Father Anthony's March Article

Prayerful Preparation for a Joyous Resurrection

As we enter into the Great Forty Days of the Lenten Fast, we have the esteemed privilege of knowing how this all ends: Christ's glorious Resurrection on the third day, as celebrated in Great and Holy Pascha, on April 16th of this year. However, before we receive and celebrate this reward of eternal life that has been extended to all of the Lord's faithful flock, we are first called to a period of preparation.

Throughout Scripture, we find various examples of the preparation of God's people in order to receive a great reward. In the Old Testament, the Jewish people journeyed for 40 years in the desert in order to receive and enter into the gift of the Promised Land. In the New Testament, we are given countless examples through the Parables of our Lord to teach us the importance of preparing for the Great Banquet with the Master. The 9th Chapter of the Holy Gospel according to Matthew enlightens us to this fact with the following gems:

14 Then John's disciples came to him, saying, "Why do we and the Pharisees fast often, but your disciples don't fast?"

15 Jesus said to them, "Can the friends of the bridegroom mourn as long as the bridegroom is with them? But the days will come when the bridegroom will be taken away from them, and then they will fast.

16 No one puts a piece of unshrunk cloth on an old garment; for the patch would tear away from the garment, and a worse hole is made.

17 Neither do people put new wine into old wine skins, or else the skins would burst, and the wine be spilled, and the skins ruined. No, they put new wine into fresh wine skins, and both are preserved."

As we prepare to receive our risen Bridegroom, my brothers and sisters in Christ, we prepare not only with abstaining from certain foods (chiefly meat and dairy, as our bodies allow), but first and foremost by abstaining from every passion, as so beautifully noted in our Vespers Service on the Sunday of Forgiveness:

Let us observe a fast acceptable and pleasing to the Lord.

True Fasting is to put away all evil,

To control the tongue, to forbear from anger,

To abstain from lust, slander, falsehood and perjury.

If we renounce these things, then is our fasting true and acceptable to God.

Let us keep the Fast not only by refraining from food,

But by becoming strangers to all the bodily passions.

Saturday of the Souls & the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

With the blessing of increased liturgical services, and other opportunities to unite as the Body of Christ during this Lenten season, one of the most-treasured moments is the Saturday of the Souls (Ψ υχοσάββατον). On this day, we offer both kollyva (boiled wheat) as well as prayers on behalf of our loved ones who have gone on before us.

"What," you might ask, "makes the Saturday of the Souls different from any other memorial?"

Some of you might be acquainted with the wonderful monument in the Arlington National Cemetery, which is dedicated to the "Unknown Soldier". This monument is guarded at all times by a dedicated serviceperson, rain or shine. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier stands for the soldiers whose lives were lost in battle, but remains have yet to be identified. These persons are honored with dignity and respect, even though we may not be able to identify them by name.


This is the primary reason we gather on Saturday of the Souls—to honor those who have gone before us, yet have not been given proper memorials by their given name. Our website for the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese offers the following instructive words for this day,

"Since many throughout the ages, because of an untimely death in a faraway place, or other adverse circumstances, have died without being deemed worthy of the appointed memorial services, the divine Fathers, being so moved in their love for man, have decreed that a common memorial be made this day for all pious Orthodox Christians who have reposed from all ages past, so that those who did not have particular memorial services may be included in this common one for all."

Of course many of us also bring a list of names for our beloved family and friends to be commemorated, alongside our own 'unknown soldiers in Christ'. When we unite again, either online or in person, for the next Saturday of Souls, let us also bring to mind our own 'unknown soldiers', whose names our loving God surely knows.



Greetings everyone and Happy New Year! It is such a blessing that the Philoptochos mission is truly a valued part of St. Nicholas parish! Each of the events that Philoptochos has sponsored over the past year have been GENEROUSLY supported by not only parishioners, but even by visitors to our parish. Each event has seen an increase in giving over the previous year, and Philoptochos is humbled by the financial expression of your faith in our ability to help those who are needy in our local area and the wider orthodox community.

Significant planned activities include:

Welcome Coffee Hour for Father Anthony Cornett and family - Philoptochos will host a welcome coffee hour on February 26 welcoming Father Anthony Cornett and his family to St. Nicholas.

Ladies Lunch and Raffle-Philoptochos annual fun event with lovely tables, exciting raffle items, and a huge dessert buffet will be held on Saturday, May 6. More details will follow.

Recent January/February activities to further our mission of helping those less fortunate and to promote participation in the Philoptochos Society:

Vasilopeta - On January 9, special loaves of bread (made by our Philoptochos members in the church kitchen) were cut and served to representatives of the St. Nicholas ministries. \$1,508 donated from parishioners for this event was sent to the St. Basil's Academy, the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese home for children in need in New York.

