Fridays. Vegan all other days.

### Guidelines for beginners

For beginners, (Catechumen, young children, and those who never fasted before) try to observe a strict fast on Wednesdays and Fridays and eat a vegetarian diet with seafood and minimal dairy on all other days.

### **Guidelines for Couples**

It is customary for couples to abstain from marital relations during fasting periods so that they can focus on prayer and honoring the Lord with their minds and bodies instead. During this time, couples can intensify their prayer for their marriage, their children and also focus on serving one another and forgiving one another.

### Beware of the Spirit of Antichrist

Over the next two months, we will be inundated with a distorted view of Christmas that our culture and the corporations have created. Instead of being about Jesus Christ, the "holiday season" will be about what gifts we will get or buy and all the sumptuous food we will eat. This is the spirit of the world, of gluttony and of materialism. It is the spirit of Antichrist which means "instead of Christ." And we justify it in all kinds of absurd ways.

### Cultivate the Spirit of God

But the Church calls us to cultivate and retain within us the Holy Spirit and reject the false spirit of the world. Jesus Christ is the only true gift that we need to receive and that we need to give to others this holy season. Instead of being concerned about what gifts we will buy or receive, let us first be concerned to give our spiritual struggle of prayer, repentance, fasting, confession, worship, receiving Holy Communion, and serving others as a gift to our Lord. In this way, we can acquire the Holy Spirit. Having done this first;

let us then express our love to one another through Christmas gifts and family gatherings in the Holy Spirit and for the sake of Christ.



### President's Message

Holiday Food Certificate Drive - For more than 30 years Philoptochos has spearheaded a project to donate food certificates to families in the community for Thanksgiving and Christmas. This year we are assisting eight families at four schools, Boze, Blix, Downing and Travis (McCarver) elementary schools. Our goal is to raise \$4,000 for this project.

Over \$3,585 has been donated towards our goal for this worthwhile project, including generous donations from the Daughters of Penelope and AHEPA. Please continue with your donations. Donations can be made by mail (please make your check out to Philoptochos-memo holiday food certificates) to the church mailing address or through the church donation website.

Vasilopita - On January 7, 2024 special loaves of bread (made by our Philoptochos members in the church kitchen), will be cut and served to representatives of the St. Nicholas ministries. Funds from this event will go to the St. Basil's Academy, the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese home for children in need in New York.

**Veterans Day Lunch** - Philoptochos assisted with this event by offering lunch after liturgy on November 12, 2023. A free will offering of \$855 was collected for Fisher House at Joint Base Lewis-McChord. Fisher House provides comfortable accommodations where military and veteran families can stay free of charge, while a loved one is in the hospital. Photos of this activity follow this column.

**Philoptochos Membership** - Our year starts in January and runs through December. Annual membership renewal requests will be mailed to all current members soon. We currently have 49 paid members. # **Building Committee**

### DECEMBER BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT


Scope for the replacement of the Upper Hall and Lower Hall roofing is still being fine tuned with Lakewood Roofing, the selected roofing contractor. There were a significant number of upgrades requested over their initial bid which brought their revised total still under the \$240,000 budget approved at the General Assembly last summer. It is currently perceived that the Lower Hall will remain in place as long as the church itself, but the Upper Hall's long term use in its current state is in question, and could conceivably be replaced in the next 5 to 10 years.

Not wanting to skimp on the long-term and still looking for the most economical way, it was decided to implement all proposed upgrades pertaining to the Lower Hall roof and doing a hybrid of the roofer's initial proposal with some selective premiums for the Upper Hall roof. In general the Upper Hall work will be per Lakewood Roofing's initial proposal, but with a 2" layer of rigid insulation added to act as a condensation preventive measure while adding some climate comfort to the interior spaces. The roof perimeter edges will also be built up and, perhaps most importantly, replacing the existing roof scuppers with larger ones that have strainers and overflow outlets. This will greatly reduce the chance of them clogging up as has been the case in the past.

With Christmas and other holidays coming it will likely be just after New Years when the roofing replacement work starts. It is expected to take a few weeks to complete if the weather does not become disruptive.

At this time, interior modifications have started in the small Chapel next to the Narthex. An existing door opening between the Chapel and Narthex is being relocated in order to accommodate new ecclesiastical casework that will eventually be installed in the chapel. This, along with skim coating some of the existing Narthex area walls in preparation of the long awaited iconography that will be installed in the upcoming mouth or so will greatly enhance the spiritual presence and welcome when entering the church.






The above photo to the left is an existing scupper at the Upper Hall roof that tends to easily get clogged up with leaves and other debris. While existing downspouts will remain, new scuppers and drops to the downspouts will be enlarged, plus strainers installed, and overflow holes drilled at the outside face of the scuppers. The above right sketch is the roofer's proposed drainage plan over the Upper Hall, installing built-up tapered insulation to drain rainwater to the roof perimeters. As an enhancement, the perimeter roof edges will be built-up to prevent excess rainwater from spilling over the sides.

### Ministry of Akathist, Prayers for the Departed







# **Donations and Pledges**

### On line Donations now possible

### ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

### On-Line Contribution Instructions:

- On a computer or mobile device, go to the Church's website www.stnicholastacoma.org
- Select the ( BOKESTE ) button. This takes you to the Church's donate page!
- Select the gold colored donate DONATE button at the bottom of the page.
- 4) You will now be taken to the page to make your donation. Simply complete the form.
- 5) From the contributions email you receive, select the link to setup your own Aplos account. An account history page will be available. The first tab will show only on-line donations, the second tab allows accounting for recurring donations, and the third is for contribution statements listing on-line, check, and cash donations.



# **On Line Services**

### Watch Services From Home, Live (it's working again)

Although you might not be able to be at St. Nicholas in person, you can watch services at home from any device capable of connecting to YouTube. This is free and is available for most services. Here's how to do it:

- First, find the schedule when a service is being broadcast. This is called Live Streaming. Look at the calendar
  on the previous page, or better, look at the calendar on the St. Nicholas Web page.

- 2. You can simply click <u>here</u>. If there is a service underway, press the button. You will see and hear the service.
- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the *YouTube* search bar, type; St Nicholas Tacoma


Click on this selection;
