Parish Council Update

Fr. Anthony, Andrew Primis, and Zach Karanasos recently attended the 2023 Metropolis Clergy Laity Convention at St Nicholas Ranch in Dunlap, CA. This annual mandatory gathering is called by the Metropolis and our Archbishop Gerasimos as both a business meeting in which Metropolis Finances and overall Health are addressed and voted on, reports of various ministries and efforts of the Metropolis and Archdiocese are presented, and discussions of future initiatives are discussed, but is also an opportunity for spiritual edification and fortification at the adjoining Monastery of the Theotokos the Lifegiving Spring, as Clergy and Lay representatives from across the various geographic areas of our Metropolis of San Francisco.

A couple points of note: Thirty percent of the contribution to the Archdiocese comes back to the Metropolis of San Francisco, and effectively meets most of the Metropolis' operating budget. Another initiative is the transition to a new Youth Protection protocol. The screening process is mandatory for any person in contact with youth. Look forward for that roll-out from our Parish leadership here at St Nicholas.

Here at St Nicholas, we continue our work to improve in a number of ways including the recent installation of a new furnace, addressing landscaping and security issues, and supporting the work of Fr Anthony and ministries of the parish. We anticipate a General Assembly this summer to address a couple of key issues many have been asking about, so keep a lookout for that.


In other news, the sponsorship team has already raised over \$55, 000 toward our 60th festival.

Building Committee

JUNE BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Deciding on what to ultimately do with the Dining Hall and Upper Hall roofs is still under review with the Parish Council and Building Committee, Because both would entail large spending commitments, it is preferred to take the extra time to verify the most prudent approach rather than act in haste and possibly have buyer's remorse afterwards.

One significant item that was verified with a licensed architect this last month is that since there is a empty space above the ceilings of the kitchen and dining areas which is nominally ventilated with outside air, there would be no point to insulate the top side of the roof deck further above, as it would be the equivalent of replacing old drafty windows with expensive energy-efficient new ones that are always kept open.

The long and short is that without being required to insulate, replaced roofing reduces its overall cost and simplifies the work scope. Holding off on insulating provides an incentive for another possible future upgrade project, namely to renovate the Dining and Kitchen area interiors. At first blush, this scope could entail replacing its current dingy looking ceilings, outdated lighting, and an old loud & blustery unit heater with a new HVAC system that would include air conditioning. And of course the ceilings would be insulated as well.


But interior renovation is at least a step or two beyond taking care of the immediate concern of replacing the Dining Hall and Kitchen area roofing, which has been unreliable, and intermittently allowing ceiling drips to occur after rain storms for the last 5 to 10 years.

Realistically, at this point it looks like the most feasible time to replace the Dining Hall and Kitchen roofing, should it be approved, would be right after Pascha in May of 2024. For this to happen, a Parish Council and subsequent General Assembly approval should be obtained by the beginning of 2024, if not sooner, to allow adequate time for design, permitting, soliciting to bidders, the bidding process itself, and the awarding of contract. The actual field work should not take much more than a few weeks to complete.

The right and lower right photos show vented soffits at two sides of the Dining Hall & Kitchen roof that allow outside air in to ventilate spaces above finished ceilings. The lower left is a photo of the Dining Hall interiors. As a future possibly, it might be desirable to replace its dated ceilings, lighting, and heating, with new cooling included, and provide current code insulation for added comfort.

Cover Story Continued...

This hymn continues to speak to our hearts throughout the calendar year, as we are called to continually prepare for receiving the Lord at each offering of the Divine Liturgy and distribution of the Holy Eucharist—the very Body and Blood of our Lord, who seeks to find a place worthy to lay His head within us. (Matt. 8:20)

The offering of first things of our day may begin with gratitude and thanksgiving, but we may also find it opportune to offer this time for supplication—to ask God to assist us in a particular stumbling block that may have stopped us at the threshold of the Heavenly Banquet. In asking God, in asking our patron saint, in asking one another for their prayers, we do not simply offer our struggle onto their shoulders, wiping our hands clean of the situation, but rather we join in concert so *that* we can begin to struggle. The Ark of Salvation doesn't consist of multitudes of skiffs, each with an individual operator. The Ark of Salvation is a unified ship, with a unified trajectory, whose captain is Christ.

