Blessed new beginnings!

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free man, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." –Galatians 3:28

"You are all **one** in Christ Jesus." My beloved Saint Nicholas family, these words of Saint Paul remind us that we do not **lose** our identity in Christ, but rather we **gain** our *true purpose*, we inherit our *true potential*. Like a bridegroom being united in body to his bride in the Holy Sacrament of Marriage, we the Church are united to our collective bridegroom, Christ Himself, when we too are united in body during the Holy Sacrament of Baptism.

This precious gift, this most sacred act is enough in
itself for us to be forever grateful, but for our benevolent Lord, it is only the beginning. In finding our true
purpose, and in the inheritance of our true potential,
we are also given a new name: indeed, we are properly *Christened*. However, this act does not occur at the
Baptism ceremony itself. In fact, in *January 1st's cele- bration* of Christ our Lord's own Circumcision on the
8th Day since His birth, we also celebrate the second
part of this Ancient Jewish Rite of Circumcision. Not
only was a piece of flesh of the newborn male child





COUNCIL CORNER

- We are rapidly coming to the end of another year! As we wind up 2023, there are a number of **important dates** upcoming:
 - Sunday, January 7th: General Assembly to consider the 2024 Budget
 - Sunday, January 14th: Last day to label items before Storage Room Cleanout
- Parish Council Elections: After our elections on December 10th, the following individuals were elected for Parish Council terms beginning in 2024: Zach Karanasos, Christina Leinneweber, Anthony (Tony) Panagiotu, George Pirotis, and Mark Robinson. The following individuals were tied: Fenia Mavromichali and Merrilee Pangis. In accordance with Parish Bylaws, the tie will be broken by a vote of the new 2024 Parish Council as the first order of business. Ann Koopman, Rob (Moses) Sullivan, and Ed Winskill were elected to the Audit Committee.
- **Parish Council Vacancy**: The Parish Council thanks **Leisa Faithful** for her service on the Council. Unfortunately, she has had to resign her position with one year in her term remaining. In accordance with the procedures outlined in the Parish Bylaws, **Dr. Nick Themelis** has been appointed as her replacement.
- Storage Room Cleanup: The storage room in the Lower Hall has become too full. The Parish Council would like to declutter unneeded items as well as clean and organize needed items. If you are involved in a ministry that stores items in the Lower Hall Storage Room, we need you to label items your ministry would like to keep by January 14th. After that date, the Parish Council will begin cleaning the room and may dispose of unlabeled items.
- Building Committee: The contract for repair work on the roof is finished and the work is scheduled for later in January. The Committee will be replacing the damaged portions of the chain link parking lot fence soon for enhanced security. In addition for safety, the Committee has commissioned an engineering study of potential seismic improvements for the floor of the Nave.
- **St. Nikephoros Chapel:** Construction on the Chapel has begun soon. Small adjustments will also be made in the Narthex and stairwell in coordination.

offered to God as a covenant, as an agreement to faithfulness, but the child also received his name.

If we hear that in Christ Jesus, there is neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, *neither male nor fe-male*, then it is *precisely* in the Introductory Rites of Orthodox Christianity where we see this fulfilled. The Jewish Rite of Circumcision of the male newborn on the 8th day was *only a shadow* of its fulfilled reality that we have in the fullness of the Church today.

In the Jewish Introductory Rites, the male child was circumcised and named on the 8th day, and then was brought to the Temple on the 40th day with its mother in order for both to receive a blessing of both introduction to the space, as well as a return for the mother herself to its place of worship. This may sound familiar to us as Orthodox Christians, because we also practice this Rite of a **40 Day blessing**, however being one in Christ, we **no longer limit** it to the male child, but also female-born children. But what about the naming on the 8th Day? This most sacred act which, as we said, was previously combined with the Circumcision in the flesh, is still a sacred act in Orthodoxy today!

In the Orthodox Prayer book of the Priest, we have prayers not only for the 40th Day dedication of mother and child to the Temple, but *also* prayers for the mother on the day of birth itself, and *indeed* prayers for mother and child **on the 8th Day**, where the child is **Christened**—that is he or she receives their Christian name. It is precisely this most beautiful prayer of Naming the Child on the 8th Day that we also use in the making of a Catechumen, or an adult who is dedicating themselves to the Church in their process of learning before Baptism and Chrismation.

In the writings of Saint Cyril of Jerusalem, a 4th Century Bishop to the beloved City of the early Church, we are given guidelines to receiving converts to the Orthodox Faith. It is within these guidelines that we see the naming prayers of those preparing for Holy Baptism, and it is precisely upon being given a Christian name that they are recognized as being Christian. It is in this process of receiving a name that the new Christian is also enrolled in the list Catechumens, which was safeguarded by the Church along with its enrollment of others who were supported in prayer by the Church, and tended to by the clergy, such as Widows.