Soup Coffee Hour - On January 29, members prepared a variety of soups and rolls to be served at the coffee hour. This was a free-will offering and \$1,472 was collected. Funds for this event benefited two National funds, the Social Services fund and the Cancer and Other Major Illnesses Fund.

Building Committee

MARCH BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

A 2023 church budget presented by the Parish Council was passed at a General Assembly held on January 29, which included approval to replace the church furnace in the Lower Hall. A contract has since been signed with Narrows Heating, the contractor selected to do the work. The furnace replacement work should take about a week or so. Mutually acceptable dates are in the process of being set, with the work possibly taking place as soon as sometime in March as long as it doesn't interfere with Lent services and activities.

Details and specifics of new church iconography, both in the Narthex and elsewhere, continue to be worked out between the iconographer and the church icon committee. This is a long and meticulous process. Unofficially, actual iconography panels within the main Narthex area might be completed and in place around November of this year.

A six month roofing inspection of the new Narthex area roofing should be taking place this month. Also, the attic space above the Sanctuary and the existing Upper Hall and Dining/Kitchen area roofs will be looked at as well; with the intent to further obtain viable preventive maintenance and future renovation possibilities.

A preliminary proposal that has been mentioned in previous Messengers to address long-term fixes to the deteriorating Upper Hall and Dining Hall/Kitchen area roofs, in conjunction with providing a bigpicture overall church renovation plan has been drafted and presented to the Building Committee and Parish Council. With the transition of priests being done in a quicker than ideal manner and Lent soon to be starting, it has been decided to let things settle, take the time to absorb, and present a more vetted proposal shortly after Pascha.

In closing, below are some reminder photos of the existing state of the Upper Hall and Dining Hall/ Kitchen area roofs.



This is the roof drain area over the Upper Hall, shot on a sunny day a few months ago, looking north towards the Narthex. Note the standing water puddles that linger on a roof that has no slope built into it.



Above is the Dining Hall/Kitchen roof looking east. The light colored stripes consist of mastic with white granules on top, applied to roofing seams and other suspect areas as a preventive maintenance effort.

MARCH 26th we will celebrate Greek Independence Day! This year will mark the 202nd anniversary of the Greek War for Independence. Mr. George Pirotis will be giving a presentation on Sunday, March 26th, following the Divine Liturgy, and during the Sunday luncheon. If you have never attended one of George's presentations in the past, you certainly won't want to miss this opportunity! His presentations are always informative, educational, and entertaining, and they highlight the contributions that Greece has provided to freedom loving countries around the world. **ZITO Y HELLAS!**

March 25, 1821. The Greek Revolution of 1821, also known as Greek Independence Day. March 25th is celebrated in Greece, Cyprus, and anywhere else that Greeks gather. It is sometimes referred to as Greece's Independence Day, but more appropriately it is the day that was selected to mark the start of the Greek Revolution. The day coincides with the feast day of the Annunciation, the day the Archangel Gabriel

visited Panagia, and told her that she would be the mother of the son of God. This feast day was chosen as the day of the start of the Greek Revolution against the Ottoman Empire, by the "FILIKI ETERIA" or the "Society of Friends," which at the time was led by Alexander Ypsilantis.

The Filiki Eteria was a secret society that was formed in 1814 with the goal of liberating Greece from the Ottoman Turks. The group planned the insurrection to occur on the feast day of the Annunciation, but in some parts of Greece the fighting actually started sooner. On March 25 Bishop Germanos of Patras raised the flag of revolution over the Monastery of Agia Lavra in the Peloponnese. The cry "Freedom or death" became the motto of the revolution and in the year 1829 success was finally achieved, and Greece gained its independence from the Ottoman Empire.







St. Nicholas Bible Study

The Book of Acts



Father Seraphim: I want the members of our Bible Study to understand that you all are playing a very important role in the life of St. Nicholas. This is like a little lab where we germinate our own theological culture. This is where ideas are expressed because our parish is a product of the actual people who come to it. As students of Scripture and theology, that puts us on the leading edge of the wing, so to speak, of what this body is thinking about, cares about, approach to Scripture, approaches to different things, social issues, themes that we return to and the particular experience of being in Tacoma, WA as opposed to any of these other places. Every parish has a theological culture just as every family has a culture. When an identifiable group of people get together, their shared life, their artifacts, their food and the way they express themselves form a culture. Above are samples that represent various corners of the Orthodox world. I want people to understand that, for example in the top left corner, St. Basil's in Russia has a feel, a sound and a smell. Every single one of these is all one faith, one Church and One Christ and one goal, but they are expressed in different ways. The Russian "feel" is a little different than the Romanian "feel" and the Romanian "feel" is a little different than the Mt. Athos, Greece "feel" and that's different than Jerusalem and it's a little bit different between the west coast of the US and the east coast of the US. It's all One Church, though. I wanted everyone to start thinking about this – if you participate at St. Nicholas, the deeper you go in this community (especially if you are a Bible Study participant - it's like our "think tank" or "lab") all our experiences as individuals are coming together because we are in this