In our own participation in *making ready*, in our own offering of first things to God, we are also offered the life-giving opportunity to fast. We are likely most familiar with the 40-Day fasts of Lent and Nativity, as well as the blessed first few weeks dedicated to Panagia's Dormition in the month of August. However, one more opportunity is bestowed upon us that can easily be overlooked, yet speaks so much to our own cycle of *preparation, receiving*, and *being sent*: **The Apostles Fast**. This fast occurs after the fast-free week of Great and Holy Pentecost (the reception of the Holy Spirit), and leads into the feast honoring the chief Apostles Peter and Paul (June 29th). For the variable nature of the date of Pentecost, sometimes this fast only lasts for a few days, but this year we are blessed with a few weeks, beginning Monday the 12th of June.

The culmination of such preparation to receive the Lord is in the reception of the Sacred and Life-Giving Communion at the Liturgy. This year, we will be offering an evening Vigil service on the 28th, beginning with Vespers at 5pm, and concluding with the Divine Liturgy by 8:30pm or so. We encourage all of our beloved families to join, and also bring any non-fasting potluck items so that we can break the fast together in joy and fellowship.

Once receiving the life-giving gift of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost, the Apostles prepared themselves to be sent out into the world in order to preach the Gospel, and baptize in the name of the Holy Trinity. In honor of this, we Orthodox Christians, also prepare ourselves to receive our own apostolic call on a daily basis in the opportunities God has placed in our path to draw closer to Him.

May we join with the Holy Apostles in this most blessed month of June, to prepare ourselves for receiving the Gift of Life, as we are sent out into a world in such need of His salvific Ark.





The Book of Acts FATHER ANTHONY CORNETT our new priest and Bible Study teacher



Father Anthony: The Book of Acts is, kind of, nicknamed the Gospel of the Holy Spirit as I see it's already written here on the whiteboard. The longer title is the Book of the Acts of the Apostles. Why is it nicknamed the "Gospel of the Holy Spirit"? Who is acting within the lives of the early Church, within the lives of the Apostles? But, of course, the imbuing of the Holy Spirit, Himself. We have the nurturing of the disciples in the Gospel books and the fruit of the Spirit is shown in this beautiful Book of Acts. Acts serves as a "Part B" or second half of a particular Gospel Book. Who is the author of the Book of Acts?

Various replies: Luke

Father Anthony: We have Luke the Evangelist as the Gospel writer and author of the Book of Acts. Of

whom was Luke the disciple? **Various replies:** St. Paul.

Father Anthony: In fact, Luke learned the Gospel of Christ from St. Paul. This shows apostolic succession within Scripture – the transmission of the Gospel. Was Paul walking around with Christ and the twelve disciples? No. In fact, he was persecuting them. Through Paul's learning of the Gospel and through his coming together with the disciples of the Lord, he offers that Gospel message to Luke. Luke was not in the inter-working with the Twelve or the Three (Peter, James & John) but a surrounding member. He was often thought that Luke was one of the Seventy (those who were paired up in two's and sent out). The word apostle means to be sent out to proclaim the Good News. We have the apostolic faith of Orthodoxy, not just because we have apostolic succession (uninterrupted line of the Apostles laying hands on bishop after bishop in ordination of priests and bishops) but also the doctrine of God – the teachings of God. Many Holy Fathers will proclaim that the Myrrh-bearing women were the first Apostles to God. They may not be listed among the Twelve, but truly they are delivering the apostolic message to the world - first to the disciples and then throughout the world. This Sunday we will be celebrating the feast day of the Samaritan woman, St. Photini and her beautiful account of becoming, truly, an apostle to the Gospel message.