My beloved, we see that we as Orthodox Christians *also* participate in this ancient introductory act of being named on the 8th Day, whether we were born into an Orthodox family, or we walked in as adult converts. However, we may be wondering: what about the Covenant of Circumcision that we also celebrate on the 1st of January? If there is neither Jew nor Greek, neither male nor female in Christ Jesus, where does that leave those born outside the Jewish lineage, or female children and converts?

In the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy, we hear of circumcision, not only of the male child on the 8th day as commanded, but of the circumcision of the heart:

"And the Lord your God will circumcise your heart and the heart of your offspring, so that you will love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, that you may live."—Deut. 30:6

Notice that this act of circumcision of the heart is performed by Lord God Himself. It is in this offering of our hearts to our Creator that we are gifted the ability to fulfill the great commandment of loving God with all our heart and all our soul, that we may have true life—that we may live. Saint Paul speaks to this circumcision of the heart in his letter to the Romans:

"He is a Jew who is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the Spirit, not in the letter; whose praise is not from men but from God." —Romans 2:29

We who seek God's good pleasure, and not that of other men, prioritize our *full dedication* unto Him. In the Holy Spirit, the same Person of the Holy Trinity that receives our bread and wine offerings and transforms them into our Lord's own Body and Blood, also transforms our hearts, which have been offered to God in covenant.

In the Orthodox Sacrament of Baptism, there is another act performed by the priest and offered by the newly baptized, regardless of being male or female—that is the act of **tonsuring**, or offering of the first cut hair to the Lord. This act of first cut offerings, as we can see, is reminiscent of the act of Circumcision, which was previously limited only to male children or converts. It is important in our prayer life to not only offer our hearts and minds to the Lord, but also to make some level of physical commitment. As we enter into this most sacred Temple today, we likely began with 2 immediate physical acts tied to our prayer: Making our cross, and lighting a candle for ourselves or a loved one. As we were created as composite beings, body and soul, and as our own Creator Himself, Christ our Lord, entered into our existence as body and soul, we must not forgo either blessed aspect of our lives.

Jesus Christ, the anointed Son of God, whose own name means "God saves", saves us from sin and death, and has grafted us into the divine family tree through Baptism. And by the power of the Holy Spirit, He has circumcised our hearts. The circumcision of the heart is an inner transformation from the ways of the old man or worldly ways of operation into that of our true purpose and potential, where we are gifted the pinnacle of Christian virtue: faith, hope, and love.

In taking on flesh, being born of a woman, and receiving both Circumcision and a Name on the 8th day, our all-powerful Creator Lord humbles Himself, submits to His prayerful parents, and honors them. He,

the Giver of the Law, is also fulfilling the Law and giving us an example of obedience in humility. By His Incarnation, which we celebrate during this Christmas season, God the Son took human nature to heal and save it. He took a body and a soul with a human mind and human will. He was born and grew up as a young Jewish boy. We read in the Gospel that the Christ-Child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom, and the favor of God was upon Him. As His mother, the Most Holy Theotokos was highly favored (in Greek, κεχαριτωμένη), so the Son has the favor (in Greek, χάρις) of God upon Him. He is the promised Messiah, Christ, the power and the wisdom of God (1 Corinthians 1:24). He is the eternal Wisdom (in Greek, Σοφία) of God, and He also increases in wisdom, in His human nature. He redeems all steps of our own development as human beings. Throughout his life, He forged the path for each of us to be united to Himself, to our Heavenly Father, and All-holy Spirit.

Saint Cyril of Alexandria says, **"For as He was humbled for us, so for us He increased, that we who have** fallen through sin might increase in Him. For whatever concerns us, Christ Himself has truly undertaken for us, that He might restore us to a better state."

Christ teaches us both humility and wisdom.

In participating, not only in soul, but also in physical body to the teachings and commandments of our Lord, we participate not only in death to the old self, but resurrected life in Christ. We see in our own Introductory Rites of 8th Day naming, 40 Day dedication, and Baptism with Tonsuring that the act of offering our lives unto the Lord is not a one-step process, but a continual commitment. After our adoption into this Heavenly Household, we are not abandoned and left to fend for ourselves, but are constantly called to the Tree of Life to be nurtured by its fruit. Let us not hide in the recesses of our Heavenly Home, but rather in honesty and humility, let us come forward to receive our nourishment from the Great Physician Himself, Christ our Lord, so that He can once again restore us to His likeness, **our true purpose**.

President's Message

Holiday Food Certificate Drive - For more than 30 years Philoptochos has spearheaded a project to donate food certificates to families in the community for Thanksgiving and Christmas. This year we assisted eight families at four schools, Boze, Blix, Downing and Travis (formerly McCarver) elementary schools.