particular location. Every parish has a parish culture – the question is, is that culture deliberate? Is it informed by things of the nature of the Gospel? Are we expressing ourselves in a way that's concomitant with our own tradition and history but germinating how we express that locally. Bible Study forms a very important part where everyone is gathered together as both members and theologians to start figuring out what the St. Nicholas vibe (the St. Nicholas emphasis) is. God calls us to create something infused by His grace.

You can tell the difference between the Russian Novgorod style of iconography versus the Cretan style of iconography. They are both distinctly Orthodox but you get a flavor of the culture that gave birth to it. There's a proper creativity that each school of iconography expresses within the parameters of tradition.

I hope everyone sees that it's exciting to be part of a creative work just like an iconographer expresses themselves except within the tradition. I refer to Bible Study conversations frequently because this is the leading edge of the culture development of this parish. I'm not trying to single it out as better than anything else, but I'm singling us out as the essence of what the theological culture is at St. Nicholas Parish. If that is what you're looking for, Bible Study is where you're going to find it. I hope you see yourselves as participants in creating something distinct, precious and valuable.

Excerpt from a Sermon by St. John Chrysostom: Apostles Peter and John heal the lame man (Acts 3) Everywhere we find these two Apostles ¹in great harmony together. "To him Simon Peter beckoned." John 13:24. These two also came together to the Sepulchre. John 20:3 et seq. And concerning John, Peter said to Christ, "And what shall this man do?" John 21:21. Now as for the other miracles, the writer of this book omits them; but he mentions the miracle by which they were all put in commotion. Observe again that they do not come to them purposely; so clear were they of ambition, so closely did they imitate their Master. Why now did they go up to the temple? Did they still live as Jews? No, but for expediency (χρησίμως). A miraculous sign again takes place, which both confirms the converts, and draws over the rest; and such, as they were a sign for having wrought. The disease was in the nature of the man, and baffled the art of medicine. He had been forty years lame Acts 4:20, as the writer says afterwards, and ²no one during all that time had cured him. And the most obstinate diseases are those which are born with men. It was a great calamity, insomuch that even to provide for himself his necessary sustenance was impossible for him. The man was conspicuous both from the place, and from his malady. Hear how the matter is related. "And a certain man, lame from his mother's womb, was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them who entered into the temple." Acts 3:2. He sought to receive alms, and he did not know who the men were. "Who seeing Peter and John about to go into the temple, asked an alms. And Peter, fastening his eyes upon him, with John, said 'Look on us'." (V. 3.4) Yet, not even so were the man's thoughts elevated, but he persisted in his importunity. For such is poverty; upon a refusal, it compels people still to persist. Let this put us to shame who fall back in our prayers. ³But observe, I pray you, Peter's gentleness: for he said, "Look on us". So, truly did their very bearing, of itself, betoken their character. "And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them. Then Peter said, 'Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have I give you.' " (V. 5-6). He did not say, I give you something much better than silver or gold: but what? 4"In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk. And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up." Acts 3:7. Such was also the way of Christ. Often He healed by word, often by an act, often also He stretched forth the hand, where men were somewhat weak in faith, that the cure might not appear to be spontaneous. "And he took him by the right hand and lifted him up." This act made manifest the Resurrection, for it was an image of the Resurrection. "And immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. And he leaping up stood, and walked." Acts 3:8. Perhaps it was by way of trying himself that he put it thus to further proof, whether perchance the thing done might not be to no purpose.

His feet were weak; it was not that he had lost them. Some say that he did not even know how to walk. "And entered with them into the temple." Of a truth it was marvelous. The Apostles do not urge him; but of his own accord he follows, by the act of following pointing out his benefactors. "And leaping and praising God"; not admiring them, but God Who wrought by them. The man was grateful.