Father Anthony: I'm sure the Holy Fathers have said there is significance in the order of the listing of the Apostles. Obviously, within the listing of the first three you see the "Chief" disciples of the Lord, Peter, James and John. Jesus' name in the Old Testament was Joshua, the name Jesus is from the Latin, based on the Greek. The name James was not an OT name either. The name James didn't come around until the time of the King James translation of the Bible. lakovos (Giacomo) or Jacob was the name used during that period. Early on in the transmission of the Gospel Book into English, they wanted to differentiate some of the OT names from the NT names so as not to confuse or conflate them.


Source: goarch.org: The arrangement of names in these lists are made in three steps, with changes occurring in each step. Peter appears first and Judas last. There is no primacy of Peter in the sense of jurisdiction or authority over his fellow Apostles. Such an authority Peter never received and never exercised. "His position is that of the foremost among equals; a position due not to any formal or official appointment, but to the ardor and force of his nature." (Hastings)

Homilies of Acts:

- 1) Peter at Pentecost (Acts 2: 14 36)
- 2) Stephen on day of Trial (Acts 7: 1 53)
- 3) Paul at Areopagus (Acts 17: 22 31)
- 4) Paul's farewell at Miletus to presbyters of Ephesus (Acts 20: 18 35)
- 5) Paul to Jews at Roman camp in Jerusalem (Acts 22: 1 22)
- 6) Paul in bonds to Governor Felix (Acts 24: 10 21) and King Agrippa (Acts 26: 2 23)

Within the Book of Acts we see a beautiful compilation not simply of the early formation of the Church but also a beautiful library of homilies. They are often testimonies of the Gospel message, testimonies of Christ and sometimes at someone's trial or martyrdom. They are beautiful examples for all of us: wishing to witness the Gospel message and wishing to witness the Lord in our communities, if nothing else, to find inspiration in this list of homilies.

Another text that I would like to cover is from the book, "A Panoramic View of Holy Scripture, Vol. II" by Augoustinos N. Kantiotes, Bishop of Phlorina, Greece (of blessed memory). It covers the individual Books of the New Testament and are brief overviews of what we are looking at:



Acts of the Apostles: Mission: You shall be my witnesses to the end of the earth. The Acts of the Apostles, beloved, is the fifth Book of the New Testament, and Luke who wrote the third Gospel, is its author. This Book is called Acts, not "The Acts" because, as the interpreters observed, it does not contain, in detail, all the events of the lives and deeds of the Apostles; but only certain of them. Especially, the chief Apostles, Peter and Paul who are enough to give us a vivid picture of the first Church. The Book is historical - Luke has been proved an excellent historian. The first and essential acts of an historian is the truth. Whatever he says must be true and has been proved by archeological research. All that Luke related with his graceful language corresponds absolutely to reality. For example, Paul's journey on the Mediterranean which is described in Chapter 27 of Acts, is full of adventures. During the voyage, the ship was in danger of sinking and as an experienced seaman says, with the details that are mentioned, it is certain that it is not a creation of fantasy but a description of a real event which Luke lived through as a co-traveler with Paul. The credibility of the author is further proven through some sorrowful events which darken the brightness of the apostolic age. For example, the lie of Ananias and Sapphira. Or perhaps, the sorrowful situation of a disagreement between Paul and Barnabas. They are omitted, but described in great detail.