Our goal was to raise \$4,000 for this project. As of December 11, 2023, we had raised \$4,911, surpassing this goal. We extend our heartfelt thanks to AHEPA, Daughters of Penelope and all members of our community who donated towards this project. Additional funds raised will be applied towards local community needs.

Fisher House Donation - Philoptochos members visited Fisher House at Joint Base Lewis-McChord and gave the staff a check for \$855. Fisher House provides comfortable accommodations where military and veteran families can stay free of charge while a loved one is in the hospital. (See photo page 18...)

Vasilopita - On January 7, special loaves of bread (made by our Philoptochos members in the church kitchen) will be cut and served to representatives of the St. Nicholas ministries. Funds from this event will go to the St. Basil's Academy, the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese home for children in need in New York.

Soup Coffee Hour - On January 28, homemade soup and rolls will be served at the coffee hour. Funds for this event benefit the Archdiocese Social Services Department and the Cancer and Other Major Illness Fund.

JANUARY BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The New Year should be opening with the replacement of the existing roofs over the Upper and Lower Halls. The church has been negotiating and finessing the scope of details with Lakewood Roofing. The contract is now being finalized with field work slatted to start shortly after the New Year. This is the wet and cold season so what might take two weeks to complete during the late spring or summer is likely to stretch out longer. Replacement of the roofs (upper and lower), is scheduled to be done before the start of Lent.

Remodel of the Nikephoros Chapel in preparation for new Narthex iconography continues to take place. The initial scope has increased with the removal of an existing closet inside the Chapel, relocation of wiring and skim coating additional surfaces over the rough textured walls in the Narthex area. The remodel and skim coat work should be completed around the first week of January. The Narthex iconography will start shortly afterwards, and is scheduled to be completed before the Great Lent.

A contract has been signed with AHBL (a structural engineering firm), to investigate the existing Sanctuary floor structure and produce design working drawings that would seismically bring the floor assembly up to current code. This would significantly increase the allowable load bearing capacity. The design drawings, with stamped structural calculations would be ready for permitting submittal if desired.

For now, the main purpose for the AHBL design is to provide a set of specifics for cost estimating while helping define logistical considerations. For example, a full floor structure upgrade would likely require the removal and replacement of existing Lower Hall ceilings in order to provide adequate access to the work above, The ceiling work could provide a potential Pandora's box of other possible interior improvements such as new lighting and HVAC. But that is a bridge to cross once we have a better idea of what all would be involved.

The main priority is to properly beef up the Sanctuary floor structure and take away its current "bounce" and also allow the added weight of additional mosaic floor tile if desired; and offering greater flexibility with seating and other layout options. An engineered structural layout is an initial step in being able to intelligently plan for long-term priorities. More information will be coming up as a design develops.








The above left photo shows the northeast corner of the Chapel pointing towards the Narthex. A previous door opening has been filled, and a new door opening (not shown) to its left has been cut and framed in. An existing closet is shown that has recently been removed. The middle photo shows a portion of the Lower Hall ceiling below the Sanctuary. The ceiling and interior soffit finishes would likely have to be removed and replaced in order to provide access to the Sanctuary floor structure above. The right photo shows existing old and worn vinyl tile flooring in the pew areas that sit about 3/4" below adjacent perimeter and main aisle porcelain mosaic floor tile. Part of the Sanctuary improvements would probably provide new built-up flooring in the pew areas that would be flush with the mosaic tile.

Ministry of Akathist, Prayers for the Departed







Donations and Pledges

On line Donations now possible

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

On-Line Contribution Instructions:

- 1) On a computer or mobile device, go to the Church's website www.stnicholastacoma.org
- 2) Select the (ison or) button. This takes you to the Church's donate page!
- Select the gold colored donate DONATE button at the bottom of the page.
- 4) You will now be taken to the page to make your donation. Simply complete the form.
- 5) From the contributions email you receive, select the link to setup your own Aplos account. An account history page will be available. The first tab will show only on-line donations, the second tab allows accounting for recurring donations, and the third is for contribution statements listing on-line, check, and cash donations.



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On Line Services

Watch Services From Home, Live (it's working again)

Although you might not be able to be at St. Nicholas in person, you can watch services at home from any device capable of connecting to YouTube. This is free and is available for most services. Here's how to do it:

- First, find the schedule when a service is being broadcast. This is called Live Streaming. Look at the calendar on the previous page, or better, look at the calendar on the St. Nicholas Web page. <u>www.StNicholasTacoma.org</u>. There is a Live Streaming link at the church calendar.
- 2. You can simply click <u>here</u>. If there is a service underway, press the button. You will see and hear the service.
- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the YouTube search bar, type; St Nicholas Tacoma