Father Seraphim: Yes, like the man who was let down from the roof by his friends. Luke 5:19-20 "And when they could not find how they might bring him in, because of the crowd, they went up on the housetop and let him down with his bed through the tiling into the midst before Jesus. ²⁰When He saw their faith, He said to him, "Man your sins are forgiven you." The point is, the Lord was there and didn't give him a healing because he wasn't ready for the healing, which I think is probably the case because St. John Chrysostom indicates the man's hopelessness, and also the words of St. Peter to preface the miracle, "silver and gold have I none; but such as I have I give you." In other words, I can see that you want silver and gold because you've given up on everything else, I'm here to tell you there's something else. That to me, indicates that the man was on a journey and this moment coincided with the desperation in his heart that gave birth to the beginning of faith. The second issue, of course, is the part about what the Lord says, "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do he will do also; and greater works than these he will do, because I go to My Father." John 14:12 The Lord didn't just come to earth and fix everything and then tell the Apostles that their job was to go tell everyone what He did. He's giving them the power of the Holy Spirit to fulfill in their own ministries, as a rather shocking statement that St. Paul makes, what was lacking in Christ. He didn't mean that Christ was lacking in anything, it means the Lord was saying, I've given you all things, I've conquered death, I've sent the Holy Spirit, now you are going to be "Little christs" and every one of you in his own spheres is going to fulfill what I did for the whole world. That's the issue of scale. Notice that St. John Chrysostom (point 1 & 3) that their healing is grounded in humility. Elder Ephraim of Arizona (of blessed memory) was one of the most sweet and gentle human beings and very humble. St. Peter was like that - sweet and kind, humble and innocent and those are the words that characterize him. One last point – did you notice the nomenclature here - Jesus Christ of Nazareth? What's up with that language?

Anonymous: "...Can anything good come out of Nazareth?..." John 1:46

Fran H: I think everybody would have heard of Him by then. Like "Oh you mean "that" Elvis!?"

Father Seraphim: That's right. He had to use the lowest common denominator term. The three thousand people who "believed" at Pentecost just prior to this, is one thing. But he's at the Temple. Who's going to the Temple?

Various: The Jews.

Father Seraphim: Right – the people who don't believe in the Gospel. St. John Chrysostom addresses this, *"why now did they go to the temple? Did they still live as Jews?"* St. John answers, *"No, but for expediency."* St. John is confirming that the Apostles, Peter and John, believe in the Messiah, but don't give up going to the Temple. They are not beholding to anything. They go there to preach the Gospel and to raise up the little shrunken souls they find everywhere and to, perhaps, give them the grace of the Holy Spirit and to raise them into "Giants".

Dr. Ingrid C: When he said, "In the Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk.", St. John Chrysostom, a few lines later, says, "This act made manifest the Resurrection, for it was an image of the Resurrection.", because the Jews did not believe.

Father Seraphim: Exactly. That's why a little detail like that is important. I think of it as skill development when it comes to the reading of the Gospels. We may not know what is up with a given phrase or text, but it should cause our "antennae" to wiggle a little bit. This is one of them, "*Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth*", because it is a rather archaic term for our Lord and Savior. Fast forward to the post-Resurrection, post-Ascension and post-Pentecost period and the Church doesn't call Him "Jesus of Nazareth".



Priest: Lord, Jesus Christ, our God, You blessed the five loaves in the wilderness and from them five thousand men were filled. Bless now these loaves, the wheat, the wine and oil and multiply them in this holy church, this city, in the homes of those who celebrate today, and in Your whole world. And sanctify Your faithful servants who partake of them.

Priest: For You are He who blesses and sanctifies all things, Christ our God, and to You we offer up glory together with Your eternal Father and Your holy, good, and life-creating Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

People: Amen.

ON-LINE DONATIONS

The donation section of the Church's website has been revamped to include a link to a new on-line donation form. The form allows one-time donations, setup for automatic recurring donations, and selection of donation purpose. There is also a note section to inform Church accounting of special handling needs, such as memorial donations or address changes. Church on-line donations are directed to the Church through WePay (a Chase Bank Affiliate) and Aplos Software, LLC. Donors contributing on-line receive an email thanking them for their donation. In addition, through a link in the donation notification, each donor can setup their own Aplos account to view a list of on-line donations, manage recurring donations, and to view and print a contributions statement.

Please be aware that in converting to this software I noticed multiple duplicative account names. In some instances, I will need to merge duplicate accounts so the contribution statement accurately combines into one statement both the on-line donations and check and cash donations. The unique identifier for this purpose is a valid email address.

I want parishioners to enjoy greater flexibility in making Church donations and receiving an accounting of their annual to date contributions at any time of the year. Many of you have asked and inquired about the possibility of accounting for your donations automatically on-line. It is now a reality. If you have any problems or questions with this new service, please let me know. As your treasurer, I am here to serve you!



On Line Services