Father Anthony: What he is trying to describe here, is if it was called "The Acts", that would indicate a strict record or document. The lie of Ananias and Sapphira is something that you would have covered in We'll talk a little more about it in this study as well. If this was an act of fiction, it would be easy to delete those sorrowful times. The film, "One Hour Photo", is about an asocial (Robin Williams) who works at a 1 hour Photo mart and develops a, sort of, social relationship with the customers, but at the end of the day he goes home to himself. He has this touching monologue about the nature of snapshots of family lives and says people only develop photographs of the happy times. He said because of that "I don't have any childhood photographs." And so he develops this unhealthy relationship by printing out an extra copy of photos of those people whom he relates to throughout his day. Towards the end of the movie, you see a wall in his house covered with family photos of people who are not his family. But it's true, you always see photos of happy times. In Scripture, Christ said He was not there to be the judge at that time, but to call the "lost sheep of Israel". His point was to draw them back in and wake them up. The polemic nature of speech works effectively to an inner-family dynamic. speaks to these people (scribes, Pharisees and Sadducees) the language is strongly worded because they know better - they are accountable for their actions. You hear Christ say, "You say in your law...", isn't it His law too? Is He not the Giver of the law? We see Moses as the transmitter of the law, but the Word of God is the "Giver" of the law. When Christ says, "Your law", it is to convict them and shake them up a little bit and to remind them of their true calling. This is to remind them to prepare themselves for the "Day of the Lord" and to receive the Lord in Holy Communion. We see no shying away from the difficult things. In fact, this is the purpose of Scripture, to face the difficult times with the grace of God. You see this also in the history of the Orthodox Church. The Bishop of Constantinople, Nestorius, refused to call the Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, Theotokos. In his refusal, he refused Who Christ is because the Theotokos is pointing to Whom Christ is. She not only gave birth to the "Anointed One" but to God Nestorius led our Church, but we don't write him out of our history because of his heresy. Scripture doesn't write Judas Iscariot out of history. It shows that he was a chief disciple and treasurer of Christ and the disciples. The Holy Fathers didn't say, "Oops, that was a mistake." who were walking and talking with the Lord in the Garden - "Oops, that was a mistake - let's write them out and start fresh." The same with the lives of the Saints. The beauty of the lives of the Saints is the hardships that they endured. What were some of the pre-dispositions that led them to a life away from God and what brought them back to God? There's a beautiful set of books that Metropolitan Augoustinos has on the lives of the Saints that lists them by their occupation "known by" (doctor, gardener, etc.). It's an interesting way to approach them – it relates differently with each reader.

When we speak about the Holy Gospel, the proclamation of the Good News, the Holy Gospel is singular. We have Books of the Holy Gospel, accounts, but when we proclaim the Gospel in the Church it's "We proclaim the Holy Gospel according to (i.e.) Luke...". It's a personal helper for me to know the Gospel is singular, there's one Gospel with many accounts. We have our own account of the Gospel. Luke, too, who learned the Gospel through Paul writes his own Gospel account and he gives it an address as he does the **Book of Acts**.

In the beginning of the **Book of Acts**, this again is written to Theophilus. Presuming that Theophilus had already heard the Gospel message, St. Luke is offering an exact account to give to Theophilus, who is a neophyte. Early on in the Church the **Gospel, according to Luke**, and the **Book of Acts** were often combined as a booklet unto itself and given to Catechumens, neophytes and Newly Illumined Christians. The blessed Theophylact of Ochrid, a wonderful saint of our Church and commentator, writes the following as an introduction to the **Gospel account according to St. Luke**:




The divine Luke, an Antiochian and a physician, had a great knowledge of natural philosophy; but he was also much practiced in Hebrew learning. He lived in Jerusalem at the time when our Lord was teaching, so that some say that he himself became one of the seventy apostles, and together with Cleopas, met the Lord after He rose from the dead. After the Lord ascended, and Paul believed, Luke became a close companion and follower of Paul. He wrote his Gospel with great accuracy, as his preface makes clear. He wrote the Gospel fifteen years after the Lord's Ascension. He writes it to a certain Theophilus, a senator and perhaps a magistrate as well, calling him "most excellent". Magistrates and governors are addressed in this fashion, as when Paul said to the governor Festus, "O most excellent Festus".1 Everyone who loves God and exercises dominion over his passions is a "Theophilus" and "most excellent", and it is he who is truly worthy to hear the Gospel.

Father Anthony: Here the blessed St. Theophylact uses the name of Theophilus and says that it is not just some historical account, but we as hearers of the Gospel account and we as hearers of the **Acts of the Apostles** also become Theophilus and receive his name and title as well by God's grace.

Tell us about yourself!

I'm married to the priest at our parish and he has been in the ministry for 23 years. I have been his partner in that. We served for 12 years in Lutheran parishes before coming to Orthodoxy. We have one son. I have been retired for ten years but was a special needs teacher for almost all my career. I also served as a school principal for 12 years. My retirement job, if you want to call it a job, is working with our local pregnancy resource center, Bravely Women's Health.

ST. NICHOLAS PRO-LIFE MINISTRY

What is your background in the pro-life movement?

I've been involved in pro-life activities most of my adult life. As a mom, I am conscious of all the challenges motherhood brings. As a teacher, I was faced with young women over the years that got pregnant and did not have any clue what they were doing. Of course, the popular opinion was that they were too young to have a baby and that they needed to have an abortion. Through those experiences, I saw the importance of having not just a shoulder to cry on, but someone who could mentor these new mothers.

I first heard about our local pregnancy resource center when we moved to Lafayette. So, I first got involved as a volunteer. I did some summer sessions with groups of young mothers. This soon morphed into also working with the program that provides clothing and diapers and formula. Now. . . I'm there two or three times a week. It's been a great way for me to share, not just my faith, but my practical experiences as both a mother and a teacher.





How does your parish work with your local pregnancy center?

As a parish, we had been involved with the local pregnancy resource center for many years before we knew about Orthodox Christians for Life. We have been involved in everything from fundraising to diaper drives. We do clothing drives and we have done the baby bottle campaign. But, it is an effort by the whole parish. When people ask 'who is a member of your OCLife ministry,' it's technically everybody. It's not a club. It's part of what we do every day for outreach and benevolence and everybody is involved in some way.

Why is the pro-life cause important to you?

I think it is important as Christians for us to understand that to be pro-life means more than just waving a flag or dropping a few coins in a bottle. That's not what is important. While it can play a role, it is more important to live out your faith and what we believe as Orthodox Christians every day. And this is one way we can do that. Maybe for some people, it's a small way, but you shouldn't feel bad about that. Your little contribution will make a big impact.

How is your parish working to educate the youth about abortion?

It has become a part of our larger Christian education program. We need to instill in them the idea that Christianity is not just a belief system, it's a way of life. So, if you say you're a Christian, here are the things that Christians do. As Christians, we are called to go out into the world and do things. You can't just sit in your prayer corner and pray, although even that's a good thing. You must get out there and "do" as well. We work to involve the littlest ones in any project the larger parish is involved in. That shows them that nobody is too little to be able to have a great impact.

Do you have any words of encouragement for parishes that are considering joining OCLife?

Don't be afraid. If you are honest in your expression of your faith and you pray to God to support you, He will not let you down. Don't be afraid to just step out there, especially when it is such a worthy mission. It is okay to start small. You can start with one event or one thing, and build from there. If you wait to have that group of 50 people, you may never start because you never think it's the right time.

I'm so pleased that OCLife has been revived and is really expanding. It's so important for us as Orthodox Christians to join this nationwide effort. We need to stand up and make our beliefs known to the world.





ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!

- On a computer or mobile device, go to the Church's website www.stnicholastacoma.org
- Select the (1805.50) button. This takes you to the Church's donate page!
- Select the gold colored donate DONATE button at the bottom of the page.
- 4) You will now be taken to the page to make your donation. Simply complete the form.
- 5) From the contributions email you receive, select the link to setup your own Aplos account. An account history page will be available. The first tab will show only on-line donations, the second tab allows accounting for recurring donations, and the third is for contribution statements listing on-line, check, and cash donations.



- 3. Watch on any device. Open **YouTube** (you may have to start a browser like Chrome). In the *YouTube* search bar, type; St Nicholas Tacoma


